

Local JCs Plan Program

John Heilbronner and Les Snively, a pair of local Junior Chamber of Commerce members, are planning to attend a personal development program for young men November 7 at the Central Oregon College campus, Bend.

Featured speaker at the one-day meeting will be Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts. He will speak during a luncheon.

Three major topics are up for consideration. They are "how a man can know his potentialities and capacities," "relation between the organization and the man," and "communication as a tool for changing behavior."

Faculty members from the psychology department at the University of Oregon will present each topic. They will be followed by group discussions.

The program is offered primarily for Jaycee members, but arrangements to accept a limited number of others have been made. Other local Jaycees say they may attend the session.

School Chief Found Guilty

SEATTLE (AP) — Thomas Hopkins, superintendent of the Hopkins Military Academy near suburban Redmond, was found guilty Tuesday of contributing to the delinquency or dependency of minors.

Hopkins had been charged in a 27-point bill of particulars with mistreating students in his care. A six-man jury in Justice of the Peace William Hoar's court ordered Hopkins to pay a \$500 fine and court costs. Hopkins' wife, Lenore, was acquitted of the same charge.

Hopkins was freed on his personal recognizance. His attorney gave notice of appeal.

Witnesses during the two-day trial testified Hopkins ordered cadets to punish other students by hitting them or throwing water on them.

Other witnesses said Hopkins drank intoxicants during school hours and permitted students to use a swimming pool for daily baths. A King County sanitarian testified the pool was not safe for swimming because of algae growth.

Hopkins also faces trial on a charge of second degree and third degree assault. Mrs. Hopkins is charged with third degree assault.

Red Chinese Shell Quemoy

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — The Chinese Communists fired 227 rounds at the Quemoy Islands Tuesday night. Then the guns lapsed into silence for the cease-fire the Reds observe on even-numbered days of the month.

The volume of fire was the second highest of the month. On Oct. 9 the Communists hit the islands 235 times.

Yanks, Reds In Accord On Disarm Resolution

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — U.N. diplomats anticipate the East-West disarmament talks early next year will at least start harmoniously following agreement Tuesday night by the United States and the Soviet Union on a non-committal disarmament resolution for the General Assembly.

After a week of concentrated bargaining, the two big powers agreed to join in sponsoring a resolution referring all disarmament proposals to the new 10-nation committee that will begin negotiations in Geneva in February.

The resolution endorses no specific plan, a victory for the Americans. Originally the Soviets had demanded that it give specific approval to Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's proposal for complete disarmament over a four-year period.

The resolution is similar to one the U.S.S.R. and the Western powers sponsored together in January 1957. That one referred all then pending disarmament proposals to a five-nation subcommittee. Nothing came of the group's negotiations, and the Soviet Union ultimately boycotted it because she was outvoted by the Western members. After three years, the Communists now will get parity in numbers on the new committee.

The new resolution will be submitted to the Assembly Political Committee and then to the Assembly itself. Speedy approval is expected so the Assembly can finish with disarmament for this session and turn its attention to other issues.

In its final form, the resolution

addresses the need for complete and general disarmament under effective international control and calls the question "the most important one facing the world today."

This in effect repeats the Camp David communique by President Eisenhower and Khrushchev at the windup of their talks last month.

Main points in the operative part of the resolution include:

1. A call on governments to make every effort to achieve a constructive solution of the arms issue.

2. A request that Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold furnish the Geneva parley the arms plans put before the Assembly by British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd and Khrushchev as well as other proposals and suggestions that have been made in the current U.N. disarmament debate.

3. An expression of hope that measures "leading toward the goal of general and complete disarmament under effective international control will be worked out in detail and agreed upon in the shortest possible time."

Despite Soviet-American agreement on the resolution, debate in the political committee underlined that the West and Soviet Union are still far from agreement on the key issue of control machinery to insure compliance with disarmament.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Vasily D. Kuznetsov said the scope of control at each stage of disarmament should correspond with the scope and nature of the disarmament measure being carried.
