Pelicans Confident Of Last Game Win

The Klamath Union Pelicans headed across the Green Springs at 3 o'clock this afternoon for the last trip of the 1959 prep football season. They meet the Crater Comets tonight at 8 o'clock on the Central Point grid, confident of a victory that will wrap up a successful season.

The Pels hold a 3-won, 3-lost, 1-tied mark to date, the best of numerous recent KU seasons. A win tonight also credits the Whitebirds with a 2-2 Southern Oregon Conference season.

The Central Pointers, led by coach Len Warren, figure to give the Pelicans all the football they want. The Comets were dropped 26-13 by the Grants Pass-Cavemen last weekend after holding a half-time lead. According to Valley reports the Comets are determined to get even with the Pelicans for the defeat.

Tonight's game marks the final action for 12 Pelican seniors, all of whom have vowed to "quit" on the upheaval.

Linebackers, all of whom will see action tonight either on the offensive or defensive platoon, making their final appearance under the Red and White, include co-captains end Larry Banyard, and tackle Nick Insley, center Rich Moore, standout guard John Hancock, ends Estlin Kiger and Jim Parks, and Corky Kajowski and Ray Sessler, both defensemen.

In the backfield, "seniors who will be missed" according to coach Bob Williams, are halfbacks Blake Griggs and Ron Olivera, fullback

The No. 1 team in the Associated Press poll, Medford, meets Ashland and a victory would guarantee the Black Tornado a tie in District 6.

Marshfield, the No. 3 team in the poll, could clinch a District 5 tie by defeating Springfield.

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Oregon Collegiate Conference Title Could Become Owl Prize Saturday

The Oregon Tech Owls put the final touches to their plans, this afternoon, for blasting their way into undisputed possession of the Oregon Collegiate Conference championship for 1959. The Owls, unbeaten in conference action to date, tackle the eager Oregon College Wolves (6-3) on Modoc Field Saturday night at 8 o'clock in an OCC feature that should return the crown to the Mile High Campus.

In 1959 the Techmen raced through their league foe to the same heights but were knocked off their lofty perch by an ineligibility technicality. This year the Owls seem destined to capture it again.

OTI athletic director and head football coach, Rex Hunsaker, however, had a word of warning for his enthusiastic gridders, "OCE will be gunning for us... we aren't going to have an easy time."

Cougars Rate Edge Over OSC

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Washington State University and Oregon State College Saturday renew a football rivalry here that has been going since 1903.

Washington State rated a slight edge with the experts, but Oregon State will be playing before a homecoming crowd expected to number near 20,000.

A fast field also will create a favorable atmosphere for a flurry of aerials the two teams are expected to throw.

Coach Jim Sutherland of Washington State brings one of the top pass catchers in the nation in end Gail Cogdill.

Halfback Keith Lincoln heads a veteran backfield in the Washington State T-formation offense.

The key tailback slot in Coach Tommy Prothro's single wing will be in the hands of veteran Dainard Paulson, among the nation's top punters last year.

Larry Sanchez, Don Kasso and Earl Harbin probably all will play at the tailback slot.

Harbin is rated the best passer, although Kasso showed he can throw as Oregon State last week defeated California 24-20.

Washington State last week turned in a stellar defensive performance as the Cougars trounced Idaho 27-5.

When the two teams met last year, Washington State nipped Oregon State 7-0 at Pullman, Wash.

The game is the feature, also, of the Owl Homecoming weekend. One of the largest crowds of the season is expected at Modoc to witness the all-important contest.

Coach Bill MacArthur and his OCE club are expected to arrive here at about 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon, just in time to get in warmup work prior to the game.

The Owl attack will be led by a quartet which has been named as probable Little All-America selections. Quarterback Roy Johnson holds the OCC top-passer slot, end safely Allen Leach holds the conference scoring lead, fullback Stan Glass tops the OCC ground gainers, and bothway guard Frank Wil-

son is rated the most efficient lineman of the loop.

Halfback L. T. Tennerson, although rated No. 5 among the league rushers in total yardage, has averaged a 5.2 per carry to lead the percentage statistics.

The other halfback, little Charlie Wilson, who has been sidelined with injuries for a part of the season has a 3.6 per carry to his credit.

The Techmen lead the conference in both team rushing and total offense and are a close second in passing statistics. They have collected 1101 on the ground and 498 yards in the air for 1465 overall. This compares to 1301 yards for their nearest competition, the Southern Oregon College Raiders.

The Wolves are the bottom men in overall yardage, passing, and next to last in rushing statistics.

Dewey Soriano PCL Choice For Leader

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—Pacific Coast League baseball directors ended their fall meeting here Thursday night after picking a new president, adding a new team, starting work on the 1960 schedule and favoring some type of trans-Pacific little world series.

In one of Thursday night's final sessions of the one-day meeting, the directors agreed on a 154-game schedule for 1960—same as last year—beginning April 15 and ending Sept. 11. They blocked out the first month of the schedule and put off work on the rest until later meetings.

Tentatively approved for opening-day games were Vancouver at Sacramento, Spokane at Salt Lake, Seattle at San Diego and Portland at Tacoma—the loop's new member club.

Dewey Soriano was unanimous choice to replace Leslie O'Connor as PCL president. O'Connor stayed on as head man through the 1959 season despite a directors' rebellion against his leadership.

Soriano indicated the league's headquarters, now in Phoenix, Ariz., probably will be moved to Seattle, where he has an office.

The directors Thursday speedily approved a transfer of the Phoenix Giants' franchise to Tacoma. Phoenix dropped from the PCL after two poor attendance years.

The directors voted to set up a committee to study the possibility of a Pacific little world series between PCL teams and those of Japan or Hawaii and the Philippine Islands. The idea was suggested by Japanese baseball leaders.

LSU, 'Ole Miss' Top Goblin Day Contests

Mississippi, without costume or mask, comes to Louisiana State's home Halloween night with its trick or treat bag full of gimmicks that may decide the mythical national title.

The game at Baton Rouge, La., is the biggest game of the year and tops a weekend card that begins tonight with a handful of games, and continues Saturday afternoon with the beginning of a new service rivalry when the Air Force Academy travels to New York to meet Army.

Tonight, Kentucky meets Miami (Fla.) (3-2) in the Orange Bowl, in an inter-sectional game. The Wildcats (1-5) have felt the wrath of both LSU and Ole Miss, losing 9-0 and 16-0, respectively, for the only comparative scores between the nation's No. 1 and 3 ranked teams.

But none can touch the LSU-Mississippi game, billed as a contest for the Southeastern Conference crown and the Sugar Bowl spot. Miss has been on the outside looking in after losing 14-0 to LSU last year.

Ole Miss has the statistical edge with its No. 3 ranking nationally in offense and defense. LSU is second defensively, but will dare the Rebels to stop its three first units. Mississippi is a one-point underdog.

The Army-Air Force game pits two unranked teams but still has sold out Yankee Stadium for six weeks. A crowd of around 70,000 will watch the expected passing battle between Joe Caldwell of Army (3-2) and Richie Mayo of the Air Force (4-1). The game will be televised regionally.

Also Saturday, Northwestern (6-0), ranked second, has a Big Ten battle with Indiana (3-2), while 10th-ranked Wisconsin (4-1)
