

Huskies To Invade Coliseum

Washington's Huskies invade Los Angeles Saturday morning to do something they haven't done since 1940—beat UCLA in the Coliseum.

Should they do it, the Huskies from Seattle become the No. 1 choice to win the Rose Bowl assignment. Last week they knocked off previously undefeated Oregon 13-12.

Washington has added strength in the quarterback department for its attack against the Uclans. Bob Hivner, the No. 1 signal caller until he broke a finger in the Huskies' opener, will be back to help Bob Schlorer who took over his job and will be tough to dislodge.

Coach Bill Barnes of UCLA announced that Bob Smith, one of the standouts in last week's 20-7 loss to the Air Force, will start at tailback in the single wing formation in place of veteran Bill Kilmer.

Victory for UCLA would push the Bruins into the top spot in the Rose Bowl parade since Southern California is ineligible because of NCAA sanctions. Also UCLA does not meet Oregon.

Southern California, with a powerful line and host of fleet backs, rates the solid favorite over California which has lost five in a row. In addition the Bears lost first string left halfback Grover Garvin who suffered a bruised kidney last week as Oregon State beat the Bears 24-20.

Oregon, which can't be counted out of the Rose Bowl picture, also ranks as an overpowering favorite against Idaho, which in some years has proved a tough foe.

Oregon State worked on defense against Washington State passing since the Cougars have both quarterback Mike Agee and halfback Keith Lincoln who can throw with telling effect. Coach Tommy Prothro also worked hard his tailback corps, Larry Sanchez, Dainard Paulson and Don Kasso on both running and passing.

UO Fresh Narrowly Top Rooks

PORTLAND (AP)—An offensive encounter between two of the best freshmen teams in Oregon collegiate history resulted in a 38-34 victory for the Oregon Frosh over the Oregon Rooks here Thursday night.

The Frosh, faced with an offense they knew would be hard to stop, went the Rooks one better with a rugged offense led by former Springfield High School ace Duane Cargill.

Cargill, the fullback for the Frosh, carried 43 times, scored 4 touchdowns and hit the line 7 of 9 times in the final Frosh drive that led to victory.

The 195-pound fullback, running out of a T, gained 172 yards in his 43 carries, exactly half of the total plays of the Ducks.

Oregon's Frosh played for the breaks and they got them. End Ron Snidow recovered a fumble on the OSC 39, which led to the final touchdown.

Cargill, running behind the hard charging Frosh line, played forward for gains of five, seven, four, two, eight, four and finally two yards to paydirt and the victory. Only 2 minutes and 37 seconds remained in the game.

The 5,312 spectators rose to their feet as Oregon State fullback Ladd Horn of Pendleton broke loose over the right side and raced 60 yards to score on the opening play of the game.

Trap Shooters Get New Club

CHILOQUIN — The first trap shooting in this area will be held Sunday, November 1, when a public merchandise shoot will be held beginning at 10 o'clock. The Chilquin Volunteer Firemen are sponsoring a city owned trap shooting club which has been built on the south end of the airport site.

BATON ROUGE, La. (UPI) — The day before the big game is a carker.

Today a lady called and told my secretary that it was absolutely urgent that she talk with me. Although I didn't recognize her name, I answered her call and found out that it was absolutely imperative that she acquire some tickets for the Ole Miss game.

As patiently as possible I explained that the tickets to the game had been sold out since July and that I had none.

On Monday of this week, I told the listeners on the Monday Quarterback Club (my weekly half hour TV show) that the coaching staff had no tickets whatsoever and that I needed some myself—but this lady didn't believe me.

Fan Makes Offer

One very helpful fan called and offered me two tickets on the 35-yard line for the same price he paid for them—\$70.

This week, I received in the mail hundreds of letters with trick plays, ideas, psychological gimmicks and suggestions as to how to win the game Saturday.

With the exception of the position of tackle, it was suggested that I play Billy Cannon at every position on the squad other than halfback. (We're satisfied with his performance at left halfback).

And what a flock of plays have passed across my desk — some of them are quite good. What a tremendous volume of football plays the entirety would make. Some of the play suggestions probably are quite good—at least very unusual. (After the season I'll have a chance to study them).

A student group from Mississippi "reportedly" chartered an airplane and dropped some "anti-LSU" notes onto the LSU campus on Monday evening. A couple of "LSU students" (???) were reported to have been arrested in Oxford, Mississippi (the home of the University of Mississippi).

Usual Pre-Game Hoopla

However, it is the usual pre-game hoopla that accompanies a traditional game. Each year, this game seems to take on a more enveloping distinction. This year's Ole Miss squad is just what a

coach would depict if he were an artist.

They are very big with the speed and agility of small men. They have great scoring power, averaging around thirty points a game — but they have allowed only one touchdown in six games against their rugged defense. They rank first on offense and second on defense in the South-eastern Conference. Their running and throwing is the best we have encountered in my five years at LSU.

Unfriendly Rivals Set Sunday

BALTIMORE (AP) — There's more than the usual desire for victory in Sunday's National Football League game between the Baltimore Colts and Cleveland Browns.

Coaches Weeb Ewbank of the Colts and Paul Brown of the Browns have deep personal feelings for wanting to beat the other.

Neither has talked for publication about their lack of friendship. However, Ewbank has let it slip privately that the peeve was started by Brown.

That was in 1954 when Ewbank quit as Brown's assistant to become head coach of the Colts. Brown insisted that although Ewbank already was heading the Browns, he sit with the Browns during the annual draft of college players.

The first public sign of the break came in 1956, the first time the rival teams met after Ewbank became Colt director. The Colts won 21-7 in Cleveland and Brown passed up the formality of a congratulatory handshake with Ewbank.

Sunday's meeting will be the first since then because the Browns are in the Eastern Conference and the Colts in the Western.
