

Adlai Seen As Loser By Truman

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Former President Harry S. Truman sees Adlai Stevenson as a "loser" in the Democratic presidential nomination sweepstakes and is not sure that he doesn't get it, a political leader says.

Jack Matthews, Harris County Democratic Executive Committee secretary, said Thursday night the ex-chief executive told him as much during a Texas visit Oct. 18.

Truman refused to say whom he favors when questioned at a Dallas news conference. He conceded that Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson is a leading contender.

He also remarked, "Texans could wait until Missouri is heard from." Observers interpreted it as a plug for Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.), frequently mentioned as a possible nominee.

Matthews said that at a Dallas breakfast for Democratic leaders he was introduced to Truman as the president of the Texans-for-Stevenson club.

"He said, 'You're backing a loser,'" Matthews related. "And I said, 'No, I'm not.' Then he said to go ahead and I said, 'I certainly intend to.'"

Matthews said Truman continued: "You're going to get beat."

The Houston man said he inquired who would beat him and Truman replied, "Me." Then, he said, Truman told him he should support his state's favorite — son candidate.

NEW YORK (AP)—"I don't think we'd ever accept the Kaiser Steel Corp. union contract," Arthur Homer, president of Bethlehem Steel Corp., said Thursday.

Homer's comments were made at a news conference following issuance of a third-quarter operating report which disclosed two records. One was a record loss for any quarter and the other was a record backlog.

Elkins Trial Progress Told

PORTLAND (AP)—The burglary conspiracy trial of James B. Elkins entered the final day of its second week today after a parade of 16 witnesses and a flurry of legal arguments Thursday.

Many witnesses took the stand and scores of displays were introduced by the prosecution despite strong objections from Walter Evans Jr., defense attorney for Elkins.

One legal debate arose when city detectives said they obtained the personal effects of Harry Huerta, a co-defendant with Elkins, papers allegedly showing "soft spots" in a safe and a brace and bit advertisement.

Evans objected on the grounds the evidence was not tied directly to Elkins, a Portland gambler.

Circuit Judge Eugene K. Opnerheimer told the prosecution unless it provided the direct link "you could frame anybody under this theory," which he quickly added did not imply he thought Deputy Dist. Attorneys Julian Herndon Jr. and Dave Robinson were attempting to frame anyone.

"I think I've gone to great lengths of liberality, Mr. Herndon, in allowing the State to present its case," the judge said.

Robinson said most of the case will center on Huerta, adding that "we have more than association."

"It's facilitation," he said, "Elkins gave Huerta a place to stay, a place to sharpen his tools, and vehicles in which to ride."

Former Agent Gives Views

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—James C. White, 75, a law enforcement agent for 42 years, advocates a return to public whipping to straighten out youth gangs.

White, of Austin, is in Dallas for a conference of former FBI agents. He was with the FBI from 1924 to 1947. His career included fights with rum runners and the prewar battle in Florida in 1935 in which Kate (Ma) Barker and her son Fred were slain.

In an interview Thursday he said youngsters who cannot be straightened out need humiliating, not pampering.

"Kids need whipping at home and in public too. The old public whipping post ought to be used again. Nowadays, you have to raise children right or they'll grow up to be criminals," he said.

"Why, Baby Face Nelson was a car thief and rum runner when he started out at the age of 15 or 16, and before he was through, he killed three FBI agents."

Boy Gunned By Assailant

SEATTLE (AP)—A little boy was in critical condition and his mother in serious condition Friday after an assailant gunned them down on a street here Thursday night.

Noel Roby, 4½, was shot twice in the chest as his mother, wounded in the shoulder, watched helplessly.

Mrs. Ethel Roby, 24, told police she was shot as she entered her automobile after taking the boy to visit the home of his father, her estranged husband, John Roby, 61. The boy was shot as he attempted to run, she said.

Roby was being sought by police for questioning. According to police records, Roby was released from the State Penitentiary at Walla Walla on Oct. 10 after serving a 3½ year term for second degree assault.

Group To Mull Develop Plans

TULELAKE — National Park Service plans for development of the Lava Beds National Monument, south of here, will be reviewed by the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland Association, chambers of commerce and city and county officials of Modoc and Siskiyou counties.

Association president Carmen P. Fleming announced earlier this week that the group will meet at 9:30 a.m., Tuesday, November 3, at the Sportsman's Hotel, here in Tulelake, where they will get a briefing from Irvin D. Kerr, park superintendent. A tour of the Lava Beds will follow to get an "on the ground" view of the proposed improvements.

The Shasta-Cascade Wonderland

Association, which is sponsoring the meeting, has expressed concern on road relocations, which may eliminate several access routes from Modoc County and northeastern Siskiyou County.

The proposed improvements to be undertaken are outlined in the 10 year "Mission 66" program developed by the National Park Service. The public is invited to attend.

Red Chinese Peril Peace, Say Experts

Communist China's activities may be creating a solid anti-Communist front in South Asia and raising a threat to the unity of the world Communist movement.

These developments tend to support a conviction which is growing among qualified observers: that the main threat to global peace today is Red China.

The Red Chinese activities can eventually become a severe headache to the Soviet Union's leadership and to the main body of the world Communist movement, which still takes orders from Moscow.

Already the Red Chinese have contributed to a sudden thaw in a long and bitter cold war between

India and Pakistan, who had been feuding over a number of stubborn issues for about 12 years.

Talk is heard in New Delhi and Karachi of an all-round reconciliation between the two nations. There is even speculation about common defense measures by the two countries. Possibly Burma, also feeling the Red Chinese threat, will join her South Asian neighbors in such an enterprise.

The Chinese subjugation of Tibet and their intrusions into territory occupied by India have caused South Asians to regard with some nervousness their hungry neighbor to the north, whose 600 million people have the Red nation bursting at the seams.

India's Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru and Pakistan's strong-
