# Arab Nations Deny Backing

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Two Arab countries have refused to cosponsor the resolution accepting the Ford Foundation's gift of six million dollars for a new U.N. library.

The reason: Israel is also sponsoring the resolution. Iraq and the United Arab Republic originally sponsored the resolution along with 44 other countries. Then Israel signed up, and the two Arab states quietly withdrew their names.

Although they still consider themselves at war with Israel, the Arab did not make an issue of the Israeli sponsorship. Apparently they did not want to anger the Ford Foundation, a potential source of economic help.

The U.N. Assembly's Finance Committee approved the resolution unanimously Thursday and sent it to the Assembly for final approval. The library will replace a frame structure at the south end of U.N. headquarters here in New York.

# Dedication Rites Held

# Depression To Be Filmed

CLEVELAND, Tenn. (AP)—In a how to public opinion, 20th Century-Fox plans to retake depression scenes filmed at nearby Charleston.

The movie, not yet named, depicts early days in the development of the Tennessee Valley Authority.

# Rocket Lag Said Blessing

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—The chief of the Air Force Research and Development Command thinks the delay by this country in building a big rocket may have been a blessing of sorts.

Lt. Gen. Bernard Schriever told a civic club Thursday the Soviet Union at the end of World War II began concentrating on a powerful rocket capable of throwing heavy loads into space—such as the one which boosted the first Sputnik.

"In the United States we waited until 1954 to begin intensive development of lighter warheads which showed it was not necessary to build such a rocket."

"This is the reason why our rocket payloads are smaller, though no less efficient, than those of the Soviets. So the delay of 10 years could be considered an advantage," Schriever said.

# Liner, Freighter Collide; Crewman Reported Lost

NEW YORK (AP)—The liner Israel and a freighter collided Thursday night in clear weather north of the Statue of Liberty. One crewman of the Israel was reported missing.

The Coast Guard said the 264 passengers aboard the Israel, towed to Todd Shipyards in Brooklyn, remained on the 9,831-ton ship overnight. Although some passengers were shaken up, no serious injuries were reported.

The accident, which occurred shortly after 8 p.m. during 10-mile visibility off Bedloe's Island, was the third collision this year of ocean-going vessels in the New York Harbor area. Bedloe's Island lies across the harbor from the lower tip of Manhattan.

The 8,277-ton freighter, American Press, with two gaping holes in her prow, was towed safely to a Hudson River pier. No one aboard was hurt.

The Israel, hit amidship on its portside, suffered damage extending from the boat deck to the water line. The Coast Guard said the vessel took on a negligible amount of water.

The cause of the crash was not immediately determined. Much of the ship traffic moving into and out of the Brooklyn piers must cross traffic in the channel moving up the Hudson River from the upper bay.

An all-night search was being conducted for the missing crewman, Anthony Benitis of Haifa, Israel. He last was seen on deck repairing a ladder and apparently fell overboard in the collision.

The freighter carried a crew of about 50. The skipper, Capt. George Vickers, 57, of Baltimore, Md., told newsmen: "I was on the bridge at the time. The weather was very good—very clear. The impact was not heavy."

Israel and was assured it needed no immediate assistance. Both vessels were proceeding from docks in Brooklyn, but the Israel was southbound for the open sea and the American Press was headed for a North River, Manhattan pier.
