PITTSBURGH, Pa. (AP)—The Metals companies similar to the Aluminum Co. of America and the agreement with Alcoa. United Steelworkers have agreed to extend their contract indefinitely. It was learned by The Associated Press.

It was also learned Wednesday night that the USW is considering plans to extend contracts with the Kaiser Aluminum and Reynolds Alcoa's contract with the steel-

workers expired last July 31. At that time, both sides agreed to extend the contract to Nov. 1 or 30 days after the end of the basic steel strike, whichever came first.
