WEED (Special)—Coach Mort Kaer's mighty Weed Cougars wrapped up the 1959 Shasta-Cascade football title by crushing highly-touted Dunsmuir, 24-6, here Friday night.

For the unbeaten Cougars and once-beaten Tigers, the game put the lid on the '59 season in Northern California.

The visitors were held to a lone touchdown, that in the last quarter on a seven-yard run by ace halfback Roger Grant, while the powerful host team rocked the Tigged defense for all of its points in the first half.

Cougar halfback Curtis Jones paced the landslide win by scoring three times on line runs of two, two and 10 yards. Halfback Frank Montgomery and fullback Roger Pauletto tallied the other two winners' six-pointers. Montgomery's on an eight-yard run and Pauletto's on a four-yard line smash.

Cougar Jim Lemos continued his phenomenal place kicking for the league champs, booting four of five for the winners.

A 32-yard scamper of a recovered fumble by Jones and a 43-yard pass play from quarterback Bob Zalunardo to end Doug Blanks set up the first two Cougar TDs while two fumbles and an intercepted pass paved the way for the other three.

In other Friday league action, Trinity, behind the 14-point scoring effort by halfback Rick Hunt, scored a 26-0 over Fall River while Saturday Hayfork and McCloud battled to a 13-13 tie.

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP)—War Admiral, the great thoroughbred who met his match in a two-horse race against Seabiscuit 21 years ago Sunday, is dead.

The 25-year-old son of Man O' War died Friday at Hamburg Place here after a two-day illness. No cause of death was announced.

It was Nov. 1, 1938, when War Admiral, voted the previous season's "horse of the year," took on Seabiscuit in the \$15,000 Pimlico Special.

Norman Leads Stanford Win

STANFORD, Calif. (AP)—Stanford's Dick Norman, shooting for collegiate passing honors, pitched the Indians to a 54-33 victory over San Jose State Saturday in a football game practically devoid of defense.

Norman is a 6 foot 2 junior quarterback. He connected in the first half alone for 6 of 12 for 130 yards. He hit on 12 of 22 for 261 yards overall.

Second baseman Bobby Richardson of the Yankees not only led the team in hitting with 301 but hit safely in 46 last 19 games.

Hoggarth Powers Chiloquin

TULELAKE (Special)—Chiloquin fullback Ron Hoggarth closed out his high school grid career by powering his way for four touchdowns and two conversions to lead the Panthers to a 39-6 win over Tulelake at the fairgrounds stadium here Friday night.

Winning coach Gordon Kuid, who cleaned his bench in the landslide, said of Hoggarth, "He's a real good runner, especially up the middle as well as around the ends. We'll sure miss him."

Losing mentor George Hanson noted, "Hoggarth is, in my opinion, the most consistent runner in the county. He's really great."

The win was the second of the season in seven decisions for Chiloquin while the loss was the fourth straight in league play for the Honkers. Tule has one conference game remaining, that against Merrill next weekend.

The 26 points scored by Hoggarth gave him a league total of 67, second best in the league. "Hoggy" scored on line smashes of three, four, four and 10 yards and tallied the two PATs through the line.

After the 185-pound senior got the ball rolling for the visitors with a three-yard scoring plunge early in the first period, Hanson's Honkers tallied their only TD of the night, a two-yard scoring drive by quarterback Bob Osborne.

But Hoggarth & Co. went to work, the Panthers piling up 13 points in each the second and third frames, and adding seven more in the last period.

Panther tailback Hubert LeBeau scored the fifth Chiloquin TD late in the third quarter on a three-yard run while wingback John Ochoa tallied the final Panther six points on a 50-yard pass play from Hoggarth.

"Our line looked good at times," said Kuid following the game, "but our backs ran real well Ochoa and end Lyle Hall looked good for us on defense."

SC Rallies For Triumph Over Bears

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—Surprised by rugged California defenses, the Southern California Trojans rallied for a final-period touchdown Saturday, beat the Bears 14-7 and remained undefeated and untied.

Underdog California capitalized on a third-quarter fumble to take a 7-0 lead over the highly favored Trojans in this Big Five Conference battle.

But after quarterback Willie Wood returned the ensuing kickoff 30 yards to the Trojans' 48, USC marched down the field and Wood scored the winning touchdown on a seven-yard end run. Angelo Coia ran over the conversion.

Southern California scored first on a 65-yard screen pass play Conroy. The conversion failed on a fumbled pass from center.

Three times in the opening half, the California defense turned back Trojan drives—at the 15, 29 and 1.

In the third quarter USC quarterback Al Prokop fumbled at his 35. Cal guard Pete Domoto grabbed the ball before it hit the ground and ran to the 7 before he was tackled by halfback Lynn Gaskill. Three plays later, Jerry Seattini scored from the 1. Fullback Billy Patto booted the conversion.

Baltimore, NY Head NFL Play

If the Baltimore Colts and New York Giants would like a rematch of their 1958 championship pro football game, Sunday's the day they can get out and block for each other.

The Colts, who edged the Giants 23-17 in sudden death overtime last December, are home to the Cleveland Browns, while Green Bay visits New York.

New York again leads the National Football League's Eastern Conference with a 4-1 record. The Colts, also 4-1, are tied with the San Francisco 49ers for the Western Conference lead.

But just a game back in the East is tough Cleveland. And a game off the pace in the West is surprising Green Bay.

So victories by both the Giants and Colts not only would strengthen their own positions, but would help lessen the pressure on each other.

The Colts are favored by 7½ points, the Giants by 7.

All the other games on the day's schedule are intraconference. In the West Los Angeles is a 6½-point home favorite over the Chicago Bears, and the 49ers rate 7 better than the visiting Detroit Lions. Los Angeles (2-3) is in fourth place, while the Lions and Bears share the cellar with 1-4 marks.

In the East, the Pittsburgh Steelers are 3½-point road favorites over the Chicago Cardinals, and Philadelphia Eagles, at home, are figured to beat the Washington Redskins by 7. The Eagles (3-2) are third in the East, followed by Pittsburgh and Washington (both 2-3) and the Cards (1-4).

MADRAS (Special)—The 1959 version of the Lakeview Honkers walked off with the Greater Oregon Conference Western Division title and a berth in the District 7-A-2 playoff with top-rated Vale next weekend as they rolled to a 14-7 "must" win over the White Buffaloes here Friday night.

In winning the Western crown for the second year in a row, Lakeview coach Howard Hopper said of his team, "The boys, especially our line, played a great game. They were determined to win and the defense should get all the credit."

The Buffalo eleven almost tied the game in the waning seconds as they drove to the Lakeview one-yard line. But a stubborn Honker defense held tight and forced the home team to fumble with only 20 seconds left in the test.

After the home team ran up a 7-0 lead on a three-yard run by halfback Gary Moe in the first period, Hopper's crew put the game in the bag with solo TDs in the second and third frames. Nullified by penalties were another two Honker TDs, one a 70-yard return of an intercepted pass by end Frank "Pinky" Eggenhoff in the first quarter, and a 45-yard punt by halfback Jerry Parkinson in the second.

Eggenhoff temporarily stalled the Madras scoring drive with the interception but the spectacular run was called back. Another penalty and a reverse moved the ball to the three from where Moe

rammed over. The point-after was marked up when quarterback Butch Joseph hit end Ken Stewart with a short pass.

Parkinson put the Honkers back in contention with a 28-yard scoring sprint early in the second stanza and fullback Dennis Barry plunged over for the conversion.

Parkinson then took off on his TD scamper which was called back on a personal foul.

Honker halfback Mike Deming gave the visitors their winning margin in the third when he capped a long drive by scoring from 35 yards out on an end run. Barry dove for the PAT but the play was nullified on a penalty. This time Deming raced around end of the conversion.
