T. J. O'Harra, Richfield Oil Corp. distributor for Klamath area, has awarded construction contract to **Duncan Bros.**, Bend, on the firm's low bid of approximately \$30,000 to build a brand new type service station at Boardman and Altamont for O'Harra as owner . . . he will engage an operator for the station upon completion. . . Duncan Bros. will also build two new service stations for Richfield Oil Corp. . . one to cost about \$40,000 at the corner of Biehn and Oregon Ave., to be the same size as O'Harra's station, 30 x 40 foot ground area for the building . . . and the other near the North Entrance to cost approximately \$100,000. . . Duncan Bros. were low bidders among a selected list of general contractors from whom bids were invited. . . Richfield received a total of five bids including bids from **Brostehaus Construction Co.**, and **DeWitt & Burke**, both of Klamath Falls. . . **Asphalt Paving Co.** has completed excavation at Boardman and Altamont and crews are working at Biehn and Oregon . . . in addition, the company will do much of the total paving. . . O'Harra reports attending a Richfield meeting at Portland at which **H. B. Douglas**, North Division Mgr., expressed confidence in the continuing fast growth of the Klamath Basin which was prompting Richfield to expand its building program in this area . . . "to provide the finest retail facilities available anywhere."

Plans for a new field house at KUHS are to be completed probably this week, by **Morrison & Howard**, architects, 203-05 Williams Bldg., and bids will be invited as soon as plans are approved by the board . . . the 136-foot by 84-foot pumice block building will incorporate existing natatorium as center section . . . radiant floor heat planned and the contract will include installation of new filtering plant to bring the building up to Grade A health standards.

Warren H. Parr, general contractor, 1830 Hawthorn, is building a new 1450-square foot residence, with full basement, in 400 block on Dahlia St. for Mr. and Mrs. **Wesley Ezell**, 112 High St. . . Parr is also building two other homes on Dahlia for resale . . . and has the contract for construction of a new home in Merrill for **Robert Graves**, manager of the telephone company at Merrill . . . also for Mr. and Mrs. **Curtis Seinhalter** a new residence at 897 Lakeshore Drive, Klamath Falls . . . the latter home will incorporate the use of "Oregon Rainbow Rock" found mostly around Madras and Maupin . . . special rock to be used for facing and for construction of an extensive planter as demonstrator at the nursery site.

Completion of plans by **Morrison & Howard**, architects, Williams Bldg., on the new Lucile O'Neill school are waiting for the completion of the hot water well which will provide heat for the new structure.

Consolidated Freightways has purchased over \$12 million of new highway equipment since July 1 of this year, CF president **J.L.S. Sneed, Jr.**, announces . . . the new equipment includes 360 trucks and tractors, 724 trailers for dry freight and 209 insulated, refrigerated trailers for perishable cargo . . . in addition, CF recently ordered \$1.5 million worth of containers to be used interchangeably on trucks and ships.

Pacific Trailways (Oregon) owned bus system with headquarters at Bend) again has been awarded national honors for outstanding driver safety performance from July, 1958 through June, 1959 . . . during that period, Pacific Trailways' drivers operated over three million bus miles with less than one vehicle incident for every 300,000 miles . . . National Safety Council rules consider any incident causing even a one-inch scratch on a bus as an accident . . . this award, received Thursday in connection with the 47th National Safety Congress & Exposition in Chicago, follows the first place award won for the year which ended June 30, 1958. . . **William Niskanen**, vice president and general manager, in accepting the honor for his organization, stated that bus travel as a whole showed a 30 per cent improvement over last year in vehicle incidents per miles of operation.

On Nov. 13 and 14, the state's first Sheep & Wool Days program will be held at Oregon State College, according to Dr. D. C. Church, animal husbandman at the OSC agricultural experiment station, Corvallis . . . participants will view research being done at OSC on lamb feeding and Hampshire breeding. . . **G. Alvin Carpenter**, livestock marketing specialist at the University of California, will speak on producer problems in lamb grading and marketing the first day . . . there will be an impressive list of speakers and demonstrations at the meeting.

A reduction of up to 10 per cent in purchase rates for new group pension plans is announced by **Ed Day**, vice president in charge of western operations for Prudential Insurance Co., Los Angeles . . . at the same time, the company announces it will increase its guaranteed interest rate to four per cent on some of its new pension contracts. . . "Liberalizations have also been made in contract provisions," Day said . . . "made possible by the 1959 federal tax revisions which reduced income tax on pension fund reserves, and by higher investment yields."

Hound Dog Shot Works

EGLIN AIR FORCE BASE, Fla. (AP)—A GAM-77 Hound Dog air-to-surface missile was launched from under the wing of a B52 Stratofortress Friday night and made a successful flight.

The self-guided flight, the first for a Hound Dog, took it to a predetermined spot hundreds of miles off Florida's East Coast.

The long-range missile was guided by its self-contained inertial navigation system, which the Air Force said was foolproof against radar jamming.

The Stratofortress left Eglin for the test, carried out under direction of the Air Research and Development Command.

The capabilities of the 51-foot, supersonic Hound Dog have not been announced.
