SM tied the count at 7-7 as Dick Evans sliced over from nine-yards out minutes later, sure-toed Terry Cooper splitting the uprights for the conversion.

Coach Al Fairchild's Huskies took a 13-7 margin late in the period as Salvadori hit speedy halfback Bill Beasley with a 21-yard aerial in the end zone. Haskins' kick for the PAT was low and wide.

St. Mary's 20-point second quarter got rolling when Bob Evans rolled over on an option from the 11, Cooper's boot once again tying the score at 13 all.

Bob tallied again minutes later on a one-yard sneak to cap a 45-yard scoring drive. Again Cooper's kick was good and SM led, 20-13.

Patterson powered over from three yards out to highlight a 40-yard scoring march by the Huskies following the ensuing kickoff. Rucky Wilson put the count at 20-20 with the PAT hook and the rest was up to the Crusaders.

## Webfoots Clobber Vandals

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) — The Oregon Ducks turned a close game into a rout with four third-period touchdowns Saturday and went on to crush outmanned Idaho 45-7.

Oregon fell behind 7-0 in the opening period and the Vandals threatened to score again before the Ducks regained their poise with two long scoring marches and a slim 12-8 halftime advantage.

Then quarterback Dave Grosz and the speedy Oregon backs got hot and the Webfoots ran wild.

Thus, the Ducks stayed in the race for the Rose Bowl and Idaho moved farther down the road toward its worst season in more than 60 years of intercollegiate football.

The Vandals have now taken eight straight thumpings and have tough Utah and College of the Pacific still to come. They could avoid a shutout in the final game against Montana here.

The 6,500 Homecoming Day fans who turned out to see the Vandals in Moscow for the first time this year got their thrills early.

Quarterback Gary Farnworth ran smartly on the roll out and mixed in passes nicely to send the Vandals ahead in the first five minutes. Farnworth, who got running help from Mike Sheeran on the drive, scored from the eight and Ron Ismael converted.

Idaho almost scored again when Tom Dimovro recovered a Grosz fumble on the Oregon 42. Farnworth went for 29 yards but the threat fizzled. Ismael, who kicked a 45-yard field goal last week, missed one here from the 32.

The triumph, achieved with a fast 3:22 1-5 clocking over a dull track, also moved Sword Dancer into the No. 1 spot as the leading money winner of the year.

CORVALLIS (AP) — Washington State stopped cold Oregon State's mid-season surge and carried off a 14-0 victory in a football game between two Pacific Northwest independents here Saturday.

The Washington State defense gobbled up everything Oregon State tried. And Washington State unleashed its hard-running halfbacks for two touchdown drives.

Lincoln touched it off with a 33-yard punt return, and ate up more yardage in end sweeps in the 45-yard march.

Quarterback Mike Agee produced the first touchdown, however. When Lincoln hobbled a pitchout, Agee snatched up the bouncing ball and circled right end for nine yards and the score.

Lincoln was having a great day until he was injured midway through the third quarter. By that time, he had run for 119 yards from scrimmage.

He was taken from the game just after Washington State began another drive that eventually went 82 yards for the final score.

Halfback Perry Harper replaced Lincoln ably and accounted for the touchdown with a five-yard romp around right end.

Oregon State, which started the season miserably with four consecutive losses, had won its last two games, but could do nothing against the tough Washington State defense.

Oregon State got across the midfield stripe only once in the first half—and then just barely. In the second half, the home team moved into Washington State territory, but was thrown back every time.

## Cannon Leads LSU Triumph

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP)—All-America halfback Billy Cannon sprinted down the sidelines for an 89-yard touchdown run Saturday night as Louisiana State's national football champions stormed from behind to trim previously unbeaten Mississippi 7-3.

Cannon's almost incredible run came with 10 minutes remaining in the game and erased the 3-0 lead the Rebels hung on the scoreboard in the first period.

Mississippi tackle Bobby Khyat's 22-yard field goal had the Rebels in front until Cannon's blazing run sent the top-ranked Tigers ahead to stay.

Rebel quarterback Jake Gibbs boomed a punt 47 yards to Cannon on the LSU 11. Cannon flared across the field to the sidelines, slipped out of the grasp of three tacklers and zipped down the side lines for the game deciding score.

## Techmen Dump OCE Wolves 19-12 In Rugged Session

The 1959 Oregon Collegiate Conference championship became the property of the Oregon Tech Owls here Friday night but there was nothing easy about the manner in which they acquired it. The Techmen put on the crown only after getting past a ruggedly determined Oregon College eleven, 19-12, on Modoc Field.

The game was the climax to the Owl's Homecoming celebration and their sixth win of the season. The victory gave them a 4-0 mark for OCC action.

Coach Rex Hunsaker and his victorious ball team accepted the congratulations of OTI Director W. D. Purvine and a large crowd of Owl fans following the game. In 1958 the Techmen had picked up the same honor only to see it slip from their grasp when an eligibility technicality was ruled against them and they forfeited all their conference wins.

"This time it will stick," grinned Hunsaker.

The Owls had their work cut out for them in subduing the visiting Wolves. The OCE club, winless for the entire season, had evidently been saving themselves for an all out attempt to knock the Owls into nothing more than a tie for the title.

The Techmen pounded over for paydirt just eight plays into their second series of downs for an early 6-0 lead padded by the extra point. A fumbled kickoff just seconds later set up an easy Owl six-pointer that boosted the count to 13-0 at the first quarter gun.

From here on, however, the going got rough.

The Wolves bounced back and scored on a 41-yard pass play near the end of the second period and then punched over their second counter just four plays into the third when a behind the line of scrimmage pass interception paid off. In neither case was the try for point good.

The Techmen got away from the 13-12 score on a thrust spearheaded by Little All-America candidate Stan Glass, scoring in 12 plays on a march in the third that started on their own 46.

Glass, 185 pounds of Conference leading ground gainer, lived up to his reputation by carrying the ball 33 times for a total of 169 yards. Overall the Techmen outgained

the Wolves 246 net yards to 161 collecting 215 on the ground and 31 in the air. The OCE squad moved for 106 yards on the dirt and connected for 55 passing.

The Owls cracked the board in the first quarter after halfback Charlie Wilson recovered an OCE fumble on the enemy 26. Glass, Wilson and L. T. Tenenson accounted for 11 yards on the ground and quarterback Roy Johnson flipped an 18-yard pass to freshman end Dennis Farster good for

18 and then Glass plunged over from the three. Bud Maupin booted the extra point.

Five plays later, after Wolf Marren fumbled the OTI kickoff on his own 15 and defensive halfback Gary Honeycutt recovered, the Owls were in the promised land again, this time on a neat four-yard jump pass from Johnson to conference high scorer and Allen Leach. The try for point was blocked.

In the second period Slayton again was the goat as he fumbled a punt by Leach on his own 41. The Owls punched to within the OCE five before a 13-yard penalty and an intercepted pass by Jon Moberg gave the visitors the ball on their own 29.

A drive stalled on the Owl 33 when quarterback Rick Fulton tumbled and the Owls recovered again. The Owls lost the ball on downs, a couple of penalties offsetting a 33-yard spurt by Glass. The Wolves scored on the next play when Fulton faded and flipped a pass that was good to Bob Pannel, between two Owl defensemen, good for 41 yards and a touchdown. The try for point failed and the score read 13-6 and stayed that way until shortly after the third frame opened.

On the fourth play of the period Johnson was smothered behind the line of scrimmage and a desperation pass attempt ended up in the arms of OCE's Don Habel who scooted into the Owl end zone from the 33 yard marker. Again the try for point was bobbed and the count read 13-12 for the Owls.

Here the Owls settled into a grim march that featured three first downs, primarily the doing of Glass who capped the 54-yard drive with a seven-yard romp around right end for the final tally. Maupin's first shot at the try for point was blocked but a penalty gave him a second, which was also blocked.

A mid-field duel used up the balance of the game until, in the closing seconds, Leach intercepted a long pass from Fulton as the gun sounded.

The Owls wrap up the 1959 season next weekend with a trip to Caldwell, Idaho, for a non-conference clash with the powerful College of Idaho.

## Braves Bounce Jayvees

ALTURAS — Power-plus quarterback Tom Rice lead the way for the Alturas Modoc Union Braves as they stopped the visiting KU JVs 19-0 in the last encounter of the season for both teams here Saturday afternoon.

Rice, Alturas big gun, fired a pass into the arms of Jim Leong who ran for the first tally, and then clinched the game by shaking off driving Pelican tacklers and running 15 yards for the final TD.

Another spoiler for the JVs was big Wayne Russel, who intercepted two Pelican passes in the fourth quarter, running one to within 10 yards of paydirt.

The JVs, constantly battling to get back into the game, were hurt by an untimely penalty. Quarterback Sherm Allen smashed across from the 11 yard line early in the fourth quarter, only to have the play called back on a 15-yard offensive holding penalty.

Both squads were plagued by penalties, but the Braves' 265 total yards rushing to Klamath's 161 yards proved to be the deciding factor.

The "Young Pelicans" were inspired in the last few minutes of the game by the hard driving freshmen, who were moved up to the squad after completing their season.

Ending his first football season at KU, Coach Al Keck guided his team to a 3-win 4-loss season. Two of their losses came at the hands of these Alturas Modoc Union Braves. He was assisted by Don Herbig and student managers Jim Paynter, Tom Abernathy and Guy Nelson, trainer.

Alturas, a California school comparable in size to Oregon A-2 schools, has one of the most rugged clubs in Northern California. They ended their season with a 6-1 win-loss record, losing only to Lassen High School by the score of 13-6.

## Banquet Features Ex-49er

Gordie Soltau, a television personality only one year removed from service with the San Francisco 49ers, will be the featured guest and principal speaker when the Pelican Booster Club, a group of Klamath Union High backers, honors the 1959 Pelican football players at the annual banquet set for Wednesday, November 4, in the KU cafeteria at 6:30 p.m.

Soltau, one of the all-time high scorers in National Football League pro history, now performs weekly as the "color man" for telecasts of the 49er football games, both at home and on the road.

The 6-2, 195 pound place-kicking artist, Soltau, first came into the public eye as an All Big Ten end during the years 1948 and 1949, while in college at Minnesota. In addition to his football career Soltau lettered in basketball and hockey.

During his eight year tenure with the San Francisco pro eleven Soltau also captained the 49er basketball team, an aggregation good enough to give the Harlem Globetrotters a run for their money.

Upon his graduation from high school in Duluth, his home, the "Toe" enlisted in the U.S. Navy and became one of the original frogmen. He also served as a "Cloak and Dagger" expert with the OSS during his service career.

During his 49er career Soltau counted upwards of 600 points to become the sport's third all-time high scorer. In both 1952 and 1953 respectively.

His ability as a field-goal specialist obviously improved with age; he booted 9-15 tries in 1957 and 13-20 in 1956.

Soltau was obtained from Cleveland by the 49ers as a rookie in 1950 in what has been termed by club owners, "the best trade we ever made."

His admitted biggest personal thrill came in 1951 when he racked up 26 points in helping to defeat the Los Angeles Rams. He established a 49er record that still stands when he booted four successful field goals that assisted his squad toward a 33-30 win over the Rams in 1956.

Soltau is appearing as the feature of the Pelican honoring banquet through the arrangements of the Booster Club which is under the direction of president Harold Howard.

Tickets to the affair, a chicken dinner in addition to the movies of 49er highlights plus the talk by Soltau, are \$2 per person. They may be purchased through individual Pelican Booster Club members or at the usual downtown outlets.

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
