PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (UPI)—Would you like to wine and dine with 100 of the most powerful businessmen in America?

They gathered, with their wives, here at the well-appointed Del Monte Lodge for a three-day, secluded party which broke up Sunday when most of them flew back to the east coast by chartered jet.

The magnates were members

of what might be termed the most exclusive club in the country. It's called the Business Advisory Council of the U.S. Department of Commerce.

For practical purposes, to be a member, you must control around one billion dollars and be able to get along with others who do the same. A few men who deal merely in hundreds of millions were not invited by the group.

These one-hundred men have been estimated to control, one way or another, as much as 50 per cent of the nation's production.

The occasion for the party was a closed business session of the council. The members held two three-hour sessions and spent the rest of the time playing.

They did not look much different from any other group which keeps the crease in its trousers. Among the men, there were a few more vests, a few more rugged profiles, and a few more resonant voices than usual. Otherwise, they were indistinguishable from your local banker.

There were no dancing girls, no waiters in livery, and no flashiness of any kind.

Most men played the tortuous Pebble Beach golf links, and the rest played tennis. The women visited local gardens and took rides along the coast.

In the evenings, the group held cocktail parties and dinners without special decorations. The main banquet included a choice of steak or salmon and only one wine, rose.

Cocktail conversation swiftly turned to business, then to politics.

What were the tycoons like, otherwise?

Their average age was over 60. Their divorce rate less than the rest of the nation's. And their hard drink consumption set no records.

And how was the party?

Dull.

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—Assemblyman Charles W. Meyers (D-San Francisco) today announced the appointment of Assemblyman Edwin L. Z Berg (D-Sacramento) as chairman of an Assembly committee to investigate the State Employees Retirement System.

Two Missing In Accident

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Two young men swam to safety but two others were still missing after their 21-foot sloop was swamped in San Francisco Bay Sunday night.

One of the survivors struggled in the icy waters of the bay for four hours before reaching the Marin County side of the Golden Gate Bridge, where he climbed a 250-foot cliff to safety.

The man, 23-year-old Phillip Mannina, said he and Thomas Anderson, 23, started swimming toward shore for help after their sloop, B-B Doel, was swamped by heavy swells. The East Creek sale will bring the completion of the new road system across the South Warner Mountains from Likely to Eagleville. The Lava Burn sale will salvage over four million feet of timber killed in the Lava Fire of early August.
