NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market closed with an irregularly lower trend today despite selective strength. Trading was heavy in final dealings. The ticker tape was late.

Volume was estimated at 3,100,000 shares compared with 2,590,000 on Friday.

Gains and losses of fractions to about a point were shown by most key stocks but a few issues sported far ahead.

Goodyear advanced more than 1/2 on hopes of a stock split. A similar gain was made by City Products on talk of better earnings.

American Motors soared about 5 points, making another new high. Studebaker-Packard re-coupled about a point.

U. S. government bonds turned mixed.

New Air Rules May Improve Cuba Harmony

WASHINGTON (UPI) — U. S. officials hoped today that stiff new flight regulations would stop Cuban exiles from using Florida as a base for operations against Premier Fidel Castro's regime.

The regulations were put into effect by the Justice Department at the request of President Eisenhower in a move to improve relations with the Cuban government.

Castro is an angry attack on the United States, charged last week that American officials had contemplated the leader's "bombing" of Havana by planes flying from airfields in Florida.

A squad of 100 Immigration Service officers has been sent to Florida to enforce the new regulations. Immigration Commissioner Joseph M. Swing said they were equipped "with necessary planes, automobiles, communications and other equipment" to carry out the orders.

Swing said they were "being deployed throughout the almost 200 airports in Florida and are ready to institute continuous vigilance to prevent unauthorized flights from the United States to Cuba by persons whose departure would be prejudicial to the interests of the United States."

The FAA issued regulations requiring any persons operating a civil aircraft for flight into or over Cuba to file within an hour of departure a written flight plan disclosing the destination of the plane, the names of passengers, the names of crew and the nature of its cargo.

The regulation also requires that the plane must leave from a designated international airport. Flights were warned that they must abide by the laws of Cuba when they are in Cuban air space.

The FAA said persons filing a false flight plan would be subject to criminal prosecution. Failure to file a flight plan will subject violators to a possible penalty of \$1,000 and loss of certificate.

The Justice Department said a plane used to carry a person out of the United States contrary to the order of the secretary of state is subject to confiscation.

Send Letters, Ike Requests

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower today urged the public to flood Congress and his office with demands that America's economy be kept sound.

Eisenhower, warning against the dangers of inflation, called for the demonstration of support in an informal talk at a conference designed to promote economic growth and stabilize living costs.

He told the conference sponsors that one of the greatest helps to the President and Congress get in the handling of great problems is millions of letters and other communications from the public.

Eisenhower called on the sponsors to promote a flood of such communications in the interest of a sound dollar.

That, he added, would be "one of the greatest services you can accomplish for the United States of America."

Aide To Ike Gets New Job

WASHINGTON (AP) — Over the years, Livingston T. Merchant has acquired the reputation of a hard working civil servant on whom you can rely to get a job done.

Now it's paying off with his elevation to the No. 3 job in the State Department. President Eisenhower picked Merchant Saturday to become undersecretary for political affairs when Robert D. Murphy retires next month. He has been Murphy's deputy.

Merchant has been a top staff man at several recent international conferences. He stood out during the 1955 summit conference at Geneva where he generally was considered the man on whom Eisenhower and the late John Foster Dulles relied most for counsel.

Merchant started late in State Department service, but has few peers in all-around experience. A financier before entering government service during World War II, Merchant has had assignments covering Europe, the Far East and Canada.

A descendant of America's second secretary of the treasury, Oliver Wolcott, and of General William Floyd, signer of the Declaration of Independence, Merchant was born in New York City Oct. 22, 1903.

After graduating from Princeton University in 1926, Merchant had a career as an investment counselor and financier before joining the State Department in 1942. His first job there was assistant chief of the division of defense materials.

Castro Seeks Missing Major

HAVANA, Cuba (UPI) — The 100-plane search for Cuban army commander Maj. Camilo Cienfuegos continued today but speculation grew that he was involved in more than an ordinary plane crash.

Cienfuegos and two other men disappeared on a two-hour flight Wednesday night. There was no radio message after takeoff and no sign of wreckage has been found.

Premier Fidel Castro and members of his government are understood to be having the search on the possibilities that Cienfuegos either crashed in a deserted area and was killed or that he and the other two men are so badly injured that they cannot signal for help.

It was on this basis that they ordered the mass air search and asked U.S. Navy authorities to help.

But two other possibilities are being talked about here: That Cienfuegos has been kidnapped by anti-Castro forces or that he has flown to another country to ask for political asylum.

This line of speculation points out that Castro delayed announcing for 30 hours and that search announcements also appeared to the public to keep calm and ignore rumors.

Speculation that Cienfuegos, who fought next to Castro in the rebellion, might be seeking refuge in the United States was being brought forward only in the most guarded terms. Such an action would be a major blow to Castro, whose air force chief, Maj. Pedro Diaz Lanz, fled the country and now is heading the propaganda light against him.
