

# Grand Jury Of Klamath Returns 22 'True Bills'

The Klamath County Grand Jury charged with determining whether persons accused of crimes should be brought to trial, returned 22 true bills involving 22 persons in its report Tuesday afternoon.

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The jury had been in session four full days, hearing evidence presented by District Attorney Arthur A. Reddick and state's witnesses. One of the indictments returned by the jury was labeled secret. The jury also reported its finding that four bills were not true—meaning there will be no trial. The defendants were released.

**AMONG THE TRUE bills** were three indictments of first degree murder. Two of these were against Michael Joseph, a 52-year-old Lone Pine ranch hand accused of killing Okey Eugene Richards, 34, and Harry Deman, 36, on a ranch near Chiloquin September 20. The other first degree murder indictment was returned against Leonard Marvin Lugo, 21, accused of the pistol killing of Joseph Owen Martinez II, 26, in a downtown alley early August 31.

Another true bill was returned against John William Carswell, 22-year-old farmer accused of unlawful possession of narcotics. Carswell was arrested late October 1 by city police after an alleged sale of marijuana on a downtown street. His bond was raised from \$2,500 to \$5,000.

**ONE OF THE FOUR** not true bills involved William Seaberry, 23, who had been charged with raping a 22-year-old blonde he had driven home from a dance early last May 17. The charge was the first rape case brought before a grand jury in at least two years. Seaberry was released from jail immediately after the jury reported its findings to Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

Another not true bill involved Wilford Dean Hill, 21, Chiloquin, one of three persons accused of beating a Chiloquin visitor and stealing \$100 and a watch from his person before leaving him prostrate on the street. The grand

jury dismissed Hill, but returned indictments against his co-defendants, Leon Pearson, 33, and Cleo Williams, 31.

**HARRY WILLIAM OPIE**, 31, former secretary-treasurer of the Klamath Kurbstone Kowpokes, was indicted on a charge of embezzling approximately \$1,200 from the organization between March 1 and August 19.

### TRUE BILLS

Other indictments, which included one for attempted rape and four for contributing to the delinquency of a minor, were:

Attempted rape—William Christian, 49-year-old transient accused of attempting to rape a transient woman in a used car lot downtown October 26. Officers said the woman was badly beaten about the face.

Contributing to the delinquency of a minor—Frank G. Sutton, suburban grocery store operator, accused of making improper advances toward his own 7-year-old daughter.

Contributing—Lewis R. Heavilin, 29, charged with improper conduct with his 7-year-old stepdaughter. The charge was alleged November 20, 1957, but came to the attention of authorities only a month ago.

Contributing—Houston V. Brand, 34, accused of enticing an 11-year-old girl into his car and fondling her in late September.

Contributing—William Roy Hutchinson, 39, accused of making advances toward a 5-year-old boy last Friday evening.

**ASSAULT WITH** a dangerous weapon—Leon Merle Crawford, 23, Chiloquin, charged with drawing a pistol on Chiloquin Police Chief Lewis Jones during a speeding arrest August 2.

Assault with a dangerous weapon—Leonard Edward Mackey, 34, accused of knifing Lydia Crain on Main Street early July 11.

Burglary—Wendell Floyd Long, 22, charged with stealing a guitar and trumpet from local churches August 31.

Burglary—Linton E. Oppgaard, 23, accused of stealing \$781 in cash and checks from the Klamath Disposal Company safe July 31.

Receiving stolen property—Elroy "Haymaker" Butler, 35, in whose Broad Street home city police found \$2,000 worth of women's dresses and coats stolen from a warehouse October 17.

Larceny—Walter Painter, 25, Coos Bay, charged with stealing sleeping bags, a radio, gasoline and other property from Deputy Sheriff Robert Hartley, by whom he was employed last July.

LARCENY—George Henry McCline, 24, Seattle, accused of stealing a lady's wristwatch from Scott Loan Company October 8.

Forgery—Norris Pier, 34, accused of forging a \$72.16 check cashed at the Western Union office here September 17, 1957. Pier was returned here after serving a forgery term in Folsom Prison in California.

Taking and using a vehicle without the owner's consent—Lawrence

R. Rowell, 27, hotel bellhop charged with taking a guest's car for a joy ride to Tulelake September 25 before parking it in the hotel lot.

Attempting to obtain property by false pretenses—Russell Ruff, 45, charged with attempting to buy \$10.71 worth of merchandise from Anita Shops with a worthless \$35 check.

### NOT TRUE BILLS

Larceny—Charlene Eggsman, 21, and Phyllis Hill, 23, who had been accused of stealing a rifle, men's clothing and other possessions August 31 from a trailer owned by Miss Hill's brother Charles.

Burglary—Carl Lloyd Brown, 27, who was charged with stealing coins from pinball machines in the Roundup Tavern October 12.

Judge Vandenberg began arraignments at 4 p.m. Tuesday. Pleas were to be heard and trial dates were to be set later this week and next.

## Retaliatory Power Demonstrated

**CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)**—The big three of U.S. missilery—Atlas, Thor and Jupiter—effectively demonstrated this nation's rocket retaliatory power in the past two days.

All three were launched on long-range test flights during a 20-hour period. Officials reported all successfully dropped simulated warheads on designated ocean targets.

The intermediate range Thor blasted off Tuesday night on a 1,500-mile journey; the Atlas took off on an intercontinental range flight of 4,800 miles Wednesday; and the Jupiter IRBM sped 1,500 miles down the Atlantic missile range Wednesday night.

Successful flights are nothing new to this fiery trio of military blockbusters. They have covered the course many times during lengthy research and development programs here.

The United States has declared all three operational and their current test programs are designed to improve their accuracy and reliability.

Combat-ready Atlases and Thors are poised on launching pads abroad. Jupiters soon will join them to provide America with one of its greatest war deterrents.

A few Atlases are stationed at Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif. Several more Atlas bases are being constructed through the western United States. The missile has a range of 6,300 miles.

Four squadrons of Thors are assigned to NATO troops in England. Three Army Jupiter squadrons are scheduled for early delivery to NATO forces. Two will go to Italy, one to Turkey. Each squadron has 13 of the deadly weapons.

Although many U.S. officials concede this nation trails the Soviet Union in developing powerful space rockets, they believe the two countries are even in the ballistic missile field.

Two other American ballistic missiles—the Titan ICBM and Polaris submarine weapon—are experiencing test difficulties. Both, however, are expected to be added to the operational defense arsenal next year.

Testing will begin in 1960 on two solid-fuel ballistic rockets, the 700-mile Pershing and the 3,000-mile Minuteman.

## Soviet Jet Plane Sets Speed Mark

**MOSCOW (AP)**—Pravda reported today that a Soviet test pilot flew a single engine jet plane 2,504 kilometers—1,555.98 miles—an hour to break the official world's air speed record.

The newspaper said Lt. Col. Georgy Mosolov, a veteran test pilot, set the mark while testing a delta-wing E-66 jet "in the lower strata of the atmosphere" Oct. 31.

The previous recognized record, 2,330 kilometers—1,456.25 miles—an hour, was set Oct. 6 by French test pilot Andre Turcat in a delta-wing Griffon II jet interceptor. The flight was made at 45,000 feet.

## Mail To Two Networks Favor Shows' Continuance

**NEW YORK (AP)**—ABC and CBS report mail and telegram sentiment in favor of continuance of television quiz shows.

The correspondence also has brought expressions of affection for Charles Van Doren, the admittedly coached TV star. The bulk of it was received by Dave Garraway's "Today" show, where Van Doren was a commentator until ousted by NBC.

CBS and NBC, the networks which nurtured and nipped the TV quiz boom, said today that communications about TV quiz programs generally was streaming in, too fast for complete tabulation.

NBC, reporting on a tally of its latest 625 letters, said 468 favored continuance of the quiz shows, 129 were critical of such entertainment, and 28 were undetermined.

A CBS spokesman said: "A large majority of the mail favors continuance of this type of show. They enjoy them, and would like to see them kept on the air, if there is some way of doing it."

CBS said that while the big majority favored continued quiz shows, most writers also lauded the policy laid down recently by CBS President Frank Stanton of network responsibility for the authenticity of its presentations.

Some writers suggested quiz shows without the huge prizes, or lavish gifts. NBC said its correspondence, in addition to showing continued devotion to quiz shows, also showed public backing for Van Doren.

"He's still a hero," a spokesman said. Garraway said he himself has received about 2,000 letters and more than 300 telegrams, all the latter in the wake of Van Doren's admissions to House investigators, and all but one favoring Van Doren.

The bulk voiced warm compassion, and unstemmed fondness, most of them urging Van Doren's reinstatement, Garraway said.

Garraway himself, on his show Wednesday, had delivered an emotion-choked salute of loyalty to Van Doren, as still a beloved friend, despite his mistakes.

**NIGHT AND DAY**  
**LONDON (UPI)**—Miss Chung Aae Suh, 19, of Pusan, South Korea, arrived Tuesday for the Miss World beauty contest Nov. 10, and disclosed she was bringing two chaperons with her.

"I am a long way from home," she explained, "and there is night as well as day."

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
