WALL STREET

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market closed mixed today with scattered stocks making wide moves. Trading quieted after an active early session.

Volume for the day was estimated at 4 million shares compared with 3,320,000 on Monday. Gains and losses of fractions to about a point prevailed among key stocks while volatile issues moved as much as half a dozen points.

American Motors held about an early 8-point jump. Revlon, spotlighted by the television quiz investigation, dropped about 4.

Studebaker-Packard remained on the warpath, rising about a point in active dealings.

The steels were mixed as the Supreme Court had the Taft-Hartley question under advisement. Rails, oils, most aircrafts and electronics were off.

Twins Dead; Reason Mulled By Police

SANTA ANA, Calif. (UPI) —

Police sought a reason today for the apparent double suicide of twin brothers whose bodies were found in a ditch. Both were shot through the head.

"I can't understand it," said Mrs. Mabel Edmons, mother of the twins. "There was no reason. Nothing I know of."

The bodies of Richard Lee and Donald David Edmons, both 22, were found Wednesday in a storm drain about 12 miles north of here—nearly 50 miles south of their Santa Monica home. They had been missing since Oct. 17.

A .32-caliber automatic was found under the body of Ronald. A note dated Oct. 18 and signed by both was found at the scene. It read:

"After we are dead all our property should be turned over to our mother, Mrs. Mabel Edmons of Long Beach, Calif."

Sheriff's detective John Baker said his office definitely has ruled out any foul play.

"Both boys signed the note and we think it was a double suicide," Baker said. It was possible that technically it could be a murder-suicide since one of the boys could have shot the other and then himself.

"But we feel that they planned their deaths together," he added. Baker said his office had been unable to uncover any motive so far.

Mrs. Edmons described her sons as serious and dedicated to their school life.

"They had no steady girl friends and kept pretty close to themselves," she said. "They lived together and didn't drink and didn't smoke and didn't go out much."

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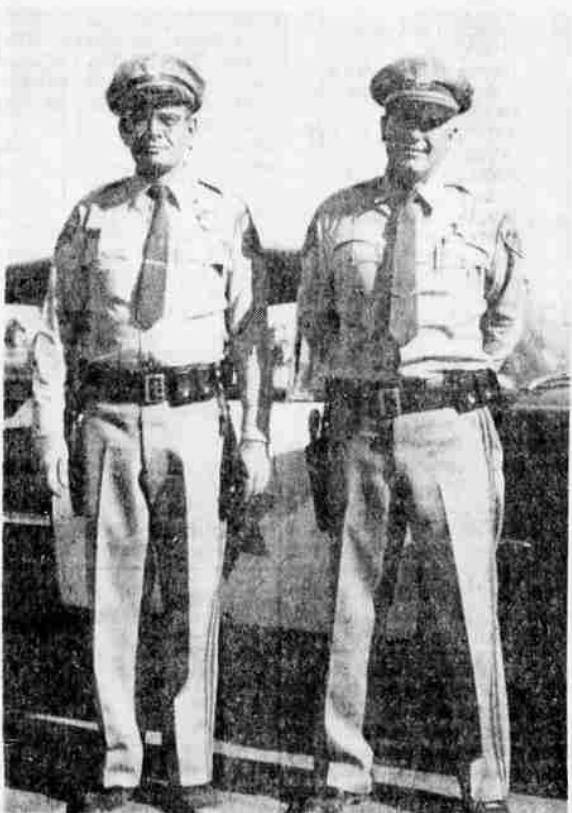

Dental Aide Still Missing

FREMONT (UPI) —

A former assistant to Dr. William V. Shyne, the still missing Fremont dentist accused of passing out candy-coated laxative pills to youngsters on Halloween, was arrested Wednesday.

Mrs. Hazel Engelby, 53, was arrested as an accomplice and booked on charges of unlawful dispensing of drugs and "outrage of public decency."

Those were the same charges filed against Shyne when a number of children became violently ill from the pills police say he tossed in their "trick or treat" bags last Saturday night.

The dentist vanished Monday from home and has failed to appear at his office since. Fremont Police Inspector Lee Rieman said Mrs. Engelby was with Shyne in his home when the costumed youngsters made their visits. He said they both tasted handfuls of bitter alooe pills, a strong purgative, into the children's bags.

Mrs. Engelby was to appear before Municipal Judge Edward A. Quaresima in Fremont at 9 a.m. today.
