47 Years With SP Completed

Floyd M. Creason, Southern Pacific engineer, made his last run from Klamath Falls to Dunsmuir last Saturday, completing 47 years of service.

He was born at Knights Landing, California, on October 16, 1894. The family moved to Dunsmuir in 1901. After completing his schooling at Dunsmuir, he joined the Southern Pacific and became an engineer on June 20, 1920.

He is the fourth Creason to retire as engineer in the Shasta division. The other three were uncles, J. M. Creason, E. P. Creason and E. A. Creason.

Floyd Creason was Dunsmuir chairman for the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers from January 1, 1945, until December 31, 1958.

Open house was held Sunday at the Travelers Hotel at Dunsmuir where hundreds of friends stopped in to offer congratulations.

Out of town guests included J. P. Work Checked By Area Chief

LAKEVIEW — Mrs. Catherine Cook, Bend, area director for Lake and Deschutes counties for the farm census, spent several days here this week checking the initial work of the four crew members in Lake County. Mrs. Mahle Ross, Lakeview; Mrs. Roberta Shults, Westside; Mrs. Helen Parks, Fort Rock, and Mrs. Estelle Johnson, Paisley, comprise the crew of census takers.

The four women attended a school conducted in Bend by Mrs. Cook on October 28, 29 and 30, where the census enumerators were given instructions prior to beginning their work Monday of this week.

The finishing date for the agricultural census has been tentatively set at December 15, Mrs. Cook said, and the industrial and civilian census will be conducted in April of 1960. The area covered by each worker is controlled by the number of houses or families, approximately 150 to a person.

The benefits of the agricultural census to everyone are stressed in that not only are the number of people and the amount of stock and products determined, but the the county is reported and used as a determining factor in improvement and building for school and fire districts, forest service access, and even state highways.

The confidential aspect of the census work is stressed. Each worker is required to take an oath to the effect that any information received in interviews is not to be disclosed to other sources. People are required by law to answer the questions.

Mrs. Cook commented very favorably on the reception she has received from Lake County people in general.

State Aide Accepts Post

PORTLAND (AP)—The chairmanship of Sen. Hubert Humphrey's bid for Democratic presidential nomination support from Oregon was accepted Tuesday by Norman O. Nilsen, state labor commissioner.

The Humphrey for President group, Nilsen said, will proceed at once with plans to organize Humphrey committees in all four Oregon congressional districts, and all 36 counties of the state.

"We are going to take this campaign for Humphrey to the people," he said. "Oregon's presidential primary race will have a tremendous significance for Sen. Humphrey nationally."

Nilsen, a member of the Minnesota senator's campaign committee since August, said Humphrey's popularity in Oregon is growing. He said Humphrey can and should win Oregon's Democratic primary next May.

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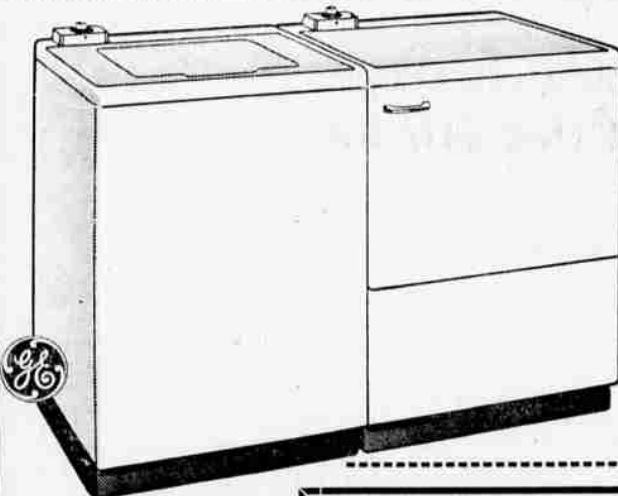
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
