Former Employee Of Store Never Got Chance On TV

WASHINGTON (UPI)—There's one TV quiz show contestant who not only didn't get any questions in advance, he didn't even get his category in advance.

He is Kenneth Hoffer, a young, mild-mannered former employee of the Hess Department Store in Allentown, Pa.

Back in 1955 Hoffer had ambitions to appear on "The \$64,000 Question" as an expert on the Bible. Word that he had applied to be a contestant soon got to his boss, Max Hess.

Hess also had ambitions—to get in a plug for his store on the popular program. So, Hess told House investigators Wednesday night, the store arranged to pay an aide to the program producer \$10,000 to take Hoffer as a contestant.

Hoffer kept telling officials of the show that he didn't know much about anything except the Bible. Okay, they said, you can answer questions about baseball.

What is more, according to Hoffer, they wouldn't even guarantee that baseball would be on the category selection board the night he was on the show.

Hoffer's big night came on Aug. 9, 1955. Baseball was on the board. And quizmaster Hal March struck him out on the third, or \$256 question.

Hoffer said Hess had promised him he would win at least a new Cadillac worth \$4,000. But all he ever got was a consolation prize—a package of Revlon products.

Hoffer's sad story had an even

sadder postscript. Sixteen months later—on Christmas Eve night—Hess fired him.

president of the Wyoming Farm Bureau, warned Tuesday. "People who become accustomed to federal aid soon clamor for more and more," Anderson asserted.



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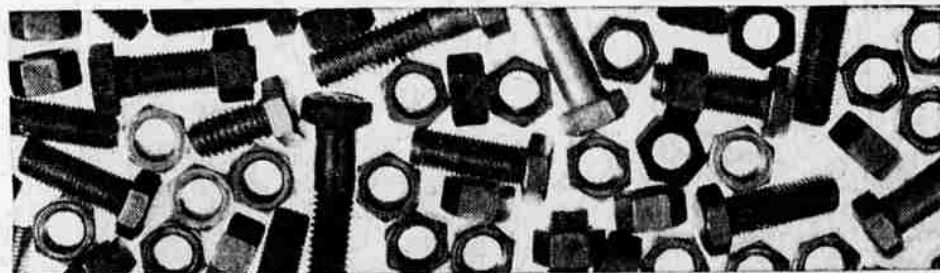

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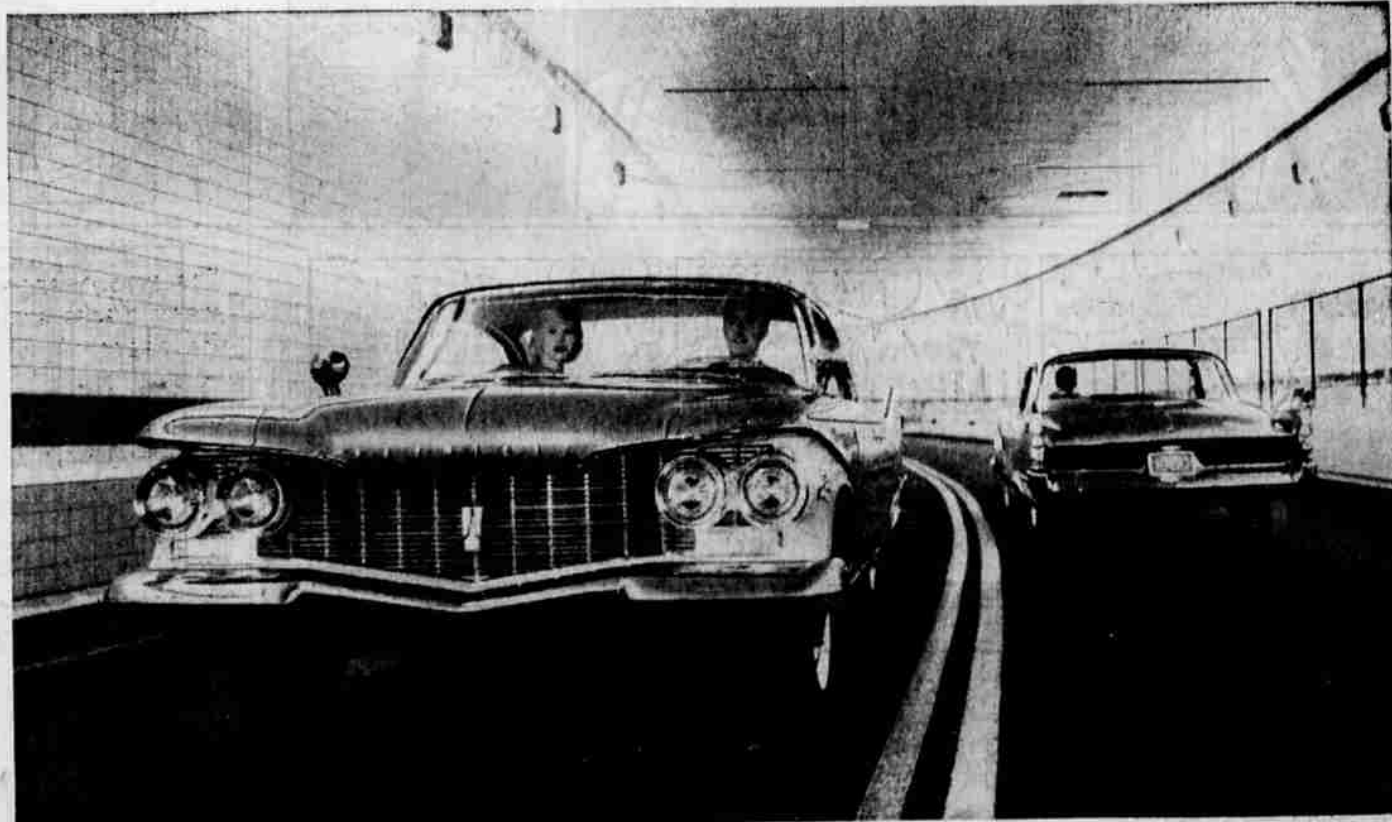
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
