

Ore Tech Blasted By C Of I, 49-13

Alvaro Paces Landslide Win

CALDWELL, Idaho (Special) — Despite the fact that the Oregon Tech Owls took a terrific beating here Saturday night they finished a successful 1959 season on an upbeat. Fullback Stan Glass, one of the Oregon Collegiate Conference's top candidates for Little All-America Honors, bombed his way into the end zone from the five yard line with just two seconds left in the ballgame to boost the never-say-die Owls to the short end of a 49-13 score against the College of Idaho Coyotes on Caldwell's Hayman's Field.

Glass carried the ball 31 times for the Techmen netting 114 yards on the ground and also completed a four-yard pass for the best effort displayed on the part of the Owls for the entire night.

The Idahoans, paced by quarterback Charlie Alvaro, whose right leg proved equally as efficient as his right arm, and halfback Larry Anderson, who helped the Coyotes

prove that they could move well on the ground as well as in the air, displayed the power that has boosted them into a tie for first place in Northwest Conference football.

The C of I eleven cracked the scoreboard with a touchdown and a point-after in the first quarter and then added two more of each in each of the successive frames for their impressive total.

The Owls hit paydirt just 40 seconds into the second quarter when quarterback Roy Johnson hit end Ralph Norgaard with a five-yard toss for the first Owl TD. A run attempt by Glass for the PAT failed just inches short of the goal line. The Owls went touchdown-hungry until the closing seconds of the final period when they started a march from their own 34 yard line that included a 14-yard run by Glass, a shovel-pass by Allen Leach to Dennis Farster off a fake quick-kick and four successive carries by Glass who added a four-yard jump pass to Norgaard

that put the Owls on the Coyote five with just two seconds remaining in the game. Glass blasted over for the touchdown and Bud Maupin booted the PAT.

The game ended when Charlie Wilson short-kicked the ball which bounced off an OTI play and ended in the possession of the Coyotes as the final gun sounded.

Alvaro, who is one of the top small-college passers in the country, connected three times for TDs: one a 14-yarder to end Ken Leonard, another an eight-yard success to end Bob Asmus and the third, a 26-yard fluke to halfback Don Shaffer. Shaffer scored when a pass from Alvaro bounced out of his arms high into the air and back into his arms. C of I's biggest man, tackle Jerry Williamson, got the biggest thrill of his life when he intercepted a pass from Johnson and thundered 45 yards well-surrounded by Coyote protection for the Idahoan's final touchdown. Alvaro, naturally, kicked his seventh successful point after try.

Huskies Defeat Beavers

SEATTLE (AP) — Oregon State's rugged defense threw a slight fright into Washington's Rose Bowl ambitions Saturday but the Huskies, piloted by one-eyed quarterback Bob Schlorff, chopped out a 13-6 decision for their seventh victory in eight starts this season.

A crowd of 48,000 — largest ever to watch the two old rivals — saw the losing Beavers fumble away most of their first half opportunities and finally set up Washington's first score with a costly fumble.

The lone Beaver touchdown provided the day's big thrill, coming on a 88-yard run with an intercepted pass by center Bruce Hake in the last quarter.

The first quarter had gone scoreless and there were only five minutes left in the half when big end John Meyers fell on an Oregon State fumble at the Beaver 35. In seven plays the Huskies had their tally, Schlorff plunging the final foot. George Fleming's conversion kick gave Washington a 7-0 lead.

The Beavers shed their fumbling habits during the halftime intermission and put together their first serious threat at the start of the third quarter. This fizzle on an incomplete fourth down pass, however, and before the quarter ended Washington powered 87 yards in eight plays for its second touchdown.

The Huskies were on their way to another when Hake picked off his interception on the OSC 8. It was the only time this year a Schlorff pass has wandered into enemy hands and Hake made the most of it. The 208-pound senior chugged down the sidelines, aided by timely blocks, and reached the goal line untouched. An attempted run for a conversion failed.

Bear "11" Frightens Webfoots

PORTLAND (AP)—Little Cleveland Jones wrestled a 35-yard pass out of California's hands in the waning minutes for a touchdown that earned Oregon a 20-18 victory over California here today.

That kept Oregon in the running for the Rose Bowl.

Quarterback Dave Grosz lofted the desperation pass for Oregon and California quarterback Wayne Crow and Jones went up for the ball on the goal line.

They wrestled until they hit the ground, by which time the 5-foot, 4-inch, 145-pound Oregon halfback had the ball securely in his arms, just inches into the end zone.

There were five minutes to play and California managed to move to the Oregon 32 before being stopped. There was less than a minute to go when California had to yield the ball and Oregon ran the time out.

California got back into the game with a 72-yard scoring drive before halftime, and then snatched up two Oregon fumbles in the third quarter, converted each of them into a touchdown and went ahead 18-14.

Oregon's first two scores came on an 18-yard pass from Grosz to halfback Willie West and moments later on a 5-yard plunge by halfback Don Laudenslager.

Fullback Walt Arnold scored California's first two touchdowns on a short plunge and then a 49-yard run. Halfback Billy Patton scored the touchdown that put California ahead with a short dive over the line.
