Rare Animals Land At Zoo

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Two Tasmanian devils, who belong to one of the oldest and rarest animal groups in existence, arrived here Sunday night to take up residence in San Francisco's Fleishacker Zoo.

Assets Told By Co-op

LAFINE — Total current assets of Midstate Electric Cooperative, Incorporated, at the close of the past year of operation were reported as \$96,849 in the recent audit for the utility. This is an increase of \$2,651 over the previous year, George M. Larimer, manager, points out.

The cooperative now serves 1,630 meters on 529 miles of line. Membership totals 1,252, an increase of 117 the past year.

Repayments on loans now show members' equity of \$10,438, a \$4,055 increase for the previous report period. The equity per member is now \$13. Emergency and replacement fund deposits total \$45,425, one per cent of total investment.

Power users in the Fort Rock-Silver Lake area will note with interest that 24.1 per cent of the revenue was derived from irrigation pumping. Second in electric energy use are rural customers other than for pumping, tied with commercial and industrial, large, each with 19.4 per cent.

Repayment of the loan for the Fort Rock-Silver Lake extension was begun during the past quarter. Fifty four irrigation pumps are now served. The original estimate for this year was \$2.

In addition to the manager, eight employees serve Midstate's members.

Council Hears Resolution

DUNSMUIR — The city council at its recent meeting heard a resolution of amendment from the Planning Commission to change Park Avenue from an R1 to a C2 zone from the ballpark north to the end of Park Avenue. The only changes now will be to include Ed Pitt in the C2 and leave the Rodley lot at the corner of Caldwell and Isgrig as R1.

Some Park Avenue residents felt there was needless delay in making the changes. City Attorney Howard Jones suggested they follow the steps in the ordinance for changes to be sure they get what they want. He said that unless the steps were followed someone at a future date could declare the whole thing void.

There will be an open hearing at the next council meeting December 2.

Building permits totaled \$25,750. Building inspector Bill Hughes said \$25,000 of this was for five new units planned by J. Morgan Jones for his hilltop unit of the Oak-Lot Motel.

George Weber, a northend resident, asked about a street lighting program. He stated that lights are badly needed in the vicinity of Scarlet Way and Park Avenue as there are no sidewalks and a number of children walk along there after dusk. Mayor Jones suggested he meet with the Planning Commission to discuss the matter.

Street Superintendent John Pelt suggested that no trespassing and no shooting signs be placed at the sewer plant as vandals were shooting in the area.

Strike Fails To Come Off

KANSAS CITY (AP) — Buses of the Kansas City public service Co. are protected earlier than usual with antifreeze — a preventive measure for a strike that didn't come off.

Antifreeze generally isn't added to bus radiators until December because the vehicles are in use or in the garage. With a strike in the offing, the metropolitan area's mass transit firm protected its buses early.

Negotiators reached agreement on a contract for drivers and maintenance workers Sunday. It was 4 1/2 hours after the strike deadline but the buses continued to run.

Terms were not disclosed but it was known a wage increase had been the major stumbling block. Neither the Kansas City Public Service Co. nor the Amalgamated Assn. of Street Electric Railway and Motor Coach Employees disclosed details of the dispute.

Fire Razes Hoghouse

MONTAGUE — The hoghouse containing the Future Farmers of America projects of David, 17, and his brother, Phil Robustelli, 15, was destroyed by fire Saturday morning. The family ranch is four miles southwest of Montague.

Montague Fire Department firefighters said the blaze was started from heating lamps in the shed. Firemen were called at 10:20 a.m. They were able to save one sow and her nine baby pigs.

Another fire in the Montague area occurred Friday at the Alta Vista Ranch, four miles east of Montague on the Little Shasta River. The ranch house roof fire was caused by a faulty flue, firemen said, and damage amounted to approximately \$2,000.

The ranch is owned by Dr. A. N. Johnson of Roseburg and is managed by Mitchell Denham.

GI Arrested As Smuggler

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — M.Sgt. Forrest Barrett, Mackinaw, Mich., is not only a poor smuggler, but a poor businessman as well.

The Air Force sergeant has been fined \$1,000 and reduced in rank by a court martial for smuggling Korean gold into the U.S. But the gold bars Barrett purchased were not as weighty as he thought because of a confusion in the translation of the Korean unit of measure to ounces.

Customs Agency officials said Sunday that Barrett suffered a considerable loss on the \$2,000 worth of gold he bought in Korea, and smuggled into the U.S. in a tool chest and duffel bag.

Barrett thought he was smuggling \$6 an ounce Korean gold into the country where gold is worth \$35 an ounce—but he actually had paid more than \$40 an ounce to buy it.

Selma police said the three were fatally injured when their vehicle pulled in front of a southbound Southern Pacific freight train at a stop signal in Selma Sunday afternoon. Killed when ejected as the train carried the truck 2,500 feet were the driver, Joel E. Holmes, 52, Shafter, and Tommy S. Collett, 32, and his wife, Helen Joy, 31.

The pickup truck was being used to move the Collett's belongings from Shafter to their new home in Manteca.

Fernando A. Hunter, 21, of the Tule Indian Reservation, was killed late Saturday when his pickup truck overturned on an up-hill grade at the reservation 10 miles southwest of Porterville. Four other persons riding in the vehicle were hurt.

U.S. Grange Opens Meet

LONG BEACH, Calif. (UPI) — Some 500 delegates from throughout the country today opened the 30th annual convention of the National Grange.

The delegates of the \$50,000-a-year strong farm organization will hold daily sessions through Thursday. Presidential hopeful Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo) will address the convention on its closing day.

Grange grand master Herschel D. Newsom, of Columbus, Ind., said at a pre-convention meeting Sunday the U.S. farm surplus problem could be solved only through cooperation among the country's farm organizations.

"The National Grange," Newsom said, "holds to its recommendation for a farm program developed on a crop-by-crop basis, with no overall solution but many individual solutions aimed at insuring parity prices for farmers."

The group's agricultural committee was expected to recommend a full study of the California citrus marketing methods to serve as a model for solving some of the nation's farm surplus problems.

Pupil Death Probe Slated

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — A full scale grand jury investigation of the fraternity hazing death of a University of Southern California student opens today.

Thirty-two persons, including 10 fellow pledges of the victim, Richard T. Swanson, 21, were subpoenaed by the panel. Swanson choked to death Sept. 17 when he tried to swallow a large piece of raw liver at initiation rites at Kappa Sigma fraternity.

The panel will attempt to determine whether any criminal responsibility was involved in Swanson's death and if perjury was committed at a recent inquest held in his death.

Ambulance and fire rescue crewmen contended they were not told Swanson had swallowed the meat. They contended that if fraternity members had been helpful they might have saved Swanson's life. But fraternity members charged they were ignored when they tried to offer assistance.

Exposition Terminates 10-Day Run

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The 15th annual Grand National Livestock Exposition, Horse Show and Rodeo ended its 10-day run Sunday night at the Cow Palace. More than \$302,000 in prize money and trophies was awarded winners in the exposition. Approximately 3,000 animals from 23 states and Canada were entered in the livestock show.

The horse show included 437 horses entered by 275 exhibitors from 11 states and Canada, and more than 250 top professional cowboys competed in the championship rodeo.
