

Help Needed For Victims Of Typhoons

Local residents interested in assisting victims of Korean and Japanese typhoons by contributing new or used blankets to the Red Cross are urged to contact the local chapter immediately. All blankets contributed in this area must be ready for shipment by November 17.

Free dry cleaning of all donated blankets has been volunteered by the Fashion Cleaners, Model Cleaners and Superior Dry Cleaners. A volunteer group is busy this week repairing blanket bindings and mending edges. "Because these blankets will be distributed to disaster victims in Japan and Korea as gifts of the American people, we wish them to be in good condition so that we can take pride in the gift," John Zimwalt, chairman of the local chapter said. Anyone having a used blanket to contribute is assured that it will be placed in "good as new" condition through the volunteer efforts.

First of the Red Cross blanket shipments was made November 7 from the Port of Alameda aboard the Navy ship "Aludra." Through cooperation of the Department of Defense, the Navy will supply shipping space for the blankets and the Army will load them at the docks.

Supplementing the \$25,000 sent by the American Red Cross to the Japanese Red Cross Society to aid victims of Typhoon Vera, the American Junior Red Cross has authorized a gift of \$5,000 from its Children's Fund for the purchase of basic educational supplies. The American Junior Red Cross shipped 25,000 gift boxes and 100 school chests to Japan for children in the disaster area. American Juniors have given 25,000 gift boxes and 25 school chests to Korean children affected by Typhoon Sarah. A \$5,000 gift from the Children's Fund for the purchase of warm underclothing for children, was part of an earlier Red Cross \$25,000 gift to the Korean Red Cross Society.

Movie Offer Given Tutor

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Charles Van Doren's acting on what he says was a rigged quiz show has led to a movie offer.

Producer Mervyn LeRoy says he wants Van Doren to play a prosecutor in "Wake Me When It's Over," a film he is making for 20th Century-Fox.

"It's time someone gave him a job that would pay a living wage," LeRoy said Monday. "I think, too, that he was a very good actor on all those TV shows."

Van Doren testified this month he was only pretending to have trouble answering questions on the now defunct "Twenty-One" quiz show. He knew the answers all the time, he said.

As a result of the Congressional inquiry, Van Doren lost jobs with Columbia University and the National Broadcasting Co.

LeRoy said 20th Century's New York office is negotiating with Van Doren.

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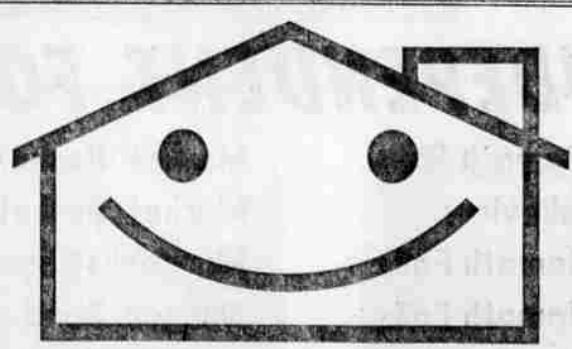
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
