

### Youth Given Time For Plea

Richard W. Wayburn, 29, asked for additional time in district court Friday before answering a charge of taking and using a Cadillac convertible from an auto dealer's warehouse.

City police arrested Wayburn, of 547 Elderado Boulevard, after a wild chase in the Hot Springs section Thursday night. He was driving a convertible missing since November 7 from the Dick B. Miller Company warehouse. He finally was halted at a roadblock set up by City Police Sgt. John Kenard.

Wayburn was ordered to reappear before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor at 10 a.m. Monday, and was returned to jail in lieu of \$1,500 bond.

Another defendant on an identical charge was Benjamin Perkins, 40, a former ranch employe of Lloyd Gift. Gift charged Perkins with taking a pickup belonging to Gift's son, Martin Gift, on a trip to Bonanza without authority November 10.

Perkins requested a preliminary hearing on the charge, and was scheduled to return to district court at 10 a.m. November 19. He was returned to jail in lieu of \$1,500 bond.

Gift, a Bonanza rancher, is foreman of the present county grand jury.

### Brothers Face Liquor Charges

Two brothers accused of providing a 15-year-old girl at least six bottles of beer while on an early morning date November 6 pleaded not guilty in district court Friday.

The defendants, Henry Delaney, 29, and Robert Delaney, 18, both of Route 3, were charged with giving liquor to a minor.

Officers said one of the pair had a date with the girl, but was accompanied by two others in a car. In the course of the evening, the youths bought a case of beer at a local tavern and drove about the countryside.

The girl was returned home about 2 a.m., officers said.

The brothers asked for additional time to consult an attorney and were ordered to reappear in district court at 9:30 a.m. next Thursday. Both were jailed in lieu of \$500 bail each.

### Tree Stealing Trial Dated

Frank Prokter of Trail, Oregon, pleaded not guilty in district court Friday to a charge of stealing Christmas trees from the Klamath Indian Reservation.

Prokter, 35, was accused of stealing 29 fir trees from the Boundary Butte section on October 17. The trees were on property being held in trust by the U.S. National Bank.

District Judge D. E. Van Vactor scheduled Prokter's trial for 10 a.m. next January 12, and Prokter was released on \$250 bail.

Two previous defendants in the case, Carl Bone of Shady Cove and Larnce Sanderson of Trail, were released upon motion by the district attorney, who said they were employes of Prokter.

### Wine Shipments Decline Noted

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Shipments of California wines in September totaled 11,164,225 gallons, a drop of 3.02 per cent from the September figure a year ago, according to the Wine Institute.

The latest figure was also 2.45 per cent less than the average September shipment for the past five years. However, the institute said total shipments for the first nine months of 1959 were 2.38 per cent above the average for the years 1954-58. Shipments for the first nine months of this year totaled 89,707,835 gallons, as compared with an average of 87,197,633 gallons for the previous five years.

### Fifty Years In Business Celebrated By KF Realtor

Edmund M. Chilcote is observing his 50th anniversary as a figure prominent in the business life of the Klamath area this week.

He first came to the Basin in the spring of 1908, traveling by stage from Bray, California, to Tetter's Landing on the bend of the river between Keno and Midland. From there he traveled up river on the steamer Klamath, landing near the mouth of Link River.

After spending a week looking over the valley, he returned to Wallace, Idaho, closed out his business affairs in that little mining town, and returned to Klamath Falls in October, 1909. He got off the train at the site of the present depot, stepped on a horse-drawn street car and rode to the American Hotel at the spot where the Corner Store now stands.

After shopping around for several days, Chilcote bought some office equipment and a location in the American Hotel from Joe Pierce, and since that time has been continuously in the real estate business in this city.

In the spring of 1911 Chilcote went to Los Angeles and purchased an automobile, the first car used in the real estate business in this part of the country. In those early days, he recalls, most business was in selling farm lands. There were no paved roads and the highways meandered uncertainly through the sagebrush.

In the summer of 1918 David M. Smith bought half interest in Chilcote's thriving real estate firm and moved here from McMinnville. Ed Chilcote says he and David Smith spent 24 years in a pleasant partnership until Smith retired in 1941 and moved to Amity. After Smith's retirement his name was retained in the firm for sentimental reasons.

A number of salesmen have worked for Chilcote during the past 50 years. One was Roland Wright when he first came to Klamath Falls. Wright left the firm to start his own business which he still operates. Fred Fleet and Frank Ira White had offices with Chilcote and worked with him for a number of years before and during World War II.

When Chilcote's sons, Robert and William, received their discharges from military service, they both came into the business and father and sons still work together.

Ed Chilcote retired in 1958 as a member of the Oregon Real Estate Board, after 16 years service.

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### Hawaiian Mail Lost At Sea

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — If main engines, you sent any first class mail to military personnel in Hawaii, the Philippines or Formosa, which would have reached San Francisco on Nov. 7 and 8, you might as well do it all over again.

The Navy says mail accumulating here on these two days was jettisoned by a Military Air Transport Service Globemaster after it lost two engines and turned back to Hamilton Air Force Base. The big plane tossed overboard 11 tons of cargo to enable it to limp back on its two remaining engines.

Unless the sender has proof of delivery of such mail, said the Western Sea Frontier Headquarters here, it should be considered lost.
