Transit Survey Voted \$66,000

OAKLAND, Calif. (UPI) — The Area Rapid Transit District has voted \$66,000 for a survey to determine whether a Peninsula rapid transit system could be integrated with existing Southern Pacific tracks.

The survey will study the possibility of eliminating the 22 grade crossings in San Mateo County. The county will finance the survey, to be made by Wilsey and Ham Engineers of Millbrae, but will be reimbursed by the five-county transit district when it is completed.

An elevated system for the Peninsula has been tentatively agreed upon, but a spokesman said the survey would determine whether a ground level system in conjunction with SP tracks could be built.

Sheriff Cites Policing Change

Sheriff Red Britton announced in a letter to the county court Friday a new schedule for policing the Beauty and Sprague River areas.

Britton said two deputies are stationed now at Bly—Jim Conroy and John Holloway. One of these makes daily patrols through the area, Britton said, and the system is working well.

"Our department has been getting along with the Indians extra well," Britton wrote, "and they seem to be reacting to our kind treatment so well that I have decided to eliminate the one deputy and have moved Holloway to Bly."

Beatty had two deputies until the first of the month. At that time both Holloway and Deputy Jim Phipps were without housing because their homes were sold by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Britton said. Phipps resigned and Holloway was transferred.

The change, Britton told the court, "will save the budget the amount of one deputy's salary, the phone bills, and some gasoline. I am always trying to keep down expenses wherever I can without decreasing the efficiency of our department."

The change was approved by the county court.

County Officials Plan Convention Attendance

Two Klamath County officials are in line for the presidency of their respective associations when officers from all of Oregon's counties hold a three-day convention in Portland this week.

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Scientist Claims Space Try Failed

INNSBRUCK, Austria (UPI) — A leading German nuclear scientist claimed in a lecture here that a man died aboard a Soviet space rocket in an unsuccessful test last year.

The scientist, Prof. Hermann Oberth, said Friday that the Russians launched a manned space vehicle but the test failed. He said that after the failure, the Russians halted further launchings of manned space ships to prevent similar accidents. He did not give the source of his information.
