## Realignment Plans

YREKA — County Road Commissioner Al Powers presented maps for the proposed realignment of Oberlin Road for the approval of the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors when he appeared at Tuesday's board meeting.

Realignment of the Federal Aid Secondary road will entail complete reconstruction of five miles of road between Yreka and Montague.

Bids will be let in February, 1960. Estimated cost is about \$375,000.

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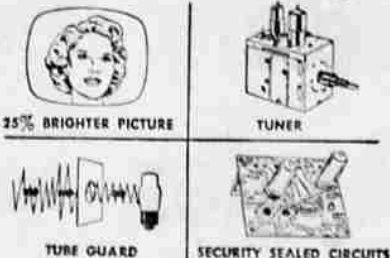
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
