Ski Club Asks Aid

LAKEVIEW—An appeal for assistance in promotion and upkeep of the Fremont Highlanders Ski Club is being made this week in the circulation of a letter from president, Don Sanborn, to residents of Lakeview and Lake County.

The ski hill, a few minutes drive from Lakeview in the Warner Canyon area, has proven a drawing card for skiers from many miles away. There are three towns (in tandem). In the past all labor of running the hill has been done by a few volunteers, but now there are new forest service regulations which force the hiring of help at the switches. This, plus the purchase of some new ropes, and the plan of keeping out of debt, has prompted the request for supporting memberships of \$5 each and for more volunteer help during the weekend work parties. The supporting membership charge would be a tax deductible item as the club is registered with the federal government as a non-profit organization and has an exemption certificate. The club feels that it gives the same type of service that the swimming pool does but it is not subsidized by city or county.

Sanborn also emphasizes the point that the area is really a part of Lakeview and is open to the public. Any group can use the ski hut for meetings if it is a large enough building for them. It is necessary to make arrangements for its use but there is no charge. Any group of young persons would have to have proper chaperons and supervision.
