

U.S. Official May Journey To Panama

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department may send a high-ranking officer to Panama for conferences aimed at preventing a new outbreak of violence against U.S. citizens there.

An offer to dispatch the officer was made to Panama Monday by Secretary of State Christian A. Herter, who told of receiving reports "which indicate the threat of further violence."

Herter informed Ambassador Ricardo M. Arias of Panama in a 40-minute conference that the officer would discuss the current controversy with Panamanian officials. Herter did not say who might be sent.

The State Department released the secretary's remarks after the conference.

Violence erupted in Panama two weeks ago. During demonstrations Panamanians ripped down the U.S. flag at the embassy, stoned the U.S. Information Agency building, and attacked private American business offices. The violence ended with 63 Panamanians wounded.

About 300 Americans live in Panama, mainly in the capital, while 11,000 live in the adjoining Panama Canal Zone, which is operated by the United States. During the demonstrations, many Panamanians crossed into the Canal Zone.

Herter told Arias that "representatives of the United States continued to be willing, as in the past, to seek mutually satisfactory solutions to outstanding problems but that this can be established only in an atmosphere of calm."

One of the problems involves the sovereignty of the Canal Zone, which some Panamanians feel should belong to their country, not the United States.

In addition, Arias has accused the United States of not carrying out the 1955 Remon - Eisenhower treaty, which pledges this country to pay Panamanians as much as Americans for work in the Canal Zone. The United States says it is complying.

A third problem was brought up Monday by Roy R. Rubottom, assistant secretary of state for inter-American affairs. While conceding "There are certain purely national aspects involved in the demonstrations," Rubottom accused Communists of taking a hand in them.

After the meeting with Herter, Arias said he and the secretary were not too far apart in seeking solutions.

Elk Hunter Is Accident Victim

HEPPNER, Ore. (AP)—Wayne Elsworth Hoffman, 29, was reported in good condition at a hospital Sunday night after he was accidentally shot while elk hunting southeast of here.

Gary Gene Irvin, 21-year-old relative of Hoffman, was quoted by state Policeman Bill Labhart as saying he fired at Hoffman after thinking the man was an elk in the distance.

The bullet lodged in Hoffman's right leg.
