Still Open

Just to settle all the rumors that have been flying around let it be said here and now that there are still a few open deer areas left.

Starting on Saturday next and including the dates of November 22, 23 and 29 deer hunters with unused deer tags may take a deer of either sex in certain restricted areas of the Alsea, Hood River, McKenzie, Santiam, Siuslaw, Task, Wasco and Willamette units.

On the same weekends, namely the next two, a portion of the Rogue River Valley will also be open to general season tag holders. In the Polk unit a portion of the area will be open to tag holders on five weekends, November 21, 22, 23, 29 and December 5, 6, 12, 13, 19 and 20.

Wasco unit permit holders have a portion along the White River open for a deer of either sex on December 5 and 6 and again on December 26 and 27.

And that, as far as I know, will end the season.

It would appear that hunters are going to have to add another piece of equipment to their hunting wardrobe. No hunter will be able to go afield in the future without a briefcase with him containing a complete set of the game laws, a rundown on the season, maps of all the various areas, a punch, a pot of glue (for repairing tags) and probably a secretary.

Speaking of hunting brings to mind a release from the federal game people to the effect that Canada and Mexico have cut their bag limit.

The bag and possession limit has been slashed to 10 birds per day in Mexico, for example. The season is a rather piddling one running only from November 16 through March 15.

Down toward the end of the statement is a sort of meaty-mouthed explanation that "In Canada and Mexico, the hunting pressures are not as heavy as those of the United States. In certain sections of Canada there are waterfowl depredation problems which are considered in fixing the bag limits."

You figure that one out for yourself.

U.N. Suggestions

I'm in receipt this week of the November copy of the United Nations Advocate.

I presume that the information carried in this mimeographed sheet has its approval.

IF THIS IS TRUE, I find myself in violent disagreement with it.

In their letter, it points out the result of a study which was filed in October 31, 1959, with the U.S. Senate Foreign Relations Committee by the firm of Conlon Associates, Ltd. of San Francisco. The paper lists the firm as a private research firm, and says that it was hired by a committee.

Beyond that it does not identify either the committee that hired the firm nor what authority the firm possesses in the foreign affairs field.

However, it appears to put the stamp of approval on a new four-point program toward Red China. I vigorously dissent on all four points.

The four which the United Nations Advocate apparently approves are (1) Admit Red China to the United Nations, (2) Recognize the Nationalist Government on Formosa as a separate "Republic of Taiwan," (3) Enlarge the Security Council which now has five permanent members—by adding India and Japan as permanent members and (4) Give China's permanent seat on the Security Council to Red China.

Now, let's study these four proposals which apparently have the approval of the Oregon United Nations Association in Portland which issues the paper.

RED CHINA has been seeking admission to the United Nations for some time. She has tried to shoot her way in and tried to bargain her way in. The fact is that she wants admission to the United Nations because it gives her a sense of respectability, the thing she seeks most among other nations of the world.

What advantages would accrue to us were Red China admitted to the U.N.? The devotees of the U.N. will tell you that we would then be able to engage in free interchange of ideas with Red China, we would then be able to debate with her, and attempt to show her the error of her ways. Nothing could be more distant from the truth. Red China will

treat the rest of the world just the way it wants to. It has not been known to abide by any agreement that didn't suit its wishes. Puritanical reformers have failed to understand this fact of the Communist nations.

If the U.N. followers think that getting Red China to sign the Declaration of Human Rights means anything, I would call attention to the plight of Hungary at the hands of Russia . . . who did sign such a Declaration.

Admitting Red China to the United Nations would only work to the benefit of Red China. It would give her a foothold in the U.N., permit her to send her ambassadors at will throughout the length and breadth of the United States while denying us access or giving us at best controlled access to theirs. It would permit them to wield a heavy hand over the orientals in this country, blackmailing them into supporting the Red China cause.

And this would be but the beginning of the abuse which Red China would make of this unexpected stroke of good luck.

LET'S EXAMINE the second point. Recognize the Nationalist Government of Formosa as a separate "Republic of Taiwan." Here, too, someone is pushing up the wrong alley.

We already recognize the Nationalist Government as "Free China," and in comparison with Red China, that's exactly what it is.

If we now sell this group of people down the river by denying their claims to be the legitimate government of China, we slap another of our allies in the teeth and sell them out.

It doesn't make sense. One thing about it, though, is familiar, it's the same recommendation that keeps coming to us from sources listed in the past as communistic in nature.

SUGGESTION number three was to enlarge the Security Council to five members by adding Japan and India. I might add the question . . . "What for?"

Already the Security Council has ceased to function beyond that of a sounding board. Russian vetoes have completely snarled the Security Council, and prevented it from ever doing the job for which it was intended, namely, keeping the peace of the world. Adding two more nations to this board, one of them India, obviously a neutral, who all too many times in the past sided with Red China, and the other, Japan, a nation which we had to conquer in a bloody war, just doesn't make sense, either.

If the Security Council is impotent now, the addition of two more members will do little more than loosen any advantage that America might have with the present lineup of nations. Presently, in the voting this country can expect support from Great Britain, France and Nationalist China. Adding two more nations to this lineup will only be to the detriment of the United States.

THE FOURTH recommendation is even more detrimental to the welfare of the United States. If you were to give Red China the permanent seat on the Security Council, it would boot Nationalist China off the council, and with the aid of India and Japan, give the Communists the voting edge in the Security Council, and then force this country to resort to the veto to protect our rights.

Not only this, but it would be tantamount to recognition of Red China and a surrender of Nationalist China.

I DON'T KNOW who suggested these recommendations. They could certainly not have been suggested by anyone who had the

welfare of the United States at heart. They are suggestions that would do only one thing . . . elevate the Communist Chinese into the world of respectability at the expense of the United States.

Is this what the United Nations stands for? I would like to ask again . . . for all U.N. advocates to ask themselves . . . "Is this what the United Nations stands for?"

Cranberries

This business of weed killer being found in cranberries brings up a lot of interesting ideas. Nearly all home gardeners use weed killers these days to keep the dandelions and other broad-leaved weeds out of the lawns and flower borders.

Small youngsters play in the grass in the summertime and most small youngsters put nearly everything in sight into their mouths. We have a good sized dog population in Klamath County. Ever notice your dog chew up a clump of grass when he had an upset stomach?

If that weed killer worked its way through the plant and into the fruit of cranberries, isn't it pretty likely that the grass in the lawn and the flowers we raise may contain similar chemicals?

Sure, dogs get cancer now and then. We're pretty certain that a certain small percentage of them always have been prey to that killing disease.

Sheep get cancer, too, and they aren't usually exposed to a cultivated, weed-free lawn.

It's sort of like the surprising information that native islanders, who had never footed of any kind in their lives, were as subject to painful bunions as the elite fashionable ladies who forced their feet into too narrow high-heeled pumps.

Dr. Edwin B. Astwood, senior physician at New England Center Hospital and professor of medicine at Tufts College, had this to say about the weed killer reported in this year's cranberry crop: "The weed killer contains a compound which affects the thyroid gland. It inhibits its action. This remedy has been used in medicine for 15 years and in no way causes cancer. The quantity of this chemical in cranberries would be minute and in no way causes any trouble—let alone cancer. The compound occurs naturally in vegetables: mustard, cabbage, turnips and broccoli. And no one refrains from eating those because of this compound."

And what would Thanksgiving turkey taste like without cranberry sauce?

Wild Pig

Sacramento (To the Editor)—This is about pig—wild pig. One of Kipling's short stories was headed "Pig." It mentions the Dravidian or wild pig of Hindustan. In the good old days, Britain's lancers were trained on pigsticking. This writer once enjoyed the consequent feast. Kipling's yarn is worth rereading by anyone contemplating a horsetrade. It is a warning that galling revenge can come, as it did to Pinocchio.

Wild pig has a flavor all its own. One has it as wildschwein at a castle dinner in Czechoslovakia. Also as Sanglier in Napoleon's Corsica. Latter was the same wild boar a French King once chased up the spiral stairway to the roofgarden where the court ladies watched the hunt.

There is, however, also a New World wild boar dish. Writer once tasted it on a Mexican hacienda in the days when Diaz still was president. The haciendado had a hobby of redskin meals. He was pleased when we were interested. "You shall have a dish as Aztec as the chocolate you drink at my

table—as the avocado you eat there."

Big Increase In Population Poses Threat

NEW YORK (AP)—The American Public Health Assn. today warned of a threat to the health of millions, and called for more attention to the means of regulating family size.

The problem should be an integral part of civic health programs the association said.

In the first policy statement ever made on the subject by the 87-year-old professional society, it

said: "The public health profession has long taken leadership in defeating disease, disability and death. It must now assume equal leadership in understanding public health implications of population imbalance and in taking appropriate action."

The 13,000-member association includes public health officials at community, state, national and international levels.

It said current population increase "threatens the health and well-being of many millions of people."

In some areas, the statement said, the threat is malnutrition or outright starvation; in others, it is increased family stress, reduced educational opportunities, retarded industrial development, crippled economies.

"Especially lacking is scientific knowledge concerning human fertility," the association said.

Four Killed In Jet Crash

WINDSOR, Mo. (AP)—A burning B47 bomber crashed and exploded within 450 yards of a rural school near here Tuesday.

Four men aboard were presumed dead, the Air Force said. The plane was based at McConnell Air Force Base, Wichita, Kan.

Crewmen were Capt. Herbert J. Edwards, 36, Austin, Tex.; Maj. Edgar Jodoin, 35, Oxford, Mass.; Lt. Robert L. Westrup, 24, Albany, Ore., formerly of Lyons, Kan., and Airman James H. Redmond, 21, Bay Shore, N.Y. Only Westrup's body has been found.

Twenty-three pupils and their teacher were in the Hope Dale School eight miles northeast of Windsor when the plane blasted a 20-foot-deep crater beside a county road.

Three persons in a car were almost hit.

Mrs. Charles L. Bond, the driver, stopped the car when a 4-year-old passenger, Randy Wells, cried, "Look at the plane. Fire is falling."

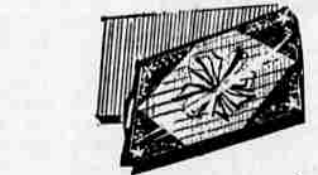
