Eastern Oregon Assessors To Meet Here Next Month

Eastern Oregon Assessors Association, a versatile crowd, meets here early in December to discuss a few problems and make a little music.

The occasion is the annual convention of the Eastern Oregon Assessors Association, of which Klamath County Assessor Hap Caldwell is president.

On the business side, assessors from Idaho to the Cascades will discuss in particular appraisals on timber, livestock, and machinery and equipment.

The theme is "Equality in Assessments" and is to be introduced by State Tax Commissioner Charley Mack, former Klamath County judge.

On the lighter side, the assessors plan a social hour, banquet, and dancing to a unique assessor-centered combo. Combo members are Rod Esselton, chief deputy assessor of Umatilla County, at the piano; Ray Schumacker, Jackson County assessor, bass viol, and Don Phelps of Klamath Falls, saxophone. Lincoln County Assessor Bob Kline will offer the vocals.

The two-day convention opens December 3 with registration in the assessor's office in the courthouse here, followed by a welcome address by Mayor Lawrence Slater in the VFW Hall on Klamath Avenue, headquarters for most activities.

Mack will speak at a no-host luncheon at the Willard Hotel that noon. The particular problems to be discussed in detail will be handled through committees. In each—timber, livestock, and machinery—interested taxpayers will be invited to join discussions and air their views, Caldwell said.

The meetings are to last all of the first afternoon, the timber group in the county courtroom, the livestock group in the county library and the machinery and equipment group in the VFW Hall.

Reports from all three committees will be made Friday morning, December 4, in the VFW Hall.

The program includes an informal social hour at the VFW Hall from 6 to 7 December 3, a banquet (without speeches) there at 7, and dancing with music by the combo beginning at 8 p.m.

Following adjournment December 4 about noon, Caldwell said interested persons would be offered a tour of the Klamath Basin, including the wildlife refuge at Tulelake.

Caldwell said the convention should attract from 175 to 200 assessors, deputy assessors, appraisers, and their wives.

New Benefits Set For Gals

Service in the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps between May 13, 1942, and September 29, 1943, may now be credited for establishing pension or compensation eligibility providing the woman veteran also had service in any branch of the Armed Forces after September 29, 1943, S. T. Brannock, Contact Representative, VA Domiciliary, Camp White, Oregon, said today.

A new law, enacted by the 86th Congress, provides that the required total of 90 days wartime service may be composed of two or more periods of service in World War II, such as WAAC service combined with WAC or other active service in the Armed Forces.

Moreover, 90 or more days service in the WAAC becomes active wartime service for pension eligibility when there is later active service even outside a war period.

A woman with disability incurred in, or aggravated by, service in the WAAC with subsequent active service in the Armed Forces, is entitled to disability compensation on the same basis as any other person whose disability resulted from disease or injury in active wartime service, Brannock added.

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Honor Slated Past Chief

TELELAKE — Sam Anderson, past president of the Tulelake Growers Association, will receive recognition at the 11th annual meeting of the National Potato Council, in session this week in Chicago.

Anderson left by air November 16 to attend the meeting. Presentation of the award will be in recognition of distinctive service given to the nation's potato industry.

Anderson, who assisted with organization of the National Potato Council, served as president of the local association in 1948-1949 and at present is engaged in organization of a California Potato

Growers Association.

Theme of the 1959 annual meeting is "Development of a Marketing Program to Meet Changing Demand."

Al Mercker, executive director of the council, will speak on "The 1959 Potato Outlook." There will also be a panel discussion on "Processed Potatoes In These Changing Times." Panel participants will be leaders in frozen, fresh, chips, granule and flake industries.

Research Chief Prefers Gas

EDGEWOOD, Md. (AP) — Lt. Gen. Arthur G. Trudeau, the Army's research and development chief, says he would "rather be gassed than shot" if he had to be a war casualty.

Trudeau defended gas as "the most humane system of warfare now in existence."

"We don't shoot condemned criminals, we use the most humane means—gas. Yet when we discuss gas as a weapon of war, there are those who throw up their hands in horror," he said.

Trudeau made his comments Tuesday in an interview with a Baltimore Sun reporter at the Army Chemical Center.

Dealer Bonds Change Noted

Oregon automobile dealers applying for a 1960 dealers license will have to provide a \$15,000 corporate surety bond before a dealers license is issued by the Department of Motor Vehicles. Motorcycle dealers will have to obtain a \$2,000 surety bond.

Previously, dealers have been able to obtain a license with a personal surety bond. The change is due to legislation passed at the last session.

Approximately 1,250 new and used car dealers, as well as motorcycle dealers, are due to renew their licenses on January 1.

Another change in dealer licensing, the department reminded, is the registration fee, which will be \$30 for auto dealers, plus \$10 for each additional plate. This will entitle use of the plates just as on ordinary passenger vehicles.
