Foresters Meet Opens

SAN FRANCISCO—Good forestry and good range management, working together, can make ponderosa pine forest lands produce both more timber and more forage than they are now producing, James E. Sowder told the Society of American Foresters at its 59th annual meeting now in session at San Francisco.

Sowder, chief of the division of station management for the U.S. Forest Service Experiment Station at St. Paul, Minn., reported the results of research he was responsible for while serving as leader of the Forest Service Research Center at Bend.

Research in eastern Oregon and Washington, Sowder said, suggests present growth of useful wood and forage for livestock and wildlife in the pine forests of the Pacific Northwest.
