10-Year-Old Is Talented

BUFFALO, N.Y. (UPI)—Andrew S. Morrison, 10, is described by his mother as just "one of these atomic-age children."

"He dreams about the moon, Mars, rockets and science," she says, "but he doesn't like to read the classics."

Andrew finds time for geology, chemistry, biology, astronomy, medicine, and his hobbies, which include history. He has stamp, fossil and rock collections, and he is probably the youngest ham radio operator in this city.

He runs two radio transmitters and receivers worth almost \$425 and has made about 250 contacts with points as far away as Wales and Puerto Rico.

Although Mrs. Morrison feels Andrew is a "gifted child," she considers him pretty normal for his age. He gets into "as much mischief" as any 10-year-old she says.

Forecast Is 'Cold Fact'

NEW YORK (UPI)—New York City's weatherman, Ernest J. Christie, tells this story to show what he thinks of long-range forecasting based on non-meteorological evidence.

"Far up in the North," Christie said, "a meteorologist noticed an Eskimo building an igloo with walls of almost double thickness. Deeply interested, the weather man decided the Eskimo somehow must know a severe winter was ahead."

Crowds Jam Gun Show

BRISTOW, Okla. (UPI)—Guns held an unusual fascination for people, as the Bristow National Gun Show proves every year.

More than 20,000 visited the 1958 show. They saw more than 10,000 guns valued at two million dollars displayed by about 200 dealers from 36 states. This year's exhibit featured collections from some 250 dealers in 40 states.

The Bristow show was founded six years ago and since then it has become the largest gun show to be held outside Chicago.

Two Bristow sportsmen, Jim Weaver and Ted Herman, started it. The first one was held in an old school building with 30 entries.

The only charges connected with the show are for table rentals to the gun dealers who exhibit their collections. No admission is charged.

The displays include both modern and antique guns, ranging in value from \$10 to \$5,000. About 30 per cent of the weapons are in firing condition.

Woman Has New Career

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)—Clare Soehngen Hodgins used knowledge gained in a slave labor camp to switch from fashion design to Atlas missiles.

The 35-year-old engineering draftsman, who joined Convair Astronautics in 1949, was born in Germany. She came to this country at the age of five and became a naturalized citizen. She was trained as a fashion designer.

The family returned to Germany in 1939 to claim an inheritance which had a catch—it had to be spent in Germany. Her parents planned to put Clare through a three-year art course with the funds.

But World War II came, and Mrs. Hodgins wound up working with slave laborers from France, Russia and Belgium in a factory. She was trained for the job in a drafting class and, because of her German birth, had several privileges which her fellow-workers did not have. She was a slave laborer by day and her movements were restricted at night.

Near the end of the war, she hid about a dozen American prisoners and shared her two meals a day allotment with them. She received kind words from an American officer who, she learned later, was the rough and tough Gen. George S. Patton Jr.

She returned to the U.S. in 1946 and worked in New York and Washington department stores before coming to California.

Mrs. Hodgins' war-time talents, earned in Germany, now are used on parts for the Atlas intercontinental ballistic missile. She and her husband, James, live in the San Diego area. They have no children.
