Beavers Take Webfoots, 15-7

EUGENE (AP)—Oregon State's fumbling Beavers got off to another frustrating start, then pulled themselves together here Saturday to upset mighty Oregon 15-7 in a climax to a previously dismal season.

That killed Oregon's last fading hopes for a Rose Bowl invitation. The Beavers tumbled the first two times they had the ball, presenting Oregon with a 7-0 lead after only 6 1/2 minutes of play.

Then came the comeback. The Beavers, who started the game with a 2-7 record compared to Oregon's 8-1, drove 32 yards to a touchdown and added a 30-yard field goal to take a 9-7 lead by halftime.

Don Kasso, a spraddled-legged halfback who seemed not to be bothered by the slippery footing that hampered everyone else, scored State's first touchdown and set up a clinching four-quarter touchdown with a 27-yard run.

Kasso rambled 17 yards for his first score, turning left end, then spinning from the arms of five tacklers before reaching the end zone.

In the final quarter, after halfback Amos Marsh intercepted a pass in Oregon territory, Kasso again turned end, cut back and raced 27 yards to the Oregon 4.

From there, fullback Jim Stinette took three cracks at the line, going over for the touchdown on a dive for the final yard.

Excellent kicking played a big part in the State victory. It was Marsh who kicked the field goal

from an angle and halfback Dainard Paulsen, who repeatedly rocked Oregon back with his punting.

The final blow was a 60-yard quick kick by Paulsen to the Oregon 3 in the closing minutes. Oregon never could come out from the shadow of its goal.

Upsets have become the rule in this game between traditional rivals, but Oregon, a one-touchdown favorite, started out as if to escape one this year.

Quarterback Dave Gross jumped on a fumble by Kasso in

the early minutes on the State 21. In six plays, Oregon went ahead, scoring from the five on a pass from halfback Cleveland Jones to halfback Willie West.

The Beavers came up with a stout defense thereafter, and managed to hold their season-long plague of fumbles to just one more bobble, that one not costly.

In fact, it was an Oregon fumble that enabled the Beavers to go ahead after Kasso had scored to cut the margin to 7-0. Fullback Harry Needham of Oregon tum-

bled and Stinette recovered on the Oregon 42.

Six plays moved the ball only to the Oregon 24, so on a fourth-down play Marsh dropped back and kicked a field goal.

Then in the last half, State defenders intercepted three Oregon passes, one of them leading to the final touchdown.

Earlier rains made the turf slippery, but the game was played under fair skies with a Homecoming crowd of 22,500 on hand.

"So when are the All-Conference teams coming out?" — This question I've been asked numerous times since football was concluded on the local scene.

I'll bite — I'm curious too. Of course I realize that, in past years, the Herald and News, in conjunction with Oregon Collegiate and Southern Oregon Conference coaches, has always published All-Conference teams of its own.

There will be All-Star teams picked, of course . . . but this year there will be only one for each conference. The Medford Mail-Tribune will pick the Southern Oregon (prep) squad, while the Oregon Collegiate Conference Headquarters will post the one for the colleges.

I'll probably be asked the reason why we no longer pick one. Just in case . . . here's the answer.

The way I see it . . . All-Everything teams are being overdone. . . . From the All-Americans on down, or up, as you will.

On our local level, it seems to me that the edge is taken off the honor when the picture is clouded by the announcement of two, three or more star teams. When only one team is picked, and that by conference coaches, the selection of a player means something.

I realize that it is possible a deserving player may be missed occasionally . . . but not very often. All too often (not just in our case, either), a local player, one who is seen in action the most often, gets an All-Star call just because he's a great kid, or that we know him well.

But I've always had a hunch that the boy involved doesn't usually feel particularly honored. Usually he knows whether there might have been a more logical choice. Naturally the lad is glad that he has been noticed and is grateful for the support of fans and friends, but if he met a boy whom he thought outplayed him during the season, being selected "best" could possibly leave kind of an ashy taste in his mouth.

Add Things That Are Probably None of My Business. . . . It seems that both KFLW and Ka-GO are planning to broadcast the Pelican basketball games this winter . . . and neither will air the Owl games. This makes for at least a crowded seat in the press box at KU and leaves much space at OTI. And they say a football bonanza is funny.

The thought has occurred to me that perhaps home games for both clubs could be ignored by local radio . . . and that games played away from home by both teams should be covered. This makes sense to me . . . obviously one of the reasons I work for the paper rather than one of our radio stations.

Tonight at 6:30 in the Oregon Tech cafeteria Klamath Falls football fans will gather to pay tribute to a fine bunch of boys, the Oregon Collegiate Conference champion 1959 Owls, at the annual gridiron banquet.

This ball team, not necessarily the greatest team ever to play football at Oregon Tech, is a shining example of what real desire can do toward winning a football championship. There might, possibly, be a better team in the conference, ability-wise, but there is only one champion . . . the Owls . . . and they deserve the name.

Speaking of the Owls and the banquet . . . tonight live trophies will be presented to boys on the team for their performances during the season. Seems to me that OTI fans who saw most of the games this season might get a kick out of jotting down the names of players whom they feel might be selected and comparing

OTI Adds Wrestling To Slate

A nucleus of possibly 30 experienced wrestlers are expected to register by November 30 when Oregon Tech officially adds intercollegiate wrestling to the Mile High athletic curriculum.

The decision to add a wrestling program to the school's athletic activities was made and approved by the Athletic Council at a meeting held Thursday on the campus. W. D. Purvine, Oregon Tech director, added his approval to that of the board almost immediately.

Rex Hunsaker, athletic director, commented, "We have added wrestling to our program simply because of the demand on the part of our students. This is a one year trial program, to be continued or discontinued, dependent entirely upon the reception and participation on the part of the athletes."

George Miller, who also serves as line coach for the Owl football teams and head track coach, will step in as head of the mat program.

Miller is well qualified for the new post. In college at Franklin and Marshall, one of the nation's leading wrestling schools, Miller ranked among the top heavyweights. He continued the sport at the University of Denver. During his military service Miller was both heavyweight wrestling a no boxing champion at Lowry Field (Denver).

At previous posts prior to Oregon Tech, Miller has served in a number of wrestling capacities. The matter of scheduling opponents for the Owl wrestling contingent during the coming season will be discussed this next week, and when OCC coaches and officials hold their annual meeting in Portland, OTI matmen will vie on an intercollegiate level with schools outside the conference as well as those inside.

"Wrestling is becoming more and more popular throughout the country—the primary reason, I believe, is because it is a sport that gives the small man, or any size, for that matter, a chance to compete personally on an equal basis. We are starting it at OTI in response to a demand from our athletes," said Miller.

In answer to a query as to the value of wrestling training to the average football player, Miller said, "I believe it is ideal. Learning the quick moves, the agility with arms, legs, hands and feet, is especially good for defensive linemen. At Franklin and Marshall (Lancaster, Pa.) wrestling was a must for football players—a part of the program."

Bob Allison, 25, of Raytown, Kansas, led the American League in triples last season with nine. The rookie hit 30 homers for Washington.

Next weekend in Portland, the Oregon School Activities Association will hold its annual meeting. One of the chief items to be discussed will be the proposal to drop prep championship competition, at least in football. Uclans Dump Trojans, 10-3

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Underestimated UCLA shocked Southern California Saturday with a field goal and a touchdown in the fourth quarter—blasting the heavily favored Trojans out of the nation's unbeaten ranks with a 10-3 victory.

Halfback Bill Kilmer electrified the crowd of 35,917 as he led UCLA 87 yards, winding up with a 31-yard field goal by Ivory Jones to tie the score at 3-3.

Then the aroused Bruins put on an 80-yard drive, steered by Kilmer and won one of the sweetest triumphs in UCLA history. Fullback Ray Smith smashed through the right side of the big Trojan line for the winning touchdown.

Southern Cal ranked fourth in The Associated Press poll, went into the game favored by at least nine points to run its winning streak to three straight.

The Trojans cashed in on a break in the first few minutes of the game and turned it into a field goal. Gene Gaines fumbled on the first series from scrimmage and the Trojans recovered on the UCLA 34.

Washington Wins 20-0; RB Path Virtually Cleared

SEATTLE (AP)—The musclemen of Washington, brilliantly quarterbacked by one-eyed Bob Schloredt, overpowered the Cougars of Washington state 20-0 Saturday before the largest football crowd in Pacific Northwest history, almost certainly clinching the western bid to the Rose Bowl.

Coupled with Oregon State's defeat of Oregon, the Huskies triumph left the Rose Bowl selection vote by Western athletic directors a mere formality. At the same time Wisconsin's victory in the Midwest tabbed it as Washington's likely Rose Bowl opponent.

Fifty-six thousand fans overflowing in Washington's 53,000-capacity stadium watched the powerful Huskies completely squelch their old cross-state rivals. Only twice did the Cougars threaten, one drive ending with a missed field goal and the other in an intercepted pass.

Schloredt saw one first quarter drive fizzle in a fumble on the Cougar 20, but brought his musclemen back in an 80-yard march that brought a touchdown on the first play of the second quarter.

It was the only tally of the first half, although George Fleming, who kicked the conversion, twice tried and missed long field goals.
