Washington had no trouble with Washington State, 20-0, to gain the West Coast nomination.

ORANGE BOWL — Missouri vs. probably Miami (Fla.). Missouri wrapped up second place in the Big Eight by downing Kansas, 13-9, and nailing down the berth. Oklahoma stopped Iowa State and wrapped up its 12th straight Big Eight title, but the Sooners were at the Orange Bowl last year and can't return.

Miami, which upset Michigan State, 18-13, Friday night, will get the host spot if the Hurricanes beat Florida next week. They should have no trouble.

SUGAR BOWL — Probably Louisiana State vs. Mississippi. LSU, which swept past Tulane, 14-6, has been offered one spot and will vote on it Sunday. The unofficial word is that Mississippi has been invited as LSU's opponent.

COTTON BOWL — Syracuse accepted a week ago, and it will be Texas if the Longhorns polish off weak Texas A&M Thanksgiving Day.

BLUEBONNET BOWL — Texas Christian slaughtered Rice, 35-6, and promptly was tapped for the Houston game Dec. 19. Speculation now is centering on Georgia and Georgia Tech, which play each other in the regular season finale next week. Georgia already has won the Southeastern Conference title.

LIBERTY BOWL — Penn State has the invitation for the asking and officials said the Nittany Lions' defeat by Pitt has not changed the situation. The second team still hasn't been named, but both South Carolina and Alabama are eager to play in a bowl. South Carolina halted North Carolina State, 12-7, while Alabama beat Memphis State 14-7.

GATOR BOWL — Arkansas, which came out on top of Texas Tech, 27-8, is in. Opponent not named but probably Clemson, which won the Atlantic Coast Conference title with a 33-31 squeaker over Wake Forest.

Chiloquin 'Darkhorses' Plan To Shake Up County Cage Foe

CHILOQUIN — With all but one regular returning from last season, the Chiloquin Panthers, rated a possible "darkhorse" for the 1959-60 County Basketball title, swing into their third week of practice.

The first taste of action in the new season will be one of two county tournaments December 4 and 5, when the tall Panthers play host to three other county schools. Pitted in the tourney will be Bly against Gilchrist and Chiloquin against Sacred Heart Academy in the Friday openers.

Making up the six returning lettermen from last year's Panther crew are seniors Ron Hoggarth, who stands 6-1, John Ochoa, 5-10,

Lyle Hall, 6-1, and Hubert LeBeau, 5-8, and Juniors Paul Harris, 6-2 1/2, and Frank Hegland, 6-0. The lone graduate last year was Dennis Cunningham.

"I am not going to commit myself on our chances this season," remarked Panther coach Gordon Kuist. "We are going to take our time and play them one at a time. But I will say we should be better."

Last year the Chiloquinites posted a 5-win, 6-loss record to nab fifth place in league action while grabbing fourth in county tourney.

In Ochoa and Hoggarth, Kuist has two of the better scorers in the county while Hall and Harris are a pair of the stronger rebounders county-wide. Ochoa finished fifth in the league last year with an 11.5 average in 16 games and tied for 10th in the tourney with an 8.6 mark in three tests. Hoggarth tied for eighth place in league play with an 11.1 mark in 19 and ranked second in the county with a 14.3 mark in three tests.

Other members of the current varsity squad are senior Wayne Bricco, 5-10, and juniors, Doug Van Wormer, 5-10, Ken Hoback, 5-9, and Ed Case, 5-10.

Vandals Win Finale, 9-6

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) — The Idaho Vandals, struggling to prevent a season shutout, turned pass interceptions and blocked kicks into a 9-6 victory over the Montana Grizzlies Saturday.

A chilled crowd of about 3,000 watched the Vandals register their first win in 10 starts with a short scoring spurt consisting of a touchdown, extra point and safety early in the second quarter.

John Kyle provided the spark for Idaho, intercepting a pass to give the Vandals the ball on their own 37 after the Grizzlies had scored first. Then he carried 28 yards to the Montana 35 for the key run in the scoring drive.

Mike Sheeran bulled over for the Idaho score from the five and Ron Ismael put the Vandals ahead 7-6 with his extra point kick.

Hardin Re-Inks With Navy

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Y. A. Tittle 'Home' For Contest, But Fans Will Root For Unitas

Y. A. Tittle comes "home" to Baltimore Sunday to match tactics with Johnny Unitas, the quarterback who replaced him in the hearts of rabid Colt fans. The Western Conference lead of the National Football League is the prize, and the Colts are seven-point favorites to grab a share of it from the front-running San Francisco 49ers.

Tittle, the 12-year pro from LSU, is on the spot. San Francisco Coach Red Hickey says Y. A. will be the starting quarterback. But only last Sunday Hickey yanked Tittle after the veteran threw two poor passes early in the 49ers' 14-3 loss to the Chicago Bears.

But sub John Brodie did no better, so Y. A. must return to the form he showed in the 49ers' first seven games. He must do it before the Baltimore fans who loved him when he quarterbacked the old Colts of 1948-49-50 and kept on cheering for him when he went to San Francisco.

Sunday, however, the Baltimore

cheers will be for Unitas, who has thrown 22 touchdowns passes this season, passed for at least one score in 33 consecutive league games and needs only seven more scoring passes to break the season record set by Sid Luckman of the Bears in 1943.

San Francisco has never won a divisional crown in its 13 full seasons, but a victory by the 49ers (6-2) would put them two games up on the Colts (5-3) with only three games to play and all but

crush Baltimore hopes of repeating its Western and NFL titles. A Colt victory would result in a first-place tie and make the Dec. 5 Baltimore tie at San Francisco game the stepping stone into the NFL Dec. 27 title game against the Eastern Conference winner.

The Cleveland Browns, driving hard to regain the Eastern crown they lost to the New York Giants last season, are nine-point favorites over the visiting Pittsburgh Steelers. The Steelers (3-4-1) clipped the Giants 19-9 last week, enabling the Browns to move into a first-place Eastern tie with the Giants at 6-2. The Giants, who haven't scored a touchdown in their last nine quarters, are five-point favorites over the Chicago Cardinals (2-6) at Minneapolis.

In other games, the Los Angeles Rams (2-6) are at Philadelphia with the Eagle (5-3) favored by four points; the Washington Redskins (3-5) are five-point underdogs to the Packers (3-5) at Green Bay, and the Chicago Bears (4-4) are favored by five over the Lions (2-5-1) at Detroit.

AFL Draft Challenges NFL Stature

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — The fledgling American Football League challenge the entrenched and powerful National Football League Monday.

In a draft to fill the rosters of eight teams from New York to Los Angeles and south to Texas it will select 500 to 600 college seniors including such stars as Don Meredith of Southern Methodist, Billy Cannon of LSU, Ron Burton of Northwestern and Penn State's Richie Lucas.

Naming them and keeping them are two different chores, however. The real showdown will come after the National League holds its annual draft Nov. 30.

Players drafted by both conferences will be up for the highest — or most persuasive — bidder. The result could be a spectacular dollar duel.

The AFL plans to be operating next year in New York, Boston, Buffalo, Dallas, Houston, Minneapolis-St. Paul, Denver and Los Angeles. In most of those cities it is backed by impressive wealth.

The biggest lure the new league will have for this year's crop of college seniors is job opportunity. Veteran-loaded NFL teams rarely keep more than a handful of rookies each year. In the American League nearly 300 jobs will be opening up.

On the other hand, of course, nobody can say the new league definitely will open next year — or that it will stay open.

The drafting Monday opens with a round in which each team gets first call on any player at a school within 100 miles radius of the selecting team.

To make sure that all clubs get a hard core of over-all strength — the plan is to fill all 11 squads' positions for each team in the first 11 rounds, held in open session.
