MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Miami's Hurricanes, a young but eager football team led by 152-pound Fran Curci, stood within one victory of an Orange Bowl berth today after an 18-13 upset of Michigan State Friday night. By beating Florida in their final game this week, the Hurricanes can clinch an invitation to meet the Big Eight runner-up in the Miami bowl New Year's Day. Michigan State's Big Ten co-leaders were in the running for the Rose Bowl but their position was less hopeful. They'll go to Pasadena only if Northwestern and Wisconsin are beaten or tied in their closing games Saturday.

Leonard Conquers Thomson

MELBOURNE (AP) — Australia's Peter Thomson and Kel Nagle won the Canada Cup golf title by 10 whopping strokes over the United States Saturday, but Canada's Stan Leonard beat out Thomson in a dramatic extra-hole playoff for the individual crown. The second successive playoff in individual competition became necessary when Thomson and Leonard finished in a 72-hole tie at 275 after Thomson missed a 14-foot birdie putt on the final hole.

On the 424-yard extra hole both had good drives. Leonard led his approach shot just on the fringe of the green 30 feet from the pin. Thomson was wide about 25 feet over a small hump. Leonard putted to within six inches for a par 4. Thomson chipped. The ball skimmed nine feet past the cup and his putt curled around the cup's lip and stayed out.

This history repeated itself in this international competition. Leonard won the individual crown in 1954 at Montreal, Canada, when Thomson and Nagle won the team crown for Australia.

America's Sam Snead and Cary Middlecoff, who dropped out of contention Friday, climaxed their campaign with a pair of even-par 70s to eke out second place from Canada with a 573.

Canada had a 574 on a sparkling 70 by Leonard and a scrambling 77 by rangy Al Balding.

Chicago Cubs Begin Trades

CHICAGO (AP) — The Chicago Cubs traded pitcher Dave Hillman and infielder Jim Marshall to the Red Sox today for first baseman Dick Gernert.

It was one of the first deals under the major leagues' new 21-day interleague trading period which began today. Hillman last season had an 8-11 record in 39 appearances, posting a 3.44 ERA.

Tornado, Democrats To Clash After Smashing Friday Wins

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS — For the second straight year it will be Jefferson of Portland vs. Medford in the final of the Oregon Class A-1 high school football championship.

Both won impressive victories in semifinal games Friday night. Defending state champion Jefferson, ranked No. 2 behind Medford in the Associated Press poll, rolled over David Douglas of Portland, 33-0. Douglas was the No. 8 team in the poll. Medford crushed sixth-ranked South Salem, 42-6, scoring in every quarter.

Willie Toweel Makes A Hit With Victory

NEW YORK (AP)—Willie Toweel can come back anytime. The former British Empire lightweight champ from Johannesburg, South Africa made a hit Friday night in winning a split decision over Philadelphia's Len Matthews.

It wasn't Toweel's victory that inspired the enthusiasm. In fact, there were many who thought Matthews deserved an edge. The thing that caught the crowd's fancy at Madison Square Garden was Willie's skill in avoiding a knockout after being knocked down twice in the eighth round. Under New York rules, it is an automatic TKO when a fighter is down three times in one round.

"I knew what I was doing all the time," said Willie later. "I knew about the three-knockdown rule. When I got up the second time I said to myself, 'He's not going to get me. I'm going to run.'"

In the ninth Toweel boxed his way out of trouble after a heavy body barrage. All night long he stuck an annoying jab in Matthews' face and kept dropping an overhand right to the jaw or bringing up a right uppercut to counter Len's furious advances.

Both Referee Harry Ebbets (5-4-1) and Judge Artie Aidala (6-3-1) voted for Toweel. Judge Ray Kozak had it 5-3 in rounds but voted for Matthews on points 9-5. The AP card was 5-4-1 for Toweel.

Mel Renfro, who broke the Portland league scoring record this season led Jefferson as usual. After Mike Wyborney had scored on a three-yard plunge, Renfro put his team two touchdowns up by returning a punt 79 yards into the Douglas end zone. He scored later on a six-yard run.

It was the 34th straight victory over a three-year span for the Portland League champions, who outgained Douglas 433 net yards to 214.

At Salem Medford, which lost 21-7 to Jefferson in the championship final last year, scored the first time it got the ball, marching 77 yards on 10 plays. Mike Hood swept left end 5 yards for the touchdown.

Shortly afterward, Medford recovered a fumble on the South Salem 8-yard line. On the first play Skip Bennett scored the game's second touchdown.

South Salem looked as if it might get back into the contest when Ken Sawyer ran 60 yards from scrimmage for a touchdown before the end of the first period. But when Medford blocked the kick for conversion, the Saxons still trailed, 14-6.

Before it was over Hood had scored two more touchdowns, on a 31-yard run from scrimmage and an 89-yard kickoff return. Bennett scored again on an 8-yard dash.

Celtics Ache, Groan Route To Triumph

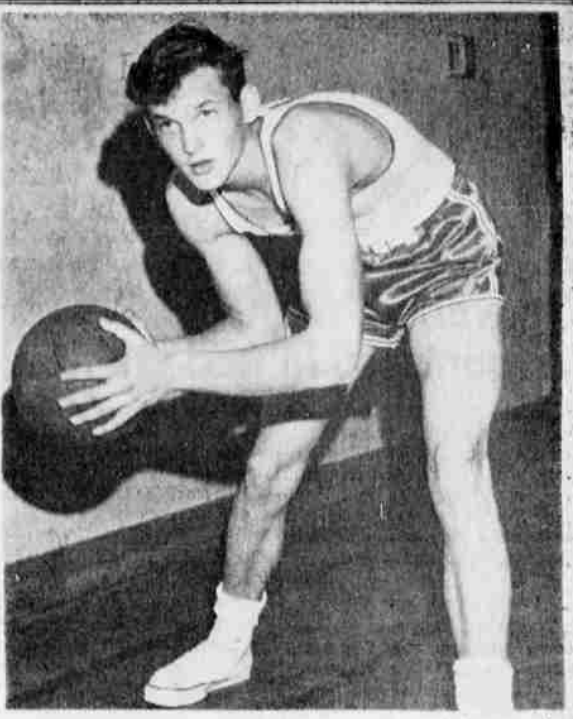
By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS —The Boston Celtics are aching in every joint and muscle but you never would know it from the way they continue to pile up victories in the National Basketball Assn.

With six players nursing injuries the Celtics defeated the Syracuse Nationals 114-101 Friday night as two healthy members, Bob Cousy and Bill Sharman, tallied 19 and 25 points, respectively. All the injured players, including Bill Russell who has a swollen left ankle, got into the game but they were unable to contribute 17 points and 26 rebounds.

The victory was the Celtics' 12th in 14 games and strengthened their hold on first place in the Eastern division as the Philadelphia Warriors went down to their third defeat. The St. Louis Hawks held Wilt Chamberlain to 24 points, his lowest output of the season, and won 118-117 on Bob Pettit's 15-foot jump shot 38 seconds before the end.

Pettit led the Hawks with 28 points but was topped by Philadelphia veteran Paul Arizin, who put on a one-man show in bringing the Warriors from a 22-point first half deficit to a 74-73 lead midway of the third period. He ended up with 44 points for a career high.

The Minneapolis Lakers also played without their ace, flu-ridden Elgin Baylor, but had no trouble defeating Detroit 105-85.
