WALL STREET
NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market closed mixed today in heavy trading. The ticker tape was late. Electronics issues were well ahead.

Volume for the day was estimated at 3,200,000 shares compared with 2,900,000 Friday.

Gains and losses of key stocks were mainly held within a point although some gainers went from 2 to 4 points.

The "glamour" issues outperformed the market, Zenith rising well over 5 and Varian Associates about 4 while Ampex wiped out a loss of more than 6 and showed a net rise of more than a point. Thiokol added a couple of points and General Tire was more than a point. Texas Instruments was clipped for a profit taking loss of more than 3.

Among the more conventional issues, General Electric spurted more than 4, Merck more than 3 and Eastman Kodak more than 2. Coppers were irregular. U.S. government bonds turned mixed.

Americans Die In Air Crash

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — An Afghan airliner crashed in flames onto a hilltop near Beirut Saturday night, killing 24 persons including two Americans. Three passengers survived.

The Americans were listed as Gordon Hay Clark, 48, a Nebraska physician, en route to Kabul from Rome and Frank William Shepherd, 51, an accountant en route from London to Kabul.

Both Americans were reported employed in Afghanistan. Their hometowns were not immediately available.

Laos To Pull UN Complaint

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) —

Laos is reported planning to withdraw her complaint to the U.N. against North Viet Nam in an effort to ease her relations with that Communist country and Red China.

Authoritative diplomatic sources said both India and U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld had urged the Laotian government to withdraw its charges that the North Vietnamese committed aggression by their aid to Communist Laotian rebels.

The informants said Laos could send Hammarskjöld a letter within two weeks saying conditions no longer were as they were on Sept. 4, when Laotian Foreign Minister Khamphan Panya cabled Hammarskjöld that his country faced "flagrant aggression" from North Viet Nam.

This would enable the Security Council to strike the Laotian case from its standing agenda. Hammarskjöld for all practical purposes took the matter over recently when he made a flying inspection trip to Vietnam, the Laotian capital.

Timber Firm Lists Change

TACOMA—Weyerhaeuser Company

today announced changes in its officers to be effective February 1, 1960. Norton Clapp of Seattle, well known Pacific Northwest business leader, has been elected president, succeeding F. K. Weyerhaeuser who will become chairman of the board.

Clapp, chairman of the board since March, 1957, was elected after Weyerhaeuser announced his retirement as president effective February 1.

The Weyerhaeuser elections took place here November 18 at a meeting of the company's board of directors.

Weyerhaeuser has been president of the company since December, 1956, at which time he succeeded his brother, J. P. Weyerhaeuser Jr., after the latter's death. F. K. Weyerhaeuser served as chairman of the board from March, 1955, until taking over the presidency in 1956.

Clapp joined Weyerhaeuser's board of directors in 1946. He was named vice president and a member of the board's executive committee in March, 1955.

He is president of Laird, Norton Company, and is a director of the General Insurance Company of Seattle.

He serves as a member of the national executive board of the Boy Scouts of America and is a trustee of the College of Puget Sound, Tacoma, and the University of Chicago. He is a graduate of Occidental College of Los Angeles and of the University of Chicago.

F. K. Weyerhaeuser served as president of the company during a period of expansion, highlighted in February, 1957, by the merger with Kieckhefer Container Company and the Eddy Paper Corporation.

Mao Trying Summit Delay

LONDON (UPI)—Chinese

Communist leader Mao Tse-tung is trying to sabotage an East-West summit conference for the second time, diplomatic dispatches reported today.

Mao succeeded in blocking a summit conference in August, 1958, after an emergency meeting in Peking between Premier Nikita Khrushchev and now is slowing down Russian pressure for an early summit meeting.

Diplomatic sources said there has been an almost total absence of pressure from Moscow for a top-level meeting and that Khrushchev himself has been notably silent on the conference he long has demanded.

Communist affairs experts said behind Peiping's desire to thwart a top-level East-West meeting was a suspicion of independent Soviet moves at Red China's expense.

There also was Peiping's anxiety that a meeting involving the leaders of the Soviet, United States, Britain and France would tend to exclude Red China from international councils for a long time to come.

Cuban Labor Rejects Reds

HAVANA (AP) — The Cuban

Confederation of Labor today elected an executive committee made up entirely of members of Fidel Castro's revolutionary party and rejected a Communist party bid for posts on the labor high command.

Despite the rebuff to the organized Reds, informed sources said the 13-man group elected early today by the 10th National Labor Congress included several former Communists and some Communist sympathizers.

Heading the group is Secretary General David Salvador, Castro's choice installed last Jan. 1 when the revolution triumphed and an outspoken critic of the United States.

The election by a roaring voice vote ended the congress after a tumultuous final session of wrangling which lasted most of the night.

Earlier the congress withdrew the Cuban Confederation from the anti-Communist Inter-American Regional Organization of Workers and set out to organize a new "Revolutionary Confederation of Latin American Workers."

A congress resolution charged the IAROW was under the control of "American imperialism, which has consistently supported all dictators."

The delegates also proposed a handful of other resolutions bristling with attacks on the United States.

These included a denunciation of U.S. "monopolists and the State Department" for "opposing just efforts of the Latin-American people to achieve their rights."

Another assailed Latin-American dictatorships "who are supported by the United States."
