

KUHS NEWS VIEWS

Members of Student Council survived a long, hectic meeting Thursday afternoon, when they acted on a full slate of business in a two-hour meeting held in the orchestra room after school.

After the first formalities of opening the meeting, the council got down to business with the question of the Polio Drive, which the students conduct annually, called "Teens Against Polio."

Sharon Vincze, head of the drive, asked the council what the students in their first period classes thought about the two plans of organizing the drive.

Plan one calls for the drive to be organized with competition between classes. The other suggestion is for KU to challenge Medford on the amount of proceeds earned from the drive.

Heavy debate followed on both proposals, with a third plan offered—that of competition between classes and Medford. Some students felt competition between classes was better, because, as they pointed out, Medford's sophomore class brought in more than all of KU last year and that there is already too much rivalry between the schools and this would make the "block" larger.

Some members insisted that competition between Medford would enhance the drive considerably, and thus bring more money for the very worthy cause. Others, however, cited that students might get off from the true purpose of helping victims of polio, and would be thinking more of beating someone and winning the prize.

This was settled when Sharon Vincze announced that she would get statistics on Medford's drive last year and their chances compared to ours, and give them to the representatives to discuss with their class and bring to the next meeting.

Next, Mr. Glenn Tierrier, adviser for Pelican Service Club, asked the council if they would pay 50 per cent of the cost of 15 sweaters for the members of Pelican Service Club. He said the club would pay 25 per cent and the Athletic Department would pay 25 per cent.

He emphasized that the members of Pelican Service Club need these sweaters as uniforms to distinguish them from other students when they are doing their job of service by working at the games. It would also be a nice reward to them for the work they do for the school. The council then voted to give them the money.

Also in committee reports was the report on the progress of the traffic control regulations by committee representative, Sharon O'Brien.

She related that almost "no body" is parking in the supervised parking area. They are parking along the streets, behind school or elsewhere or leaving their cars home. They sold about 175 parking stickers to students, but at the most 20 have parked in the area. Also they are having trouble with students leaving the area and some of the other points in the plan, which they are working to change.

A meeting of the Traffic Control Committee has been called, in which the members hope to iron out the problems.

The council then voted to conduct a contest for the naming of the Student Directory, which is being planned.

Under old business it was announced that the request of the city merchants for the student body sponsorship of the annual Christmas parade was withdrawn by the merchants due to students' uncertainty of the plan.

Under new business, the council discussed ideas for the Student Council Christmas project.

Some ideas included helping people at the Klamath County Nursing Home and the children's ward. An amateur hour was also suggested for them.

The council did decide to have a Christmas tree in a corner in the cafeteria.

Ann Anderson, representing the assembly committee, reported that there will be a special Thanksgiving Assembly next Wednesday during the second period. Half of the school will go at a time to the program, which will feature Father Greene and the A.C. Choir.

Mikell Thurston, student body president, thanked everyone for their cooperation and patience and assured them steps would be taken to shorten the meetings hereafter.

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Equipment To Be Shown

Poe Valley Soil Conservation District will sponsor a demonstration of a new type of earth moving machinery at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, November 24, at the L. L. Porterfield ranch two miles west of Dairy.

Equipment to be shown in operation is the Be-Ge Roto-haul scraper. J. W. Kerns will provide the scraper and tractor for the demonstration in cooperation with the Soil Conservation District.

The roto-haul scraper has been used in other parts of the country for terracing, grassed waterways, pond building, and other earth moving work but has not been tried in this area. It is a self loading machine with rubber tires designed to be used with farm tractors and, if successful here, might be useful in land leveling and other earth moving work.

De Soto Cars May Be Cut

DETROIT (AP) — Discontinuation of the medium-priced Edsel revived speculation in the auto industry today that Chrysler Corp. may drop its slow-selling De Soto line.

Such rumors have been prevalent in industry circles for several years, but have been denied every time they have cropped up. They were denied again today by a Chrysler spokesman who referred to an announcement of last March that 25 million dollars was being invested over a three-year period in De Soto styling and engineering.

At that time Chrysler President L. L. Colbert said De Soto will remain in business "as far as Chrysler Corp. can look into the future."

One month before Colbert's statement, Henry Ford II told Edsel dealers the Edsel was here to stay. Thursday Ford dropped Edsel, never a good seller.

Production figures show that only three autos are selling at a slower pace than the De Soto. These are Chrysler's Imperial, Ford's Lincoln and the Edsel, in that order.

De Soto production for the 1959 calendar year so far totals only slightly more than 30,000 units. The 1960 De Soto line is limited to six models.

Pope Library Opening Held

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP)—The 4-million-dollar Pius XII Memorial Library here, containing microfilms of the Vatican Library, was dedicated Sunday, less than 14 months after the death of the Pontiff.

A group of Catholic dignitaries, educators and civic leaders attended the ceremonies, part of a two-day celebration that includes founders day events today. Archbishop Egidio Vagnozzi, apostolic delegate to the United States, blessed the glass and masonry structure and predicted it would give impetus to students in the Western Hemisphere by making possible a deeper study of medieval history. This study, the archbishop said, will provide greater awareness of the church's important role in promoting and preserving western civilization.

Thousands of articles have been written about the sad situation. Millions have died, lost a little weight, became discouraged and gone right back to eating and gaining.

Tops is set up on the theory that obesity is not like the measles or any other short term illness. It is an incurable affliction such as diabetes, alcoholism and many other diseases that can be controlled by following treatment prescribed by a physician.

Tops clubs have won wholehearted approval of the medical profession. Members are women who understand what a battle it is to take off weight and keep it off.

The local group meets once a week at 7:30 p.m. in the Community Lounge on North Seventh Street, weigh in, pay a penalty

if there is gain over the previous week. They talk over triumphs and problems and encourage others to keep up the good work. The members are eager to help others. If interested, any woman may join.

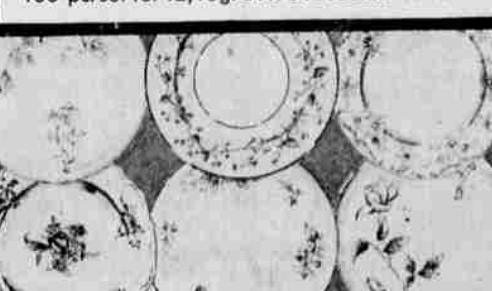

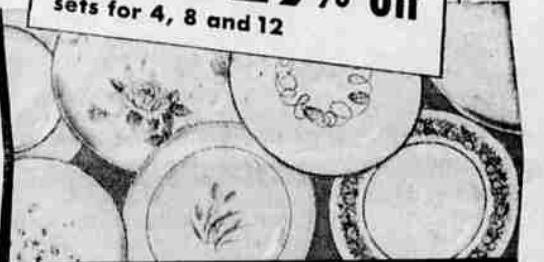
