

New Musical 'Fiorello!' Big Success

NEW YORK (AP) — An explosive little man who once stood New York City on its political ear gets a rousing salute in the new Broadway musical, "Fiorello!"

The show, an arrival Monday night at the Broadhurst Theater, is an entertainment landslide even for a spectator from afar who may somehow have missed hearing of the preliminary years of Fiorello H. La Guardia, the reform mayor of the big town in the 1930s and 40s.

Mixing sentiment, satire and elections, "Fiorello!" rampages through the zealous era from World War I into the roaring 1920's. The frenzied rhythms of the period gives director George Abbott full opportunity to indulge his flair for high-pitched movement and coloration.

In the title role a Broadway newcomer, Tom Bosley, performs with polished verve in interpreting the bombastic outer eccentricities and the compunctions beneath the surface La Guardia.

Outstanding in their roles are Patricia Wilson and Ellen Hanley, two charming singers; Pat Stanley, a gamine dancing sprite; and Howard Da Silva, the epitome of political ward bosses.

Composer Jerry Bock and lyricist Sheldon Harnick have fitted "Fiorello!" with several lively melodies and Peter Gennaro has steered the dancing contingent with vigor and precision.

There wasn't much advance

hallyhoo for "Fiorello!" but it is a sturdy new plank in Broadway's platform for the current show business campaign.

When the Klamath Krater, KU's student newspaper, came out on Friday, some of the members on the staff were questioned by students on why the paper is coming out only once a month. In the issue Linda Gunderson explained in her editorial why the Krater is only putting out 10 issues this year.

The reason is higher costs in putting out the paper, which the financial status of the Krater can't cover. Krater gets its money from advertising and is also allotted \$1.00 from every script book sold to students.

Realizing this, a Krater official went to Student Council with three proposed plans, asking for additional money to help put out the paper. They were to put out 18, 12, or 10 issues.

However, they were met by opposition from the members of the council who protested that the Krater shouldn't get the money because students don't care to read the paper, they already know what news there is, and all-in-all, Krater was putting out a publication that the students don't like to read.

Most important, Student Council didn't have the money because, as they put it, they handled their money "too loosely" this year, and they might be short of funds for the regular items on the budget for this year.

But when the paper was issued Friday, the majority of students howled if they didn't get their paper. Almost everyone was buried in a paper, wondering out loud why Krater wasn't coming out more often.

Apparently these students didn't speak up at the time, when the Student Council was debating this matter. Or perhaps they weren't represented by their class representative or informed of the proceedings.

Other instances, as in the Krater case, have occurred where some representatives were found not properly doing their job.

In the last Student Council meeting, half of the representatives didn't take the question of the Polio Drive back to their first period classes and vote on it as they were told to.

Too many instances have come up where a large number of students weren't informed of the matter voted on by the council and didn't have their say. Their representative didn't report back to them for three reasons. (1) Their instructor didn't allow time for the student council report. (2) The representative didn't bother to give the report. (3) The representatives didn't go to the meeting.

The student body officers and most of the representatives spend many extra hours after school. They do a very fine job, and are highly praised for their outstanding work by the teachers.

But those few that don't, are slowly destroying the democracy of Student Council, where the student has his say and his vote.

How can Student Council act on matters that will affect all the students, when some students didn't know about, or have their say in the matter?

Those representatives, who don't regularly attend the meetings and know they aren't doing their job, should realize how they are hurting the school and get on the ball. For those who can't — well, as some angered unrepresented students feel—they need to be replaced.

Shakespearean Festival Termed Shattering Success

ASHLAND—1959's premiere season for the Oregon Shakespearean Festival's new audience-built Elizabethan Theater scored a record-shattering success. According to revised figures just released by William Patton, general manager, 30,593 persons attended the summer's 40-night run. That is an increase of 23.4 per cent over the 1958 season.

Patton also announced that the total gate, averaged over the entire production period, proved to be an amazing 80.1 per cent of the house capacity. The newly revamped bowl area provides a stadium-type seating capacity for 1,142 at each performance.

Audience members again in 1959 represented all 50 states and several other nations, with mail order tabulations showing substantial gains in out-of-state patronage. But the increase in the number of Oregonians attending was especially remarkable.

Among other ticket agencies showing marked increase in sales was the Derby Music Company, Klamath Falls, which climbed 35.8 per cent above last season.

This year's most popular combined bill "Twelfth Night," directed by Angus Bowmer and its Centennial prologue, "Masque of the New World," directed by Jer-

ry Turner played to 11,000 during the season.

Total receipts for the year were \$110,332.85 and the total expenses for that period were \$108,576.53.

On July 23 the largest opening night crowd in history, a complete sellout, witnessed the launching of a new season and a new theater. To round out the pattern, the September 5 attendance established the largest closing night audience

since the event was born in 1933. The 12 sold-out nights, most of them with several standees, were, by far, the greatest number of capacity houses tallied here in a single summer.

Board Delays PSC Planning

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon's Board of Higher Education today postponed a decision on whether the future of Portland State College lies in an extended campus or in multi-story buildings.

It left the way open for the latter, however, by authorizing enough additional steel in the second new classroom building to support a tower.

Built now are a four-story library and a similar-height classroom building. They are connected by an overhead walkway over the street, as well as by a tunnel. The second classroom building will be similarly connected to these two, and the three then will form a cluster planned for future extension upwards to eight stories.
