City Council, Parents, OK School Cross Plan

A group of worried parents met with the city council at its regular Monday night meeting in city hall and hammered out a temporary solution to a dangerous crossing for school children at the intersection of the new west side bypass and Main Street.

The temporary solution would provide for the city to furnish an adult guard at the bypass intersection for a period not to exceed two weeks while the council meets with the elementary school board to resolve the problem. The council also went on record as being willing to absorb 50 per cent of the cost of such a guard during school months, providing the school board will do the same.

Representatives of the parents group presented the council with a petition signed by 65 parents asking for action on the dangerous intersection.

SAM RITCHIEY, 201 Jefferson, was spokesman for the group. He read the heading of the petition which asked for immediate action to place a qualified guard to protect school children at the crossing.

He pointed out to the council that there are 104 children from the north side of Link River who must cross the bridge to reach Riverside school each day. The bypass has presented a crossing hazard, he said, and something must be done about it.

Ritchiey declared that the school board had taken no action in the matter, and had pointed out that the crossing is about a quarter-mile from the school, and that, in their opinion, they had no authority to place a guard at that point.

"We don't want the council and the school board to battle into a stalemate," he pleaded. "We urge both of you to get together and work out a solution to the problem."

Pupil Admits Knife Try

A Pelican School fourth grader admitted Monday attempting to cut the throat of a homeward bound music student near Klamath Union High School Saturday night, city police said.

The 9-year-old suspect was ordered to appear with his mother in the juvenile office Tuesday.

The boy who said he was attacked told officers he was coming from music practice at KUHS carrying his instrument over the Wall Street Bridge in front of the school.

The 11-year-old boy said his attacker ordered him to give up the instrument and threatened him. He said he refused and the other boy, in black leather jacket and blue jeans, clasped his neck and tried to slit his throat with a jack-knife.

The older boy threw off his assailant, he said, and made a dash for a nearby store, and then home.

His mother reported the incident, and police launched an investigation.

They contacted schools. They found from authorities at Pelican School that a boy answering the description was enrolled there. Officers were furnished with two dozen pictures of possible suspects.
