

New Machine Sought By TB Group

Housed at the health department, 1949 Main Street, is an X-ray machine that is maintained by the Klamath County Tuberculosis and Health Association for the detection of tuberculosis.

But the day is fast approaching—if not already here—when this machine must be replaced. That is one of the aims of the TB association to secure more modern equipment for this purpose, just as the associations pioneered years ago for health nurses, better health departments and many other phases of health in general which resulted in radical improvements.

In explaining the methods of TB control and the contact follow-up on exposures, Dr. S. M. Kerron, health officer pointed out that X-rays at the county health department are limited to people who have had tuberculosis, to those suspected of having the disease or who are contacts of known cases, and to those who have been referred by a private physician.

People in the last three categories are first skin tested and are not X-rayed unless they show a positive reaction to this test. This follows a national trend of health departments increasing the use of tuberculin skin tests.

Any person with a history of exposure to tuberculosis, although the first skin test might be negative, is asked to have another test in three months. If this is also negative, that person is advised by the health department to take another test annually for his own protection. Through October of this year, 712 skin tests have been given by the health department.

Positive reactors are X-rayed at the time exposure is known, and again at periods of three months, nine months and 21 months from the time of the original X-ray, covering nearly a two-year span. Health officials feel this allows for an early detection should the disease suddenly become active, and even after two years, all reactors are strongly advised to have an annual chest X-ray. Under this program and with the assistance of the TB association, 145 X-rays have been taken locally at the health department through October this year.

Tuberculin skin tests are given on Friday afternoons from 4 to 4:30 at the health department. X-rays are scheduled for Monday mornings.

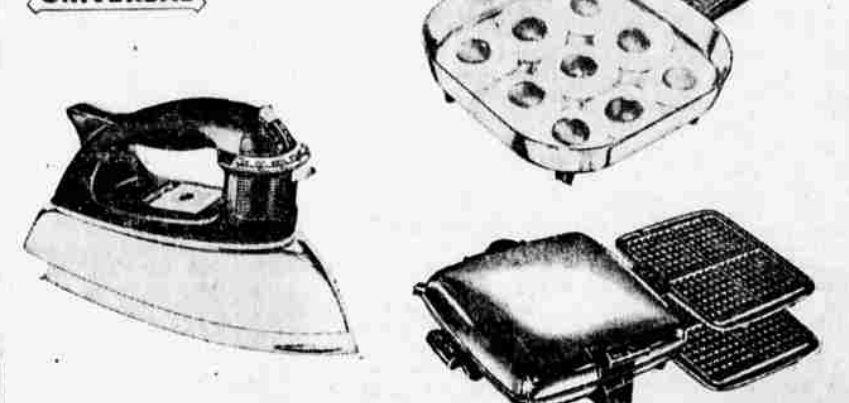

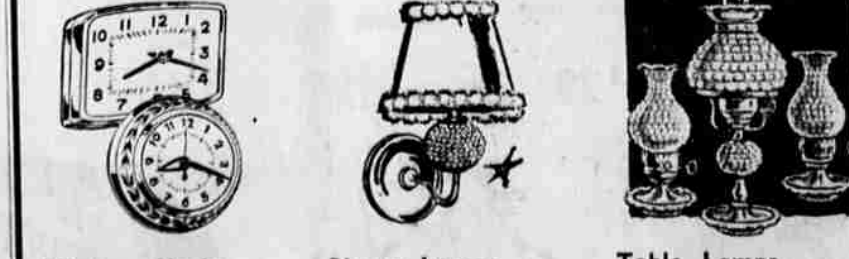
