\$2,000 Bail Set In Assault Case

Two Chiloquin men charged with beating a companion with a poker and bottle November 11 were bound over to the grand jury by Judge D. E. Van Vactor in district court Wednesday. Bail was set at \$2,000 each and the men were remanded to the sheriff's custody. They are Charles Hood Jr., 29, and Louis Gibbons, 27. They are charged formally with assault with a dangerous weapon.

The bloodmobile unit will be on the campus between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Students will be scheduled



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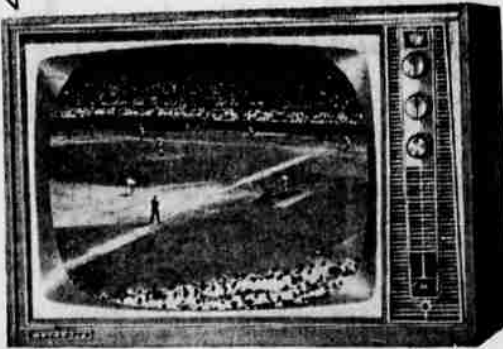


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
