NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market closed irregular today in a burst of heavy trading. The ticker tape was late.

Volume for the day was estimated at 3,300,000 shares compared with 3,350,000 on Wednesday.

Tobacco was off from 1 to 4 points while other leading stocks showed gains or losses ranging from fractions to around a point mostly.

In late dealings American Tobacco was off about 4 while Philip Morris and Reynolds tobacco were down about 2 apiece. Lorillard (ex dividend) was off about a point. Liggett & Myers lost well over a point.

High-priced International Business Machines added 4 points or so.

U.S. government bonds eased.

Cranberry Decision Due

WASHINGTON (UPI)—What's going to happen to all those contaminated cranberries that didn't get to the Thanksgiving table?

In all likelihood, the thousands of pounds of berries seized by the government will be buried, but a final decision on what to do with them hasn't been made yet.

By Wednesday night, the government had impounded 250,000 pounds of cranberries as contaminated by the weed-killer amtriazole which has caused cancer in rats.

"We haven't had time to formulate plans for their disposal," said one official of the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). "We've been too busy tracking them down."

Owners of cranberry lots found to be contaminated have 30 days to protest government seizure action. After that, the berries can be disposed of under supervision of a U.S. marshal. FDA officials weren't anticipating any protests.

Bid Deadline Moved Ahead On KU Site

Deadline for bids for construction of the addition to Klamath Union High School's natatorium has been moved from November 30 to December 14 to allow more contractors to review plans.

The board of high school District 2 made the decision during a regular meeting this week.

Minor changes in the field house plans necessitated a new deadline, board members said.

Bids must be in the hands of school officials by 5 p.m. on that date. They will be opened and reviewed during a regular meeting beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the KUHS cafeteria.

The board estimates the field house can be built for about \$120,000. It will replace a dilapidated and constricted existing structure. The new facility will be added to the existing swimming pool.

Board members also learned at the meeting that the new traffic control plan at the high school appears to be working well. Students, though, said Principal Willard McKinney are parking in numbers just off campus. Control there will fall to the city council and police, he said.

Board members passed a plan to provide a small shelter for students manning the entrance to the restricted parking lot on Alameda Avenue fronting the high school. The shelter will be heated electrically.

In other action, the board plans to study further a request by McKinney that additional secretarial help be provided the high school administration. McKinney said he would like to be able to eliminate some of the time he spends counseling and concentrate more on administration.

McKinney relieves counselor Paul Angstead of some of his duties while Angstead is busy with matters that could be handled by a secretary, the principal said.

Members decided, too, to study further a request from the biology department for \$1,302 worth of supplies, including slides, cultures and other instructional aids.

They learned that bleachers have all been installed in Pelican Court. The board has been installing the folding bleachers a little at a time since the court was built.

Contractor Death Told

Edward Arnold Scholer, 46, well known Klamath Falls building contractor and resident here for 23 years, died in St. Anthony Hospital, Pendleton, November 25.

Mr. Scholer suffered a light heart attack on November 14 and a later one the following day while working on a job at the Pendleton area. Mr. Scholer was in camp with him at the time he was taken ill and sought help from Mr. and Mrs. John H. Davis. Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Newton and Norman Jones, all of Klamath Falls who were camped about a mile distant. Davis and Mrs. Scholer took him to Pendleton for treatment.

Mr. Scholer was a flying enthusiast and was a member of the Klamath Air Search and Rescue Unit and of Carpenter's Union, Local 100. He owned his own plane and had assisted KASRU in past years.

He was a native of Ashland. Survivors include the widow, Clea, this city; one daughter, Mrs. Robert (Margaret) Stevens, Salem; a brother, Walter Scholer, Williams, Oregon; sisters, Mrs. Mable Olds, Davis, California, and Mrs. Cleo Colby of Nubser, California; also seven nephews and nieces.

Funeral services will be held from the chapel of Ward's Klamath Funeral Home, Monday, November 30, at 2 p.m.

Short In Wire Causes Chaos

Thursday morning the fire-fighting citizens sped to the fire station seven times before a telephone line man finally brought peace to Lenexa, a suburb of Kansas City.

Fire Chief Bert Gast explained that a short in a telephone line sounded the whistle atop the fire house every time the station phone was used.

Warm Temps Chase Snow

DENVER (AP)—Sunny skies and rising temperatures today chased a Thanksgiving snowstorm out of the Rockies.

The furious 24-hour storm left as much as 14 inches of snow in some foothill and mountain areas. Maximum temperatures in most cities of the region were far below freezing Thursday.

The wind-driven snow was blamed for a light plane crash that killed two men near Denver. The same storm caused the death of a Montana motorist, David Wegner, 62, a Bridger rancher. The plane crash victims were J. W. Hayes, 34, Calico Rock, Ark., lumber mill owner, and James L. Smith, 27, Denver floor-joint contractor.

Yule Plans Underway

The skies may be sunny and snow no nearer than Montana but Christmas plans are in the making in a big way in Klamath Falls and Town and Country.

Officially, the Christmas shopping season opened today and downtown stores and a few at Town and Country will be open tonight until 9 p.m. for early-bird shoppers. Downtown stores will be open each Friday night, December 11 and 18, and on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, December 21, 22, 23, before Christmas. Closing hours will be at the usual time on Christmas Eve.

In announcing plans for late opening hours the Klamath Falls Merchants Association also revealed plans for the big Christmas parade December 6 and the arrival of Santa Claus on December 18 with four of his string of prancing reindeer led by Rudolph the Red Nosed one.

Times for the parade and Santa's arrival will be announced. At Town and Country, Shopping Center merchants plan elaborate decorations to herald the Christmas season.

Santa's mail box will be up in the near future to receive letters of small fry who may put their wishes in the mail bag for the North Pole.

Holiday decorations on Main Street provided by the Klamath Merchants Association were put up last week by the city street department. The small Christmas trees placed at parking meters were brought in by Boy Scouts.

Burns Fatal To Toddler

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP)—Sherry Lynn Parrish, 23 months, died Thursday of burns believed inflicted by a floor furnace, Clark County Coroner Paul Mylan said.

He said the death was under investigation and an autopsy was performed, but results were not yet available.

Mylan quoted Mr. and Mrs. Robert Benford, the child's stepfather and mother, as saying it was the second time in about a week the child was burned by the furnace.

The child had first and second degree burns on the legs, thighs and soles of the feet.

Mrs. Benford, who finished a shift at a paper mill at midnight, told Mylan she was awakened about dawn by something, but went back to sleep.

She told the coroner she thought the child was still asleep when she checked at 9 a.m., then found her rigid at 10 a.m. and called an ambulance. Mylan said the girl had been dead some three hours when she arrived at the hospital.

Pneumonia Fells Hollywood Star

NEW YORK (AP)—Actress Elizabeth Taylor has been admitted to Harkness Pavilion of Columbia - Presbyterian Medical Center for treatment of double pneumonia. The hospital said "her condition is good."

A spokesman for Miss Taylor said she entered the hospital Thursday after suffering from a persistent cough for two weeks.

Hospital officials said Miss Taylor, wife of singer Eddie Fisher, would not be allowed to receive visitors or telephone calls.

Fisher canceled his late show at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel in order to spend the night at the hospital.

Death Of Ex-Diplomat Termed Suicide By Police

NEW YORK (AP)—Paul Bang-Jensen, 50, deposed United Nations official who had been missing since Monday, was found dead Thursday in a Queens park. Police called it "an obvious case of suicide."

The body of Bang-Jensen, dismissed from the U.N. in a controversy over releasing the names of Hungarian refugees, was found by a man walking his dog along the bridge path of Alley Pond Park.

A 25-caliber automatic was in his right hand. He died of a bullet wound in the right side of his head. Police said a note in his possession was identified by handwriting experts as that of the Danish national.

The note, addressed to his American-born wife Helen, begged her forgiveness and suggested funeral arrangements.

Many Killed By Terrorists

JAKARTA, Indonesia, (AP)—A terrorist attack by 500 armed men, women and children took at least 121 lives in the West Java village of Tjibugel Tuesday, according to reports reaching Jakarta today.

The terrorists, believed to be members of the fanatic Darul Islam sect of Moslems, swooped down on the village after overrunning a small army post on the outskirts.

They burned more than 400 houses and the village school. At least 65 other villagers were wounded. About 4,000 fled to the nearby town of Darmasada.

The reports said more persons were killed and wounded in an attack on the neighboring village of Balubur Limbangan.

Kentucky Family Notes Holiday

BETHLEHEM, Ky. (AP)—There was a bit of extra celebration Thanksgiving Day for the Bryant Stivers family.

It was the 19th birthday of Judy Ann Stivers and the 3-month birthday of her twin daughters, whose premature birth in an airplane over the Atlantic Ocean last Aug. 25 drew wide attention.

The youngest twin, Pamela Louise, arrived in Kentucky last month. Sister Julie Ann arrived three weeks ago from a hospital in Newfoundland.

The babies' father, Bryant, last month was released from
