

Candy, Mate Leave Motel

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—Stripper Candy Barr and her new husband quietly checked out of their honeymoon hotel Thursday night while authorities in two states maneuvered for her extradition to start a 15-year prison sentence.

The whereabouts of the shapely dancer were unknown today, but it was believed by her friends that she was returning to Dallas, Tex., to start serving the long prison term handed down in 1957 when she was convicted of possessing marijuana. She is free on \$5,000 bail.

She told friends Thursday after learning that her final appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court had been turned down that she planned to serve out her prison term before settling down with her latest spouse, beauty shop operator Jack Sahakian, 28, of Beverly Hills, Calif.

She and Sahakian wed Wednesday night less than 12 hours after Troy B. Phillips divorced her in Dallas on grounds of cruelty and desertion. She shot Phillips in the stomach in January, 1956, but he did not press charges, according to police.

Dallas and Nevada authorities revealed shortly before her disappearance they would seek governor's warrants to serve on Miss Barr in order to force her return to Dallas if she did not voluntarily surrender.

India House Backs Nehru

NEW DELHI (AP)—The Indian Parliament's lower house overwhelmingly endorsed Prime Minister Nehru's handling of the border crisis with Communist China today after India's veteran leader told it to either support him or replace him.

Only one or two (no) were heard in the thunderous voice vote which approved Nehru's policies. The Prime Minister declared his policy of seeking a settlement by mediation is not appeasement and bluntly told Parliament he was ready to resign if it wanted another leader.

The packed house rang with cheers as he asserted: "But if, in balance, this house feels this government, this Prime Minister has got to face the challenge, then help him, and stand by him."

Earlier in the debate Defense Minister V. K. Krishna Menon rejected opposition demands that he resign and Nehru took the floor to support his Cabinet officer.

Menon, who has been accused of too close friendship with the Peking regime and with treating the border trouble too lightly, declared all necessary troops movements consistent with India's resources have been made to defend the country's border with Red China.

The vote for Nehru ended a three-day debate on the border dispute during which some opposition members demanded military measures to drive back the Chinese occupying territory India claims along the northern frontier.

Trade Ban Ease Asked

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP)—A projected Latin American common market merits the greatest attention, Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) said here Thursday.

Morse is visiting Argentina, Brazil, Bolivia, Colombia and Venezuela as chairman of the Latin American Affairs subcommittee of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

He told a news conference the elimination of trade barriers as projected by Argentina, Brazil, Bolivia, Chile, Peru, Paraguay and Uruguay will lead to a more stable continental economy.

Dominicans Want Fidel

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, D.R. (UPI)—Cuban Premier Fidel Castro, his brother Raul and Venezuelan President Romulo Betancourt face 30 years' imprisonment at hard labor — if the Dominican police ever catch them.

The three men were among 114 persons sentenced to prison for 30 years for "acts against the peace of the Dominican Republic." Ninety-six of the defendants are in custody, none of them prominent Cubans or Venezuelans.

Fines totaling 100 million dollars were imposed on the defendants.

Castro, Betancourt and 17 others also were convicted as "co-authors of crimes against Dominican state security" and of seeking to promote armed revolt in this country. The only "co-author" in court was Cuban Maj. Delio Gomez Ochoa, a leader of the abortive July invasion.

Novelist Due In Court

WEST LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Novelist Thomas Chamales was to appear in court today on a charge of beating his estranged singer wife Helen O'Connell and spitting in the face of an arresting officer. He was warned last March by Municipal Judge Gerald C. Kepple that his next appearance in court on a wife-beating charge would mean a jail sentence.

The judge placed Chamales on two years probation the last time for striking Miss O'Connell and pulling her hair March 4.

Police were called to the couple's Brentwood Village home for the fifth time in two years Thursday when one of Miss O'Connell's daughters telephoned officers that Chamales was in a rage and she and her sister were afraid to go home.

Officer J. W. Judd said the 37-year-old Miss O'Connell complained that Chamales hit her in the face, threatened her infant daughter, threw a half-empty bottle of milk at her and took \$400 in cash from her. When Chamales was handcuffed, he spat in Judd's face, the officer said.

CAB Okays Air Route

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Civil Aeronautics Board examiner erred in concluding a proposed Spokane-Calgary air route was local in character and recommending that West Coast Airlines be certificated to fly it, the CAB's Bureau of Air Operations said Thursday.

J. P. McKinnon, the Bureau of Air Operations' counsel, said the 200-mile route was in truth a transcontinental route and that Northwest Airlines should be given authority to fly the route, instead of WCA.

Examiner Walter W. Bryan had recommended that the route be flown by West Coast, which now serves Spokane as a Pacific Northwest local service airline.

Northwest also flies into Spokane on its transcontinental route. McKinnon said Bryan did not consider the possibility that a Canadian airline would enter Calgary-Spokane service, although McKinnon said the record shows two Canadian airlines are interested in the route.

West Coast proposed daily service from Calgary to Spokane, Yakima, Portland, North Bend, Coos Bay, San Francisco and Oakland. Northwest proposes through services from Calgary to Portland and Seattle-Tacoma.

Cancer Victim Given Pony

WHITEVILLE, N.C. (UPI)—A partially blinded 8-year-old boy who doctors say may die at any time from cancer, was given the pony he always wanted Thursday. "Gee, it sure is great to own a pony," Mike Blackmon of Brunswick said.

"Even if I can't ride it, Allen and Larry (his younger brothers) can," he said.

Cumberland County Sheriff W. G. Clark of Fayetteville gave the bed-ridden boy a Shetland pony.

But Mike cannot see it because of his partial blindness caused by a cancer growth. Mike, son of Mr. and Mrs. Belton Blackmon, has undergone operations at Duke Hospital in Durham for the cancer.

Doctors expect the boy to die in a short time.

Program Hit By Church

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Roman Catholic hierarchy of the United States says the term "population explosion" is a "terror technique phrase" used as a vehicle for what it called propaganda in favor of artificial birth control.

The phrase, it said, alerts all to the attention that must be given to population pressures, said a statement formulated by Catholic bishops, "but it also provides a smoke screen behind which a moral evil may be fostered on the public and for obscuring many factors that must be considered in this vital question."

The bishops said it is "simply not true" that artificial birth control is gradually becoming acceptable to the church. The statement, which largely reiterates long-held church doctrine, was formulated at a meeting of more than 200 bishops at the Catholic University of America here Nov. 18-19. It was published Wednesday.

American Catholics, the statement said, will not support any public assistance, either at home or abroad, "to promote artificial birth prevention, abortion or sterilization whether through direct aid or by means of international organizations."
