

'Big Wind' Blasts Jeff, 7-6 For State A-1 Grid Crown

PORTLAND (AP)—A hustling Medford team shaded Jefferson of Portland, 7-6 Friday night and won the Oregon class A-1 high school football championship.

The defeat ended Jefferson's two-year reign as state champion and its winning streak of 34 games. Jefferson defeated Medford, 21-7, in the final last season.

The game attracted 21,512 fans, the largest crowd ever to see a high school game in Multnomah Stadium here.

Medford's superior speed produced its touchdown and contained Jefferson throughout the first three quarters.

But the Democrats came to life in the fourth period. End Herb

Washburn wrestled a 36-yard Medford pass from the grasp of a Medford safety man on the Medford 30. Washburn juggled it for an instant, then streaked into the Medford end zone.

Medford smothered Jefferson's run for the extra point.

Jefferson had a 10-5 margin in first downs. But that doesn't reflect Medford's winning touchdown play.

Late in the second quarter Dick Ragdale took a punt on the Medford 20. He reversed the ball to Ken Durkee, who took to the east sidelines. Durkee was at midfield before any of the Jefferson players noticed he had the ball. He easily outran pursuers.

Halfback Skip Bennett ran across the extra point.

The closest Jefferson got before its touchdown was to the Medford 14-yard line in the third period. But Renfro, Jefferson's offensive standout, nearly scored on the last play of the first half. He broke away and ran 33 yards to midfield where he was brought down by a desperation Medford tackle.

Medford almost scored a second touchdown in the fourth quarter when it started using single wing plays. It marched from its 36, with Hood and Bennett doing

most of the running; to the Jefferson 2.

Here two five-yard penalties and an incomplete pass stopped the drive, and Jefferson took over on its 3.

The Democrats made a first down, and then came the Renfro-Washburn touchdown play.

It was much the same Jefferson team that downed Medford last season. But it lacked the passing threat and field generalship of quarterback Terry Baker, who was graduated.

Jubilant Medford rooters milled around the field for an hour after the game.

OSC Ducat Sales Begin; Team Ready

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis — Fans wishing to purchase season basketball tickets for OSC home games have until Monday, December 6, before the season ticket and priority deadline is exercised, athletic officials announced today.

Mail orders for the 11-game home season indicate that large crowds will watch the Beavers perform in their first year as a basketball independent. Because there is no longer a Pacific Coast Conference, all 11 regular home games are included in the \$15 season ticket booklet.

Much interest also has been expressed in the fourth annual Far West Classic season ticket, which sells for \$8, and includes three afternoon and three evening games on December 26-29. The Beavers play Border champion New Mexico State and the University of Portland meets Idaho on Saturday afternoon, December 26.

Evening sessions on December 26 find Oregon meeting Denver and Washington State taking on Hawaii. On the second and third afternoons, consolation games will be played, with championship flight games in the evenings.

Over-the-counter sales will begin on Wednesday, December 9, for all home games. Ticket mail orders will be completed by then.

Meanwhile, Coach Slats Gill has named a 12-man squad for the opening trip to the Hawaiian Islands on December 2-5. Listed to travel are Karl Anderson, Tim Campbell, Jay Carty, Ron Critchfield, Steve Flynn, Bob Jacobson, Ernie Johnson, Bob Niles, Bruce Patterson, Stan Stafford, Bill Wolf and Jim Woodland.

Forming Gill's first unit in recent sessions have been Carty and Flynn, forwards; Anderson, center; and Woodland and Critchfield, guards. It's the youngest group Gill has tutored in many seasons, with Critchfield the only senior on the entire squad.

Pressing closely for a starting job has been Jacobson, 6-6 string-bean forward from North Bend. The Beavers had little trouble beating an alumni squad in a scrimmage session this week, as Carty scored 11 and Jacobson 10.

Free Throw Contest Set For Corvallis

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis—The second annual state of Oregon Elks free throw championships, open to all grade school boys, will begin local contests in the near future, it was announced Friday. The state finals are slated at Oregon State College Saturday afternoon and evening January 2.

At that time the four top free-throw artists will compete at half-time at the OSC-Washington State basketball game here, according to tournament manager Jim Barratt. The winner receives an all-expense trip with the Beavers when they play California at Berkeley.

Last year some 15,000 youngsters throughout the state participated in the contest which is sponsored jointly by the State Elks Association and the OSC Athletic Department. Winners were Ted Amato, Portland, and Curt Markus, Gresham, and both were taken to California with the team.

This year, each Elks lodge in the state will conduct local contests instead of county championships, with the local lodge winners moving on to Corvallis. Deadline for local contests has been set at December 28. Barratt said. Assisting with the state championships are Jack Zimbrick, Lebanon, of the State Elks Association, and Rex Smith, Corvallis, in charge of hospitality, for the Corvallis Elks Lodge.

Playoff Setup Remains Same

PORTLAND (AP)—The system of playoffs for football championships in all three Oregon high school divisions is going to remain unchanged, at least for one more year.

This was the decision Friday of the state School Activities Assn.'s delegate assembly.

Principals of Class A-1 and A-2 schools had voted earlier to abolish playoffs. But school boards had voted to continue them.

The delegate assembly is made up of principals and school superintendents, who voted 17-6 not to change the playoff program.

The assembly also voted, 13-11, not to shorten basketball schedules from 22 to 18 games.

Members elected two new boards of control members, they are: Sheridan Supt. Frank Smith and Walter McPartland, superintendent of Nyssa schools.

Robert Matson of Knappa was elected chairman. Larry Winter of Portland was named vice chairman.

ACE DRAWS ACCLAIM FROM PRO 'EXPERTS'

NEW YORK (NEA)—Professional basketball players tell you, almost without exception, that Elgin Baylor in his second season has become the best all-round player in the game.

In the light of the performances of Wilt Chamberlain, Bill Russell, Bob Cousy, Bob Pettit and perhaps another one or two, that may sound crazy, but then, as Coach Red Auerbach of the champion Boston Celtics says, "Any basketball player more than six feet, two inches in height is nuts."

That means most of the money players have idiosyncrasies, for a bloke shorter than six-two is practically a pygmy in the National Basketball Association.

A number of them are hypochondriacs. They run from pills to pranks like six-nine Clyde Lovellette, the drug store cowboy center of the St. Louis Hawks, shooting up Referee Jim Duffy with blank cartridges during the pre-season exhibition tour in retribution for what he considered bad calls.

They understandably get dizzy at such heights, but it's a wonderful sensation when you get around the \$60,000 a year the Philadelphia Warriors are paying seven-two Wilt the Silt Chamberlain as a freshman.

Getting back to Baylor, the six-five, 220-pound lad who last season came out of Seattle University to save the Minneapolis franchise, broke the National Basketball Association single game scoring record with 64 points against the Celtics the other night. The old mark, established by the renowned Joe Fulmer of Philadelphia in 1920, was 60.

As in all games, the steady, dependable all-round player is overshadowed by specialists in the show window.

Eye Ailment Ends Hick's Mitt Career

SEATTLE (AP) — Schoolboy Bobby Hicks' boxing career has been dealt a death blow.

The 17-year-old Seattle welterweight, lower only once in 18 pro fights and who has fought for both the national AAU title and in the Olympic Games trials, was notified in Los Angeles Friday he has a cataract in one eye.

He was barred by the California Boxing Commission from any action in that state. His main event 10-round bout next Tuesday night with Carmen Price, of Pittsburgh, in the Los Angeles Auditorium was canceled. It would have been his biggest fight to date.

The former Northwest Golden Gloves champion and his manager, George Chermers, left Friday night to return home. A return bout here with Chico Santos, who defeated Hicks for his only pro loss Nov. 17, also was called off.

Chermers said Dr. A. A. Baraff, of the California commission, told Hicks he now has only 20-30 vision in the affected eye, and advised him to give up the game.

"The boy was stunned," Chermers said. "I tried to comfort him. But I certainly will advise him to forget the game he loves."

Seattle Promoter Ingo Luchesi said of the young Negro:

"You know, I thought something was wrong with Bobby in his last fight here. He was missing body punches he never misses. Maybe his eye was bothering him."

Apology Due On 'Actions' Says Prexy

BOSTON (UPI) — The "thoroughly ashamed and disgusted" president of the U. S. amateur hockey association Saturday planned a letter of apology to the Russian ice hockey federation for the office actions of a visiting American team.

Walter A. Brown who sponsored the 15-day Soviet tour at the Brockton Hockey Club, made the announcement after it was reported the American players had drawn complaints during a four-game stay in Moscow.

The coach of the team, Louis A. Duhamel, denied the charges made by Edmund Stevens, Moscow correspondent for Sports Illustrated magazine. He said his players may have been "tourists" first and hockey players second, but added that the 20-member squad did nothing that affected their play.

Brown, the president of the Boston Bruins and the Boston Celtics, said he would "accept the responsibility of a gentleman such as Mr. Stevens says they misbehaved. I certainly intend to send a letter of apology to the Russian ice hockey federation for their conduct."

And, Brown warned, "If I could find out who the offenders were, I would strongly recommend to the Amateur Hockey Association of the United States that these boys be disbursed from further competition in our sports, either on the local or national level."

Observers generally agreed that if he's as sharp against Charnley as he was against sports writers he'll retain his championship.

Brown said he has no qualms about the British Empire champion's left. "I've fought four left-handers and (Kenny) Lane was the only one who went the distance," he said.

"I couldn't learn anything from them," Brown said. "The best way is not to know anything about who you're going to fight, and for him not to know anything about you."

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Woolpert To Take 'One-Year Leave'

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Who happens when a basketball coach decides he's not doing as well as he should? When he finds himself becoming irritable and sleepless?

Phil Woolpert, at 43 one of the nation's most successful coaches, decided to take a one-year leave of absence from the University of San Francisco in "stand back

and take a good healthy look at the whole situation."

The reason: "Tension, pure and simple. Here we are, three days before the season even begins and I can't sleep. I talked to the people at USF and to my doctor Wednesday. The doctor said I should get away from the whole thing for a year."

Woolpert's announcement came late Friday.

The young defensive strategist produced two national championship teams during his nine years as head coach at USF. At one stretch, from Dec. 15, 1954, to Dec. 17, 1956, Woolpert's green-jerseyed Dons won 88 straight games — the intercollegiate record.

Woolpert, a perfectionist, has been having trouble letting off steam. "Up to five years ago," he said, "I would rant and rave on the bench. Then our league, the West Coast Athletic Conference, put in a rule that the coaches should behave themselves on the bench."

"In most ways it's a good rule. In some ways it isn't. At least we used to let off what was boiling up inside."

Unknown Aims For Thompson

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—A local garage operator has declared himself a surprise entrant in the race to set a new American land speed record.

At the same time, a 35-year-old former Mormon missionary, said Friday he'll take his homemade, 3,000-horsepower streamlined racer out to western Utah's salt flats Sunday to launch his attack on the mark.

America's land speed record was set last fall by Mickey Thompson, El Monte, Calif., who averaged 345.33 miles an hour in two runs over the Utah flats. Two runs are required to establish a speed mark.

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Los Angeles Rams co-captain Duane Patnam hopes to be back with the team next fall despite his indefinite suspension from the pro football club.

The star lineman remained tightlipped Friday concerning General Manager Pete Rozelle's statement he had been suspended for conduct "detrimental to the best interests of the Rams football team."

"I have nothing to say to that," Patnam told United Press International. "I wasn't able to practice or play while the team was in the East. I don't wish to say anything about that disciplinary statement of the club. I'll let it stand on whatever they say for the time being."

"All I wish to say is that I have played for eight years with the Los Angeles Rams. I have enjoyed every game and every minute with the club."

"The people in the Ram organization are tops and treated me great. At present all I want to do is get my ankle and shoulder taken care of so I can be ready to play next fall."
