

Enormous Paper Industry Born 5,000 Years Ago

NEW YORK (UPI) — Five thousand years ago, a smart Egyptian split a papyrus reed for something to write on and so was born the world's present \$20 billion paper and allied product industry.

That industry today has developed 8,000 kinds of paper and 14,000 uses for them.

Now there is a new product which is opening a new universe of paper. It is stretchable paper which already has made strides in new uses with myriads more in the laboratory and on the drawing boards.

These uses include paper gro-

cery bags that stretch instead of tearing; magazine wrappers that arrive still holding their perishable contents in the same shape they were mailed in; heavy-duty paper for safely and economically wrapping and shipping such things as auto tires, car parts, florists' small plants, furniture, and small boats—to name a few.

This paper is described as flexible and tough, yet soft and fabric-like to the touch to the point where it can be made into draperies, seat covers, bedsheets, even disposable clothing such as uniforms, hats, aprons, shirts.

The new product is called Clupak. And two men stand out in its short career.

They are the inventor, Sanford L. Cluett, famed for his process of preshrinking textiles behind the trademarked trade mark, and Gerald E. Amerman, 40-year-old president of Clupak, Inc., specially-formed patent and trademark organization to which Sanford Cluett assigned his patent.

Clupak, Inc., is owned half by Cluett, Peabody & Co., Inc., and half by West Virginia Pulp & Paper Co.

Seven firms now are producing Clupak under license and two others are slated to start in January. Together they account for 64 per cent of the country's total annual Kraft production.

The companies include West Virginia Pulp & Paper, International Paper Co. (the largest), Union Bag-Camp Paper Corp., Continental Can Co., Crown Zellerbach Corp., St. Regis Paper Co., Albemarle Paper Manufacturing Co., Hudson Pulp & Paper Corp., and Calcasieu Paper Co.

There are two Canadian licensees—Canada Paper Co., and St. Lawrence Corp., Ltd.—and one in Sweden—Dyana Aktiebolag.

Amerman came to Clupak in January of 1958 from Cluett, Peabody where he was vice-president and general manager of that firm's casual wear division.

Normally soft-spoken Amerman seems to catch fire in discussing Clupak.

"This thing has really taken off," he says. "Initially we knew of only one area where Clupak could be used—the coarse paper field."

"Now new areas and uses turn up daily—everything from vacuum cleaner bags to disposable graduation caps and gowns."

"And in coarse paper, it seems fairly safe to say that eventually Clupak will virtually replace conventional Kraft."

So far as the future of Clupak is concerned, Amerman says, "well, the really exciting story—the part that is bound to affect just about everything we use in our living—is the inevitable development and use of Clupak as a substitute for some of the materials we now use."

"These include fabrics, even leather—and at a fraction of their cost."

"Our research is far enough along so that we believe this new process will at last give us the perfect textile substitute—with the look and feel of fabrics, which can be printed, buttoned, sewed; which can be made flame resistant, sterile and even washed a couple of times."

"And this opens up a whole new world of disposable clothing, home furnishings, bed and table linens, work uniforms—the list is literally endless."

Amerman says Clupak has built-in stretch—as much as 25 per cent currently and perhaps even 100 per cent—which can be controlled as the job requires.

Laboratory research, he says, indicates the process for making Clupak extensible paper can be used not only on Kraft (heavy duty) but also on non-Kraft papers such as printing paper, tissues, towels, and textile substitutes—tapes, cables, and tire wraps, as well as non-paper products like asbestos.

Clupak is five times stronger than ordinary Kraft, says Amerman, and this, he notes, poses something of a problem since about 20 per cent more bags can be fabricated from a ton of Clupak paper than from a ton of regular Kraft.

The problem as Amerman sees it, is convincing prospective users of paper products that Clupak really is that tough.

"They find it hard to believe a paper so light in weight can be so tough."

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Check Heater, In Trailer, Warns USPHS

WASHINGTON (UPI) — If you own an auto trailer heater, read this. It may save your life.

Sixteen Americans already are dead because they didn't get the warning or because they didn't take the time to check their heater.

The Public Health Service announced Friday night that the heaters had snuffed out eight previous deaths when it issued its first warning last week.

Nearly 1,000 trailers still are equipped with faulty bottled gas heaters that build up a deadly concentration of carbon monoxide gas in a very short time, the Public Health Service said.

A nationwide drive is underway to track down these heaters and fix them so they will be safe. More than 1,000 of the dangerous heaters have been located so far.

The heaters were one type manufactured by the Thurm Engineering Co., of Elkhart, Ind. They were put on the market in the past 18 months.

The faulty bottled gas heater does not provide complete combustion. This means that deadly fumes are released when it is used.

The company has said the heater can be made safe by moving the fire box up a fraction of an inch. But this should be done by someone who knows what he is doing.

The problem of finding the faulty heaters is tough. They were sold to 82 trailer manufacturers and sent to 250 cities and more than 300 dealers.

4 Educators From Oregon Reject System Of Russians

PORTLAND (AP) — "As a pack of School Administrators, they had words of praise for the Russian educational system and the trip. 'It is our unanimous opinion that such exchange programs should be stepped up both in frequency and number,' they said."

Some of the Russian practices they liked included flexible class scheduling beyond the fifth grade, more oral recitation, light teaching loads in high and elementary schools and reports on students' recitation.

Russian secondary level teachers, they said, teach only 18 hours in a six-day week and 24 hours in the elementary schools. The Oregon standard is 30 hours in a five-day week.

A student's recitation record is kept daily in diary form and sent home weekly for the parent's signature.

Russian educators, they reported, told of a three-fold purpose of education. It was to prepare educated people physically strong, brought up in a spirit of Communism and morality and prepared for active budding of Communism.

Exact price of the multi-million-dollar deal will be disclosed Monday, when Norman E. Blankman, of Sands Point, N.Y., formally attains title. The asking price was \$1,000,000.

One report was that the estate will be made into a recreational center containing a large restaurant. Another was that at some future time it may be made available for the Olympic Games.

The one-time showplace, with its swimming pools, tennis grounds, polo field and stables for race horses, was first purchased by the late William C. Whitney, Secretary of the Navy, in 1898.

Reporters taken on tour of the estate saw evidences of grandeur, although the activities of another day have been abandoned. Furnishings in the "main house," a beautiful two-story brick structure, have been dismantled, and high grass covers the private polo field.

The main house contains 23 rooms. Bathrooms in the house are equipped with gold-plated fixtures.

Only fifteen employees still live on the estate.

Several decades ago there often were more than 150 persons living on the estate, including chauffeurs, maids, cooks, stable hands, carpenters, painters, gardeners and mechanics.
