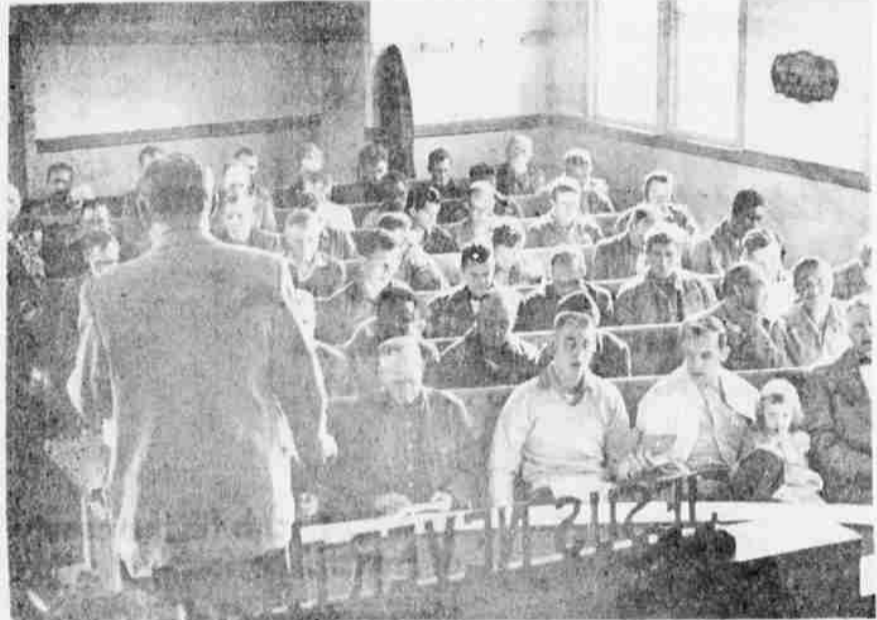

1st Professional Building Completed In Basin City

DORRIS—The first professional building to be erected in the city of Dorris has been completed. Constructed of multicolored rock-face tile, the building is designed with all built-in facilities to accommodate the professions.

Dr. DeVan Robins, dentist from Tulelake, is moving into the new building and Dr. Don R. Thorsness, optometrist, associated with Standard Optical Company in Klamath Falls, will move in next Wednesday, December 2. Dr. Robins and Dr. Thorsness will use the offices on three alternating days each week.

The professional center building was built by Marshall and Marilla Hamilton, owners of the Botte Valley Hardware store managed by Mrs. Hamilton the past four years. The store building has separate office space presently occupied by the Higginstein Insurance Agency operated by W. S. Hagelesten.

Mrs. Hamilton has lived most of her life in Dorris and her husband has been a resident of the town for 23 years. He worked 11 years as a log scaler in the woods for Associated Lumber and Box Companies.

Hamilton was appointed to the Dorris City Council in September, 1948 and served in the capacity of mayor from December 11, 1948 to August 20, 1951. He is now a member of the City Council.

"I am very pleased to see the new building completed," he said. "It is a fine addition to the town and will be a great help to the professions."

Safety Probe Set By Police

A special study to determine the nature and causes of injuries received in late-model automobile accidents will begin on December 1 in 12 Oregon counties.

The study will be carried out by the Oregon State Police, Oregon State Medical Society, State Board of Health, hospitals and the Automotive Crash Injury Research Program of Cornell University.

Counties included in the work will be Clatsop, Tillamook, Yamhill, Lane, Douglas, Coos, Josephine, Hood River, Wasco, Jefferson, Crook and Deschutes. Only accidents in rural areas will be included in the research.

The study will involve completion of crash accident investigation and medical report forms on all accidents involving 1957 or later model cars in which someone is injured or killed.

The state first undertook participation in the injury research program of Cornell when the Oregon Traffic Safety Commission approved a study plan in 18 months two years ago.

"That study involved additional reports on all injury-producing accidents in specially selected sampling areas of the state. It was completed some months ago.

Data produced in these studies have indicated the degree of problems in particular. They have shown that the most serious injuries are caused by rear-end collisions, followed by side-impact collisions, and then by head-on collisions," he said.

Profession Views Told

PORTLAND—A noted San Francisco attorney said here Friday lawyers are losing the position of respect they once held in the community.

Mevin Bell, who works primarily on behalf of persons seeking damages for personal injury, said in the past the lawyer always was in the forefront of civic activities.

"They were the repository of public money and public spirit," he said. "Now they are more concerned with the commercial needs of the law."

"I fill all my schools in Oregon and have a particular interest in the law," he said. "I have seen the law go from being a noble profession to being a mere business transaction."

Police Capt. Frank Wenzel said Harold Brown, 35, claimed he used only his fists in the attack on Vernia Gae Brown, 31, in her apartment about 2 a.m. Thursday. He said he did not know the wife who divorced him a month ago was dead.

"Many American Roman Catholics, in responsible planning of parenthood, use medically approved methods of birth control," he asserted.

Deactivation Of F104 Slated

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Air Force has ordered deactivation next year of its four squadrons equipped with early models of the speedy F104 "Starfighter" interceptors.

The move, announced Friday, involves 116 planes built by Lockheed at a total cost of \$174,000,000 and 1,600 men stationed at bases in Ohio, California, Washington and Massachusetts.

The planes may be turned over to the Air National Guard or the Tactical Air Command. The men will be given new assignments.

The early-model F104 holds the speed record at 1,404 miles per hour, and the world's altitude record at 81,249 feet. But the Air Force said it lacks the complicated electronic gear of later jets.

Police Burn; Mick Fiddles; Pleads Fifth

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Even violinist George Liberace had to play second fiddle to Mickey Cohen Friday.

The peppy ex-gambler stole the show at a police commission hearing on an application for an entertainment license for the Rodeli Cafe in suburban Sherman Oaks. The Mick:

Vented his forensic fury on policemen.

Invoked the Fifth Amendment more than 50 times.

Interrupted the hearing several times to charge it was a farce.

Asked if he was a part owner of the cafe, Cohen replied: "I got no piece of that restaurant. I wouldn't take a piece of it on a silver platter."

When another witness was asked about Cohen's police record, Cohen shouted:

"I object. I don't want my name mentioned in a derogatory manner."

After an angry exchange with Lt. Mark Smith, chief investigator for the commission, Cohen was escorted out of the hearing room.

In the hallway, another officer told him to be quiet.

"Don't get near me," Cohen warned. "You look like a bum to me."

After a noon recess, Cohen took the witness stand and refused to answer dozens of questions.

"I want a jury trial," he declared. "I'll bet anyone in the room I'd beat the decision in this thing is already in."

He told Roger Francis, commission attorney, "the decision is as phony as you are and you know you're a phony."

When finally excused, he hustled from the room, muttering to two friends: "Let's get out of here, this is a frame."
