

Ike To Find Strong Ally In Pakistan

KARACHI, Pakistan (UPI) — President Eisenhower will find an old ally with a new lease on life when he visits Pakistan next month.

A little more than a year ago the President would have encountered a sick nation drifting toward financial and political chaos. Its 85 million people, mostly illiterate, were growing disgruntled with rising prices, political instability and mass corruption.

The man mainly responsible for the change is Field Marshal Muhammad Ayub Khan, 52, a long-standing friend of Eisenhower's. They last met in 1958 when Ayub visited the United States.

The two presidents—once elected, the other self-appointed—have a lot in common. Both are professional soldiers and have strong followings anchored in personal appeal.

Since Ayub's bloodless coup 13 months ago, Pakistan has made considerable headway.

When Eisenhower's plane touches down at Karachi airport, he will get his first look at where a portion of more than a billion dollars in U.S. aid funds are being spent.

The United States, through the International Cooperation Administration (ICA), is helping finance the construction of a longer jet runway.

Aid funds are bound to come up when Eisenhower and Ayub settle down to serious discussions.

Pakistan, as a former member of the Central Treaty Organization (CENTRO) and the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization (SEATO), has asked for and received large-scale military aid.

Ayub undoubtedly will ask for more in the light of Chinese Communist border incursions that threaten both India and Pakistan.

Eisenhower will find little of tourist value in Karachi other than good weather. The winter is dry and clear with temperatures ranging from 60 to 85 degrees Fahrenheit.

Otherwise Karachi is a dusty, overcrowded seaport of mosques, camels, motor rickshaws and ancient taxicabs. Its two million people still have trouble finding adequate housing.

Eisenhower will get a warm official welcome but usually Karachi's predominant Muslim population does not pay much attention to visiting dignitaries.

The official climate will be all the warmer because of the present improving state of relations between Pakistan and India.

A year ago they were at each other's throats, mainly over how to settle opposing claims to the former princely state of Kashmir.

Now, due to Ayub's own diplomacy and the common threat of Communist China, Pakistan and India are showing signs of trying to settle their joint problems.

New Chicago Schoolhouse Rises From Charred Ashes

CHICAGO (AP)—If there ever was a fireproof building, this is it.

A workman made that comment to a reporter as they stood near a construction site at the northeast corner of Avers Avenue and Iowa street.

They looked at a sturdy steel and concrete skeleton that is rising from the ashes and charred bricks of the Our Lady of the Angels School.

The only wood in the new million-dollar, three-story building will be in the doors.

A new fire alarm box already stands like a sentry on the sidewalk on the Iowa Street side. It symbolizes the determination that there shall be no repetition of the blaze that swept up an open stairwell of the old school Dec. 1, 1958.

That fire cost the lives of 92 children and 3 nuns.

Our Lady of the Angels pupils attend classes elsewhere while workmen labor on the new structure.

A newsman who revisited the scene recalled the eerie silence that shrouded the area that short, dark, cold day almost a year ago.

Spectators had gathered behind fire lines to stare at the ruined building. Parishioners trickled in to the nearby church to offer silent prayers.

That was a silence of mass shock. It has been replaced by a numb reluctance to talk about the tragedy.

"I'd rather not talk about it," Mrs. Joseph Modica told a reporter who called at her home.

Her son, Joseph Jr., 9, had started work last fall on a Christmas gift for her. He took letters of the alphabet that were made of cereal and glued them on sticks to spell out a vow: "I, Joseph, promise to do my best to do my duty to God and to my country, to be square and to . . ."

He never finished his project. He died in the fire.

At another neat brick home, Mrs. Joseph Makowski let the reporter in through an entry hall where a statue of the mother of Christ was enshrined on a wall. She lost a son, Raymond, in the fire.

She didn't want to talk, either. But she did mention one detail of her sorrow.

"He was going to be 13 that Christmas Eve," she said.

In these homes and elsewhere there was no support for rumors of bitterness in the parish. The rectory denied rumors of physical or mental breakdowns among nuns.

The pastor, Msgr. Joseph P. Cussen, suffered a stroke last May. After a long stay in a hospital he has returned to his post as head of one of Chicago's largest parishes.

He arranged an anniversary Mass for the fire victims at 6 p.m. Tuesday.

The fire left a legacy of litigation as well as sorrow. Suits seeking \$2,305,000 in damages have been filed against the Roman Catholic archbishop of Chicago.

FBI Director Warns Vicious Crime Rising

WASHINGTON (UPI) — FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover reported today that vicious crimes such as murder, rape, slayings and violent assault are on the increase throughout the nation.

Hoover declared that these terrorist crimes have risen 7 per cent in the first nine months of this year even though the overall crime statistics dipped 1 per cent for the same period of 1958.

Using figures reported by cities of more than 25,000 population, the FBI chief stressed that murder showed an increase of 4 per cent through September; forcible rape, 5 per cent, and aggravated assault, 7 per cent.

Only a decrease in "crimes against property" such as larcenies, burglaries and auto thefts offset the increase in crimes against persons," Hoover said. He termed the overall 1 per cent general decrease "almost insignificant."

On non-violent crimes, Hoover said reports for the first nine months of the year showed a 7 per cent decrease in robberies, 2 per cent in burglaries, 1 per cent in auto theft, and 1 per cent in larcenies over \$50.

But Hoover said: "Violent assaults against the person continue their upward climb."

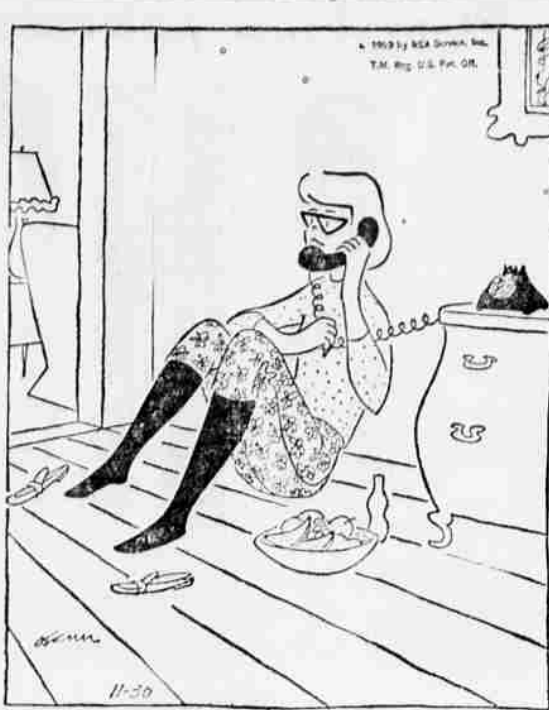
A breakdown of crime statistics for 134 cities of more than 100,000 population showed New York and Chicago led the list of murder cities.

New York reported 303 cases of murder and non-negligent manslaughter; Chicago, 247; Philadelphia, 91; Los Angeles and Houston, 89 each; Detroit, 84.

Los Angeles had the highest number of rape cases — 745. New York reported 581; Philadelphia, 483; Chicago, 441, and Detroit, 198.

For aggravated assault, Hoover listed these statistics: New York, 8,668; Los Angeles, 4,959; Detroit, 3,563; Philadelphia, 3,343; Chicago, 3,243.

SCHEDULED FIRST MEETING WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Republican Arrangements Committee will hold its first meeting in Chicago Dec. 10 to map plans for the 1960 convention. The GOP National Committee also will meet in Chicago Dec. 11-12 and will receive a report on convention plans.

Dam Collapse Does Damage

BURKE, Idaho (AP) — Activity was almost back to normal Monday in this North Idaho mining town of 400 following the collapse of an earth-filled dam three miles north of here Saturday night.

Runoff of snow and unseasonable rain was blamed for the wreck of the Glidden Dam, a 12-foot high structure which was built several years ago by a mining company for gold placer work across the outlet of a lake. The dam has been abandoned for years.

Most of the damage was done to houses which were built deep in a canyon above Burke but some of the water spilled into the main street of the town and did minor damage. Mud, silt and rock were deposited over some parts of the town. No one was injured.

Sixty feet of road leading to Wallace was washed away and more than 100 feet of a flume which supplied water to mine and mill operations of the Hecla and Star Mining companies was damaged.

Crewmen hoped to complete repairs to a damaged structure on the Montana Power Company's 100,000 volt transmission line into Burke by Monday. Meanwhile, power was being transmitted over a second line from Thompson Falls, Mont., where MPC has a 35,000 generating station to Burke.

Traveling With The Chief: France Is Oldest Friend

France, eighth of the ten countries on the Eisenhower travel calendar, is America's oldest friend in Europe. The land which gave Americans Lafayette, the Statue of Liberty, French fried potatoes and onion soup. It sold America a large chunk of what is now the United States in the Louisiana Purchase. It is the land of Joan of Arc, Paris, Brigitte Bardot and Napoleon; the birthplace of the philosophy of modern democracy; the home of Notre Dame and the Tuilleries; of gourmet, d'adism and the "new look."

La Belle France has a fertile 212,659 square miles, famed for rolling hills, the world's greatest vineyards, and 15,781-foot Mont Blanc, Western Europe's highest peak. President Charles de Gaulle is one of the world's taller statesmen and heads one of the world's youngest republics.

France is currently in its Fifth Republic, the first having been formed after the bloody revolution of 1789-1793.

Napoleon built an empire, exhausted it in a Russian winter war and lost it at Waterloo. The Fifth Republic was formed in 1958 by De Gaulle. France's prickly but astute World War II champion, after Algerian nationalists toppled the wobbly Fourth Republic.

France is a nation of small farms and small businessmen. It

plans to become the world's fourth atomic power next year. The first French atomic bomb will be exploded in the Sahara Desert of Algeria where native nationalists have been waging a losing but stubborn independence war for four years.

In today's France, Algeria is a greater issue than all other world questions combined. It is an issue of "face" for a proud people who saw defeat in two world wars and lost Indochina under Communist pressure. So a fullscale war is fought in Algeria, and liberty-loving Frenchmen welcome "presidential rule" by De Gaulle.

The national ambition is to assert France again as a world power. Thus the battle to hold Algeria, thus the race to join the atomic club, thus De Gaulle's reluctance to play second fiddle at a summit conference dominated by Eisenhower and Khrushchev.

De Gaulle axed recent East-West plans for a summit conference before next spring. He wanted and got scheduled visits by President Eisenhower and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev, and the Western summit in Paris. De Gaulle will visit the United States next year.

France's historic enemy is Germany which walloped France in 1871, 1914 and 1940 before being walloped herself.

RECORD ENROLLMENT WASHINGTON (UPI) — A record of 44,370,000 Americans were enrolled in schools and colleges in October, the census bureau said Sunday. This year's enrollment compared with one of 42,900,000 last year and showed increases in all grades from kindergarten through college.
