Hoover Says Los Angeles Tops Crime

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover reported today that Los Angeles led the state in every major crime category during the first 10 months of 1959.

Hoover's quarterly report also showed Los Angeles was first in the number of aggravated assault cases as compared with New York. San Francisco was second place in California in every crime category except larceny.

Twelve California cities were included in the FBI nationwide report which showed that the vicious crimes—murder, rape, stabblings, and aggravated assault—were on the definite upswing through the United States.

Such crimes jumped from 4 to 7 per cent during the 10-month period while the over-all crime rate dropped an "insignificant" 1 per cent.

California cities included Los Angeles, Pasadena, Long Beach, San Diego, Fresno, Glendale, San Francisco, Sacramento, Richmond, San Jose, Oakland and Berkeley.

The highest crime rate was in the burglary and breaking and entering division. Los Angeles led the state with 21,382 and San Francisco followed with 4,199.

Auto theft, which showed a 1 per cent decrease throughout the nation, was frequent in Los Angeles with 9,049 cases listed.

Other crimes and the cities reporting the highest and lowest instances of the crime included: Robbery: Los Angeles, 3,019; San Francisco, 891; Glendale, 19.

Assault: Los Angeles 4,959; San Francisco 827; Glendale 8. Larceny (over \$50): Los Angeles 14,922; San Diego 1,745; Berkeley, 156.

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Payroll Figures Released by United States Senate

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Payroll figures showed today that the Senate, with its 100 members at \$22,500 a year each, also has at least 80 employees making more than \$16,000 annually.

The Senate made public information on office payrolls Monday for the first time in 11 years. The three-month breakdown, from July 1 to Sept. 30, was the most detailed disclosure in Senate history.

The 110-page booklet disclosed that at least 19 senators had either relatives or in-laws somewhere on the payroll during the three-month period. They included Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson (Tex.), who also was shown to have at least some say-so on Senate jobs totaling more than \$600,000.

Johnson's brother, Sam Houston Johnson received \$3,900.34 during the three-month period as clerk to the conference of Democratic senators. He works throughout the year at the same salary.

Other senators who had relatives or in-laws on their own payrolls or elsewhere on the Senate pay lists during the July-September period were: John A. Carroll (D-Colo.), daughter; Dennis Chavez (D-N.M.), niece; John Sherman Cooper (R-Ky.), sister; Carl T. Curtis (R-Nebr.), son; James O. Eastland (D-Miss.), daughter; Clair Engle (D-Calif.), nephew; J. Allen Frear Jr. (D-Del.), nephew; Albert Gore (D-Tenn.), niece; Glen D. Johnston (D-S.C.), two nephews, cousin and a son-in-law; John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.), brother; Pat McNamara (D-Mich.), wife and nephew; James E. Murray (D-Mont.), son; Richard B. Russell (D-Ga.), two nephews; Leverett Saltonstall (R-Mass.), son; Andrew P. Schoepfel (R-Kan.), niece; Margaret Chase Smith (R-Maine), brother-in-law; John J. Sparkman (D-Ala.), wife and Ralph Yarborough (D-Tex.), son.

Kennedy's brother, Robert, counsel of the now-defunct Senate Labor Rackets Committee, and Curtis' son, a college student with a summer job, are no longer working for the Senate. Engle's nephew is a Capitol policeman.

The office payrolls failed to tell the full story of senatorial patronage. The vast bulk of it lies in lower paid jobs, such as elevator operators and policemen, and in bulging subcommittee staffs.

Senate Secretary Felton M. Johnston and Sergeant-at-Arms Joseph C. Duke receive the top salaries, a yearly rate of \$19,249.22. Duke oversees the biggest patronage pasture — messengers, policemen, maintenance employees, etc., by the score.

Four other Senate officials were paid at the rate of \$17,049.96 per year. They were Chief Clerk Emery L. Frazier, Parliamentarian Charles L. Watkins, Robert G. Baker, secretary for the Democratic majority, and J. Mark Trice, secretary for the Republican minority.

The other 74 top-bracket employees drew \$4,074.99 for the three-month period—or \$16,299.96 annually. That is the maximum for an employee of any individual senator or committee.

Suit Names Hollywoodite

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Maria Rosa Orad Aragon has sued Moses Vivanco for \$16,000, contending she gave up a dancing career in Spain for promises of Hollywood fame and romance.

Vivanco, 36, is the divorced husband of Yma Sumac, Peruvian singer.

Under Vivanco's guidance, Miss Aragon, 21, said in her complaint, she posed for "revealing and seductive pictures in scanty attire" only to learn on her arrival here two months ago that his representations were untrue.

She charged that he had led her to believe he was seeking a wife with her beauty and talent but that she found he was still on close terms with Miss Sumac.

Mail Asked For Prisoner

He is Hugh F. Redmond Jr., a former Yonkers resident who has been in prison for nearly nine years.

The Communists arrested him while he was a businessman in Shanghai, accused him of espionage and gave him a life sentence.

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Hayden Wife Wins Round

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Mrs. Betty Ann de Noon Hayden, 37, has won the first round from her former husband, actor Sterling Hayden, in a bitter court battle over custody of their four children.

Superior Judge Emil Gumpert, who last January called Mrs. Hayden an unfit mother and awarded custody of the children to Hayden, disqualifies himself Tuesday from rehearing the case Jan. 25 after Mrs. Hayden objected he was prejudiced against her.

"Although no factual or legal basis for disqualification appear, in view of the defendant's (Mrs. Hayden's) bitter, uncontrolled and wholly unfounded charges of bias and prejudice, I have determined to permit this phase of this unhappy litigation to be heard by a judge other than myself," said Gumpert.

Hayden, 42, had sought to have Gumpert hear the case, pleading the jurist's familiarity with it would save two to three weeks hearing time.

A new judge will be appointed to hear the case which was reopened on Mrs. Hayden's charge that Hayden violated his custody rights by taking the children—Christian, 11; Thor, 10; Gretchen, 9, and Matthew, 7—on an 11-month voyage in his schooner in defiance of a court order.

Gumpert said he still would rule on the contempt charge against Hayden. No time for the matter has been set.

Star's Girl Wed Quietly

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Susan MacMurray, 19, daughter of actor Fred MacMurray, wanted her marriage to Thomas Moore Poole, 31, a Los Angeles businessman, to be a quiet affair. So did Poole.

MacMurray announced Monday the couple was married Sunday at the Desert Inn in Las Vegas, Nev. Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Clark, proprietors of the hotel, stood up for them and the ceremony was performed by a justice of the peace.

Susan's mother died several years ago. MacMurray has since wed actress June Haver.

Space Capsule Progress Noted

ST. LOUIS (AP) — McDonnell Aircraft Corp. working around the clock to finish the first man-carrying space capsules, is making six more capsules for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The new order brings to 20 the number of capsules ordered by NASA from the McDonnell firm, said James S. McDonnell Jr., president of the company.
