

Giants Land Loes, O'Dell In Trades With Baltimore

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP)—The San Francisco Giants have acquired Billy O'Dell and Billy Loes from Baltimore to attempt to plug an undermanned pitching staff that cost them the 1959 National League pennant.

In return for the left-handed starter O'Dell and Loes, an erratic reliever, the Giants had to give up Jackie Brandt, one of their most talented young outfielders. Gordon Jones, a third-pitcher relief pitcher, and a third player yet to be named. The player, it was learned, is Roger McCardell, a rookie catcher who

outfielder, for the 24-year-old Cuban, who had a 13-19 record with the last-place Nats last season.

Los Angeles countered with an offer of four players for Ramos, all-time home run king. The Dodgers are willing to part with left-handed Danny McDevitt, shortstop Don Zimmer, outfielder Sandy Amoros and pitcher John Golden, a farm hand. Washington has agreed to the trade, provided outfielder Don Demeter is substituted for Amoros.

O'Dell, 26, gives the Giants a third starting southpaw to go with Johnny Antonelli and Mike McCormick. He was signed out of Clemson College in 1954 for a \$10,000 bonus. O'Dell had his best year in 1953 when he won 14 and pitched three hitless innings in the All-Star game.

A back injury hampered his work last season but while he finished with an ordinary 10-12 record with a sixth-place club, he had a fine 2.94 earned run average.

Loes, who will be 30 Dec. 13, is a former Brooklyn Dodger. The eccentric right-hander was traded to Washington early last season, but the Senators turned him back when he told them he had a sore arm. He appeared in 37 games with the Orioles, however, and had a 4-7 record.

Brandt, 25, a fine defensive outfielder and right-handed batter, was regarded as one of the real comers in the National League. Last season, his first full year

in the major leagues, he was named Long Beach host to UW Huskies.

SEATTLE (AP)—Washington's Rose Bowl bound Huskies will base their operations, except for one important play, at Long Beach and will work out in the Long Beach City College stadium.

AAWU Voters Snub Stanford Gridders

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The football coaches of the Athletic Assn. of Western Universities named their all-conference team Tuesday and surprisingly snubbed two Stanford stars.

Southern California's Trojans placed four men on the first team and the Rose Bowl-bound Washington Huskies found three men on the top club.

But Stanford quarterback Dick Norman, the nation's passing and total offense king, was relegated to second string and the Indians' fullback, Skip Face, only made honorable mention despite leading the conference in scoring with 100 points.

Not one player managed a unanimous vote from the five coaches in the conference. The top vote-getters were Stanford end Chris Burford, Washington guard Chuck Allen and UCLA fullback Ray Smith.

UCLA and USC dominated the second team with four places each. The all-Big Five team chosen by their coaches (positions in parentheses):

Crimson Tide Is Probable Bowl Choice

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (AP)—Alabama's Crimson Tide was expected to receive and accept a bid to play Penn State in the inaugural Liberty Bowl at Philadelphia Dec. 19.

Speculation that Alabama would play in the bowl began to ripen Monday immediately after Navy turned down an invitation.

But nobody could be found who would say that Alabama had been invited. Coach Paul Bryant had scheduled a news conference for 10 a.m. Eastern Standard Time. Another news conference was scheduled by bowl officials at Philadelphia at the same time.

All signs indicate that Alabama, with its 7-1-2 record, would move into the new Liberty Bowl. There were reports Monday night that university trustees were being polled on the question.

Most of the players and other students were off the campus for a holiday, declared by Dr. Frank Rose, university president, after Saturday's 10-0 upset victory over Auburn.

Penn Mentor Gets The Axe

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Steve Sebo will be dismissed as Penn football coach today in favor of Rutgers' John Stiegman. In turn, Rutgers will announce the signing of Dr. John Bateman, Penn's line coach, as Stiegman's successor.

The Associated Press learned Monday night of Dr. Bateman's appointment, after reporting exclusively on Sunday that Stiegman would replace Sebo.

Mike DeJohn Seeking Kayo

LONDON (AP)—Mike DeJohn of Syracuse, N. Y., fires for his third straight knockout and should get it tonight on an all-heavyweight boxing card at Wembley Stadium.

DeJohn goes against Welsh midget Dick Richardson in one of two featured 10-rounders. The other features Cuban Nino Valdes against Briton Brian London, who hasn't fought since his knockout by Floyd Patterson last May.

The rest of the program is a knockout tournament for 11-heavyweight novices with the winner getting 500 pounds (\$1,400). The 11,000-seat stadium is sold out.

DeJohn got rid of California's Charlie Powell in only 47 seconds last Nov. 7 at Syracuse. He shouldn't have any trouble putting Richardson away.

College 'Dribble-Dunkers' Pull Cork On Cage Season

The fall boys of the dribble and dunk set begin their annual quest for college basketball's major honors tonight and, as usual, a lot of them will travel to distant regions for tryouts before settling down to championship competition.

Cincinnati, Kansas State, West Virginia, St. John's (N.Y.), St. Joseph (Pa.), Kentucky, North Carolina State and Idaho State are some of the biggies of the court game scheduled for action on the first night of the legal.

A good many games already have been played by smaller schools but NCAA regulations bind the big colleges and most of the others to a Dec. 1 start.

West Virginia and Cincinnati, second and third to champion California in the NCAA tournament last spring, again have two of the game's top individual stars. Most of the records and statistical highs that didn't go to Cincinnati's Oscar Robertson last year were gathered in by West Virginia's Jerry West. Both are All-Americans.

West Virginia opens at home against Tennessee, then puts its 50-game conference winning streak on the line against The Citadel and Furman. The Mountaineers are going after their sixth straight conference title.

Idaho State, opening against Utah State, will try for its seventh straight in the Rocky Mountain Conference. Kansas State, Cincinnati and Dartmouth will try to make it three in a row in the Big Eight, Missouri Valley Conference and Ivy League, respectively. California opens against the University of Santa Barbara branch Friday night.

Some of the other top games listed tonight include Iowa at Evansville, the N.C.A.A. college division champion, Wake Forest at Ohio State, Abilene Christian at St. Louis, St. John's 1959 National Invitation champion at Bridgeport, Colorado State College at Kentucky, Georgia Tech at Duke, St. Joseph's at Marshall, South Dakota State at Kansas State, Penn State at North Carolina State, San Francisco at Stanford, and UCLA at Southern California.

The big time doubleheader programs start slowly at Philadelphia Wednesday with LaSalle-Millersville and Penn-Washington and Jefferson at New York Thursday at Marquette vs. NYU and St. Louis vs. St. Johns.

Kentucky, expected to resume its old habit of winning the Southeastern Conference title, gets an early test of national rating on a western tour that includes weekend games with UCLA and Southern California.

Before it even started, the basketball season has proved to be nerve-racking for one coach, Phil Woolpert, who saw his San Francisco Dons drop from the heights of last season, took a year's leave of absence and turned over the team to a protesting assistant, Ross Guidice.

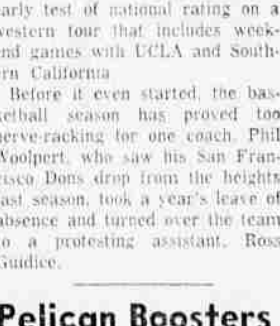

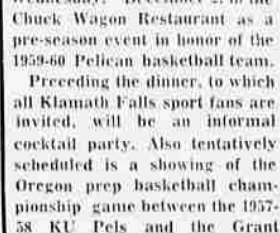
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
