In Hungary, Mr. K repeats his boast of scads and scads of missiles—enough to blow all our enemies in the world into kingdom come. Those aren't his exact words, but that's the drift of them.

Then he goes into his usual routine about being willing to scrap 'EM ALL if the rest of the world (meaning, specifically, the U.S.A.) will scrap theirs.

This is his line:

"We have missiles and missiles and missiles. We have missiles running out of our ears. We have so many of them that we no longer have room to store them all."

"But—"

"We are tolerant. We are humane. We are LOVERS OF PEACE. So... if everybody else will scrap his missiles we WHO HAVE MORE THAN ANYBODY ELSE will scrap ours."

When the communists propose that if we'll scrap all our missiles they'll scrap all theirs, we just can't help suspecting that if we scrapped ALL our missiles the communists would HIDE OUT A FEW OF THEIRS.

That's the fly in the ointment.

## Crusading Medic Paints Street; Facing Charges

SHERMAN OAKS, Calif. (UPI)—The Sherman Oaks Chamber of Commerce today threw its support behind efforts to obtain a painted crosswalk across a heavily traveled street where a dentist was cited for painting the walk himself.

Dr. Louis J. Friedman, 42, the crusading dentist, was formally charged Tuesday with two motor vehicle code violations and two city code violations for painting the crosswalk Sunday morning.

The citation, issued by Assistant City Attorney Donald Mowat, ordered Friedman to appear to plead Dec. 15.

Friedman said he decided to paint the walk with a broom and white paint after two petitions signed by businessmen in the area had failed to bring results. He said they had been trying to get the city to paint in the crosswalks for two years.

Chamber of Commerce officials, led by President Ted Levey, said not only would they press to have the city continue the painting but would go further and demand a red light at the crossing.

## Eisenhower Outlines Trip Aims

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower said today that on his 11-nation tour he will try to show the people that the United States is a good partner in the search for a peace with justice.

He told a news conference he would be glad to discuss with Indian Prime Minister Nehru India's border troubles with Red China and in effect he deplored Red China's use of force to settle the issue.

Such and similar specific matters such as the troubles between India and Pakistan may well be discussed as he goes from country to country, Eisenhower said.

The President told questions that his family might be a bit concerned about his taking on the heavy burden of the 22,000-mile journey he will start on Thursday evening.

But the doctors, he said, examined him three days ago and report that he is capable of standing the demands of the trip.

For his 19-day absence from the country Eisenhower has not delegated to any other person his authority over the use of nuclear weapons in an emergency.

But he declared this is not necessary. Decisions he might have to make to order the employment of nuclear weapons could be very simply and quickly executed from any place, he said.

On another aspect of foreign affairs, the President announced that Prime Minister Kishi of Japan will visit the United States, probably in January. He said negotiations on revision of the U.S.-Japanese mutual defense pact may be concluded at that time.

Eisenhower spoke at some length about the trip which will take him across western Europe, the Middle East, South Asia and North Africa.

It is clear on the basis of reports from abroad, he said, that there is a great deal of doubt in the minds of many people, including friends and allies, as to the real sincerity of the United States in the pursuit of peace.

## Reds Warned By Hungarian

VIENNA, Austria (UPI)—A top-ranking Hungarian Communist today warned the Party Congress in Budapest that "bourgeois ideology" is still strong in Hungary.

"Bourgeois ideology" is Communist terminology for anti-Communism.

The warning was made by Gyula Kallai, a member of the ruling Polit Bureau, who discussed problems of education, culture, science and schools.

Only Tuesday Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev praised Hungarian Communist leaders for recapturing the confidence of the people in a speech before the congress. He said the fever generated by his denunciations of Stalin coupled with the mistakes of the then Hungarian party leaders sparked the 1956 freedom revolt.

## Concern To All Of Us, Chief Informs Newsmen

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower implied strongly today that the government will take decisive action to settle the steel strike if management and labor fail to agree before the Taft-Hartley injunction expires.

If the parties cannot get anywhere by their bargaining, he told

United States if the government was obliged to step in and abridge the right of free collective bargaining.

Eisenhower did not specify what action might be taken nor did he indicate he has in mind any specific recommendations for congressional action.

But the President indicated he intends to insist again, in a scheduled nation-wide telecast Thursday night, that the two sides get together.

Eisenhower said his interest in the matter is not an interest in either employer or employee except that all involved are part of America.

And it is vital to the American people, he said, that some settlement be reached before the injunction now in effect expires on Jan. 26.

Workers will vote in January under the terms of the Taft-Hartley Act on the final offer of the steel companies in their wage-working conditions dispute. If the offer is not accepted, the strike could resume after Jan. 26.

In speaking of the effects of the steel strike, Eisenhower said it has placed budget balancing in a very precarious position in the current fiscal year by reducing tax revenues.

But he said his administration still is trying to balance the budget for fiscal 1960—the government year that ends next June 30.

Eisenhower said he is exploring many economies with officials to this end.

And in 1961, he said, the government should not only balance the budget but achieve a small surplus to start repayment on the federal debt.

On another issue, the President said the United States will never have a positive political doctrine on whether its foreign aid funds should be used for birth control projects by the recipient nations.

That is not our business, Eisenhower said.

This government has no intention of interfering in the internal affairs of other governments, he said, adding:

If those governments want to do something about this admittedly difficult and even explosive problem, that is their responsibility.

The question was raised by a reporter who recalled that a study group's report on foreign aid earlier this year suggested that this government, on request, might help in the formulation of plans to deal with population growth in countries whose resources could not keep up with the birth rate.

The President said he could not imagine a subject which would be a less proper political or governmental function or responsibility.

The subject has the greatest religious significance to some denominations, Eisenhower said, and while he has no quarrel with the position of the Catholic Church on birth control, he believes it has nothing to do with this government's contacts with other governments.

The news conference, the last before Eisenhower takes off Thursday night on his trip to Asia, Europe and Africa, was attended by 261 correspondents—a large but not a record number.

## San Francisco In Need Of Rain

San Francisco's record-breaking drought went into its 75th day today and the Weather Bureau saw no rain in sight for the parched city.

The hottest Dec. 1 in the city's history was recorded Tuesday when the mercury shot up to 71. More of the same was predicted today.

Warming temperatures predominated Tuesday night east of the Mississippi River and south of the Ohio, where temperatures were up 8-15 degrees, and in the Northern Rockies, where it was 10-20 degrees warmer.

Havre, Mont., reported temperatures 27 degrees above those of 24 hours before.

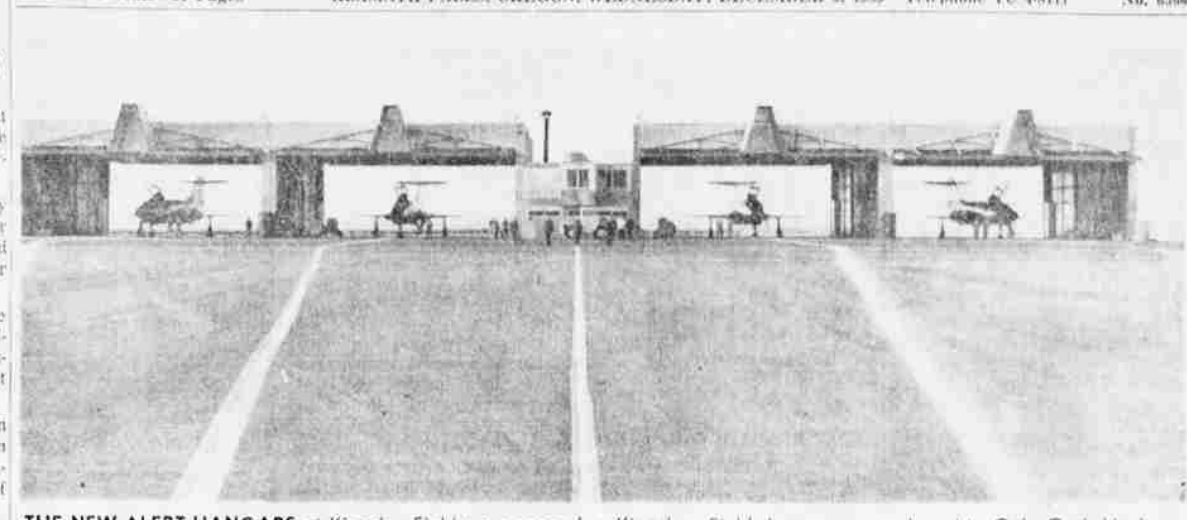

## Four Killed In Air Crash

OSLO, Norway (AP)—A U.S. twin-engine military plane crashed and burned in woods north of Oslo today, killing all four persons aboard.

The C-47 plunged into the trees only 100 yards from where three lumberjacks were at work.

The lumberjacks were unable to get near the burning plane.

The plane left this morning from Fornebu Airport, Oslo, for a northern Norwegian airport. It crashed only a few minutes later as it was making a turn in poor visibility.

The plane was attached to the U. S. Military Assistance Advisory Group in Oslo.

The four aboard were:

Pilot: Lt. Col. Henry J. Pascho of Reading, Mass. Pascho's wife, Mary, and three children, Mary, 5, James, 3, and George, 7 months live in Oslo.

Copilot: Lt. Col. Pete W. Kuba, Stouffville, Ohio. Kuba's wife, Ruth, and the children Diana, 14, and Charles, 6, live in Oslo.

Sgt. Frank Rice Jr., New Cumberland, Pa. He leaves a wife, Ethel.

Sgt. Walter H. Brandt, Wilmington, Del., who leaves a wife and two children, Steven, 7, and Susan, 6 months.

## Fear 13 Die In Avalanche

TURIN, Italy (AP)—A huge avalanche of snow roared down a mountainside 40 miles north of Turin before dawn today, and 13 construction workers were feared dead.

The great snow mass buried a barracks in which 35 men were sleeping. Twenty-two men dug their way out.

Workers from neighboring barracks dug frantically with all available tools and nearly eight hours later recovered three bodies.

The other 10 men also were feared dead.

The avalanche crashed down into the Vall dell'Orco—the valley of the gorge—6,000 feet up in the Italian Alps. A force of 100 men there has been digging an electric power tunnel.

One of the survivors said those who escaped were wakened by the roar of the sliding snow and were running for the doors when the avalanche hit.

## Counterfeiters Very Busy Now, Warns T-Man

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Secret Service Chief U. E. Baughman warned today that the busy Christmas shopping season is the busiest time of the year for passers of counterfeit money.

"Crowded stores and inexperienced temporary clerks provide the ideal setting for operations of the counterfeit note passers," Baughman advised shoppers, merchants and cashiers.

The best way to check a suspected counterfeit note is to compare it to a known genuine bill of the same denomination, he said.

Secret Service chief said in most cases, he added, defects in the bogus bill will show up immediately.

In the 12 months ended last June 30, the Secret Service seized nearly two million counterfeit bills and arrested 3,000 counterfeiters. In the previous year, seizures totaled 2,000,000 and 3,000 counterfeiters were arrested.

## Assumption Of Alert Duty Culminates Vast Training

The assumption of alert duty Monday, November 30, by the officers and men of Kingsley Field culminated more than six months of intensive training and preparation.

Combat ready air crews of the 322nd Fighter Interceptor Squadron will be on duty 24 hours a day to guard the Northwest area of the United States from surprise air attack. The crews will be flying the F-101B Voodoo which is

a familiar sight in the skies above Klamath Falls.

Col. Jack W. Williams, base commander, last week said that alert duty is a team effort. He stated that every man on the base must be prepared to sacrifice time and effort to help carry out Kingsley Field's mission of providing superior air defense for the United States.

Kingsley Field is a part of an extensive defense network extending into the Arctic and far out into the Pacific Ocean. This network is controlled by North American Air Defense Command, a joint United States and Canadian command. Kingsley Field is under the direction of Western Air Defense Force and 24th Air Division, with headquarters at Hamilton AFB, California, and McChord AFB, Washington, respectively.

Under the air defense concept, an unidentified aircraft would be detected by a ground radar station, picket ship, patrol plane, or "Texas Tower," a sea platform.

An air defense direction center would be notified, which in turn would "scramble" an interceptor. Aircraft are expected to be airborne in a very few minutes after receiving a scramble order.

Men in every squadron and organization at Kingsley Field—maintenance, armament, support, flying—have been practicing their jobs to prepare for alert duty.

Many have attended military schools in specialized fields. An average Kingsley Field pilot has had more than two years of flight school and over 1,000 flying hours.

Colonel Williams has explained that occasional "hot" scrambles will require superquick flight in the Klamath Falls area, with the accompanying sonic boom. He also stated that these activities will be held to a minimum in line with national defense policy.

The military prosecutor asked the death sentence for Young and Fernando Prano Bertot, 24, a Cuban who once studied at Columbia University in New York, and 30-year sentences for Lambton and 11 of the Cuban defendants.

The 37 tried Monday at Pinar del Rio were captured during a clash with Cuban troops during which one soldier was killed.

Young's attorney, Jorge Bacallao, warned the military tribunal that execution of the American would touch off a strong anti-Cuban campaign in the United States. The only other American sentenced to death during the wave of firing squad activity early this year, Alan Robert Nye of Whiting, Ind., was released and deported.

Trials of the third U.S. citizen, Rafael del Pino, 35, of Miami, was completed today just after midnight after eight hours of testimony and argument before a second tribunal at Havana's La Cabana fortress.

## Radio Announcer Object Of Search

EUGENE (AP)—Oregon State Police today asked the help of the Associated Press in locating an Oregon radio announcer whose daughter is seriously ill in Sacred Heart Hospital here.

The 13-year-old girl may have to undergo brain surgery, officers said.

The father, Forest J. Lovett, 57, of Eugene, was headed for an extended vacation and intended to contact radio stations in California, Nevada and Arizona.

He was last heard from Nov. 24 in Merrill, Ore., and was believed headed for either Reno, Nev., or Phoenix, Ariz.

## Verdict Due On Americans

HAVANA, (AP)—Two Americans charged with trying to overthrow Fidel Castro's revolutionary regime may learn a military court's verdict on them today, but another will have to wait until Friday. The government has demanded death for two of the three.

Awaiting verdicts today at Pinar del Rio were Frank Austin Young, 38, a commercial pilot of Miami, Fla.; Peter John Lambton, 24, a British-born naturalized American of Nassau, Bahamas, and 35 Cubans.

## Mayor Of KF Given Post

Mayor Lawrence E. Slater was appointed to the State Speed Control Board today by Gov. Mark Hatfield.

Slater will succeed James O. Conville, Beaverton, whose term expired.

He will be the only non-state employee member of the five man board whose basic duty is to designate speeds on county roads and city streets when it considers basic speed rule inadequate. Principally, the board functions on state highways which enter municipalities.

Other members of the board are State Police Supt. H. G. Maison; State Highway Engineer W. C. Williams; State Motor Vehicles Director Vern Hill, and State Highway Traffic Engineer F. B. Crandall.

The board meets at six week intervals in Salem.

Slater was approved for the post by the League of Oregon Cities who submitted their recommendation at the request of the governor.

Contacted by telephone, Slater indicated that he had not received official notification of the appointment but that he would be very willing to accept the responsibilities of the post.

## World Chiefs Reach Accord

PARIS (AP)—West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer said today he and President Charles de Gaulle are in agreement on all important questions between them.

Asked the best time and place for an East-West summit meeting Adenauer said "I think in the second half of April in Paris."

He made the statement at a news conference.

He refused to go into details on his two days of meetings with De Gaulle and Premier Michel Debre.

Adenauer had just come from a second meeting with the French president.

With only an interpreter present the two leaders got down to business after their foreign ministers had worked over issues on which they agree and disagree.
