God Praised By Survivor Of Tragedy

MONTROUSEVILLE, Pa. (AP)—

"The Lord opened my side of the plane and I was able to jump out."

Louis Matarazzo, 35, of Springfield, Pa., thanked God for his life from a hospital bed in nearby Williamsport.

He was the only survivor among 26 persons aboard a twin-engine Allegheny Airlines plane which crashed Tuesday into a 1,400-foot mountain during snow and poor visibility.

"I fought my way through flames, past the wreckage," explained Matarazzo, who is president of a Philadelphia sportswear company. "I tried to make my way back to the wreckage but couldn't make it. My legs were too stiff. The pain—"

When a Catholic priest who was flown into the disaster area by a helicopter came to his side, Matarazzo told him: "Thank God, father, you are here."

Recalling events just before the crash, Matarazzo said "All of a sudden the pilot seemed to race the motors and pull up. There was a crash. The plane burst and exploded."

The aircraft carried 23 passengers and a crew of three, including the pilot, Capt. Thomas R. Goldsmith, 39, of North Olmstead, Ohio.

Goldsmith, father of an infant child, was called in unexpectedly for the flight. He had been on a two weeks vacation and was not due back until Friday.

David L. Miller, an investigator for Allegheny, said Goldsmith appeared to be making an instrument approach at the Williamsport-Montroville Airport in this north central Pennsylvania community. The flight originated in Philadelphia and was bound for Cleveland with stops scheduled at Bradford and Erie, Pa.

Miller said the airport has no tower. He said Goldsmith's last contact was with the Allegheny office which gave him the weather and wind conditions.

"It appeared he was making an approach," Miller explained, "when he suddenly went into a pull-up procedure, deciding to go around the field and make another approach."

Miller said a pull-up procedure is not unusual and it is the pilot's prerogative to take such action if deemed necessary.

Civil Aeronautics Board officials arrived here Tuesday night with Federal Aviation Agency officials. The dead were brought down from the mountains and taken to a temporary morgue in Williamsport.

Among the dead was the Rev. Theodore Engist, 52, rector of St. Boniface's Roman Catholic church in Philadelphia. He was en route to Erie to visit his sick father.

Several business executives also were aboard the airliner. They included John H. Zurn, 34, vice president of Zurn Industries of Erie. He came aboard as the result of a last minute change in plans.

Reporter Attends Services For Chicago Fire Victims

Editor's Note: Larry Morrone, now of the United Press International staff in Chicago, made his first Communion at the Our Lady of the Angels Roman Catholic Church and attended Sunday School in the school building that burned down a year ago, killing 32 students and three nuns. He returned to the church Tuesday night to join parishioners in honoring the memory of the dead.

CHICAGO (UPI) — "Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted."

The words from the Scriptures echoed through the quiet church sanctuary filled with humble, hard-working fathers and sobbing mothers.

They were spoken by Cardinal Designate Albert G. Meyer, celebrant of the Solemn High Mass Tuesday night honoring the memory of 32 little children and three courageous nuns.

They were the 35 who died in the Our Lady of the Angels school fire, the worst school fire in Chicago history.

Tuesday night, on the first anniversary of the terrible holocaust, parents, relatives, friends, guests and firemen — 1,200 persons in all — filled the sanctuary to overflowing.

Through the gathering dusk they came, shuffling past the gleaming superstructure of the new school building, halting briefly on the cement steps to brush away the tears before entering the hushed chapel.

"It's been a long year with

much to forget," said a mother whose child died in the blaze.

"The children are happy in heaven," said a woman with her shawl draped reverently over her head.

Her words were echoed by Cardinal Designate Meyer, who called on the parents to seek comfort in their religion.

"The children and sisters who died are happy in heaven," he said. "Our faith convinces us that the sisters and children whose death we mourn are really alive — their immortal souls awaiting resurrection."

Through the muted sobs of the grieving came the faint shouts of children playing outside the church.

The children could forget, but, for the parents and other adults who stood outside the burning school, Dec. 1, 1958, will live forever.

There were the black-robed nuns, who came last night to memorialize the memory of the three sisters who perished, as well as that of the children they had taught and loved.

There were the firemen, dressed in white gloves, white shirts and ties, who a year ago

Traveling With The Chief: Tunis Seeks Independence

Editor's Note: This is one of a series of articles prepared by United Press International, depicting some of the political views and the general reception that President Eisenhower will receive in the various European countries he is scheduled to visit shortly.

United Press International President Eisenhower, like many travelers before him over the past 400 years, is steering clear of Tunisia on his Mediterranean tour. For travelers of old, the reason for skipping Tunisia was the Barbary pirates. For Eisenhower it's lack of time.

He will meet Tunisia's No. 1 man in a warship on the sea. Tunisian pirates once dominated. Like those pirates, President Habib Bourguiba knows exactly what he wants and to do with the risks.

Bourguiba, 33, was educated by the French, outlawed by the French, imprisoned by the French, elected when Tunisians threw out the French. What he wants is Tunisian prosperity, dignity, authority, complete independence.

So far, he was only a thin slice of all this. Independence from the French became a reality in 1957, but only a political one. Prosperity is still a dream.

Tunisia is a farming nation. In 1956 it had 9,794 tractors and 261,400 horses, donkeys, and mules. It has more metals than it can use (phosphate deposits are "practically inexhaustible"), but nothing for fuel but dreams of oil.

About half Tunisia's 3,500,000 Moslems are under 20 years of age; the birth rate is nearly three times the death rate. The Louisiana-sized country is half Sahara Desert, half fertile Mediterranean

ably apply. Arabic is the official tongue but French "is not considered a foreign language." It tossed out French troops last year but had to let them keep the huge naval and air base at Bizerte.

Arab in the cities, Berber in the mountains, piratical by history when the Deys and Beys of Tunis unleashed their Barbary Coast pirates to terrorize the Mediterranean and earnest and ambitious for the future. That's Tunisia, and President Eisenhower will hear but not see — this time.

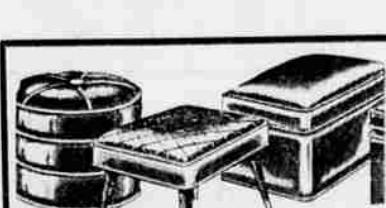
