This year will mark the 33rd year the women have held a bazaar, and Mrs. Hugh French, who was the first secretary of the original Ladies' Aid Society in Montague when it was organized in October, 1927, tells how the first bazaar was held. Mrs. French is the only member left of the original eight who comprised the society when first organized. In September, 1940, the Ladies' Aid Society became what is now known as the Montague WSCS.

Through the years, the women have become noted for their fine needlework and handicraft and shippers come from the surrounding area to buy the beautifully made gifts and foods.

Proceeds from these bazaars are used to carry on missionary work for missions, both at home and abroad, as well as keeping up necessities for the church.
