Kingsley Field Jets Conquer Redding's US Plywood Quintet

Kingsley Field's high-flying Jets soared to their second straight win of the season, a 70-68 thriller over U.S. Plywood from Redding, before a crowd of 200 in the Kingsley gym Friday night.

A 25-foot set shot by Jet Sam Bell with 20 seconds left in the contest proved the difference in the closely-played test. Bell's winning goal gave him a game total of 31 points, tops for both clubs.

Battling back from a 32-28 halftime deficit, the Kingsley quintet played nip and tuck with the visitors until Bell's basket clinched the win.

Plywood, one of Redding's top AAU teams slated to play Oregon Tech later this winter, used only five players the whole game. High point honors for the visitors went to shift Kent Carter, a 6-4 guard, who rammed in 27 points. Ex-University of Washington ace Doug McClary, 6-7, topping both teams with better than 30 rebounds, added 23 counters to the Plywood cause.

Kingsley coach Elworth Waddell voiced praise to guards Bill Baxter, Billy Morton, Chauncy Scott and Clarence Peoples for their "fine floor game," and to for-

wards Wade Gordon and Lavern Brown for their "excellent blocking which kept McClary from the boards throughout most of the second half."

An important factor in the Plywood scoring was the 18 of 20 free throws registered by the visitors. Kingsley hit on eight of 12 from the foul line.

Next action for the Jets will be two games against Hamilton Air Force Base next Friday and Saturday nights.

Nine NWC Players Unanimous Choices

Nine players were unanimous choices by the coaches in this year's Northwest Conference all-star squad.

College of Idaho had three of the unanimous selections, but Lewis and Clark placed the most players on the offensive and defensive squads named by the coaches.

Lewis and Clark placed six players, champion Willamette five, College of Idaho and Pacific four each, Linfield and Whitman two each.

The only repeater on the offensive team was Stan Solomon, Willamette's junior halfback. There was, however, Jack Abdie of Lewis and Clark. All-abundance on the defensive squad last year, he was an unanimous selection for offensive halfback this season.

Repeating on the defensive team were Ray Simonson, Linfield end; Howard Stroebel, Willamette tackle; Don Lund, Lewis and Clark linebacker; Chuck Peterson, Pacific linebacker; and Dale Shumway, Willamette back.

Royce McDaniel of Lewis and Clark, all-conference quarterback last year, was named as a defensive back, tying with Herman Mize of Whitman for a deep back position. This gave the defensive squad four deep backs and 12 players.

Trio Of Techmen Awarded Repeat Honors

Eight members of the Oregon Collegiate Conference championship Oregon Tech football team were chosen to berths on the 1959 OCC All-Conference eleven and three more were accorded honorable mention by a vote of participating coaches.

Quarterback Roy Johnson, fullback Stan Glass, and end Allen Leach were all named to the offensive unit while end Norm Hooper, guard Frank Wilson, tackle Virgil Winters, halfback Charlie Wilson, and linebacker Earl Kessler were picked on the defensive squad.

Honorable mention went to center Don Anderson, halfback Gary Honeycutt and halfback L. T. Tennerson. Anderson and Honeycutt are freshmen.

Three of the Techmen were repeaters this year: Johnson, who was named on the defensive team last season, Wilson and Hooper. Leach moved up from an honorable mention last year, as did Southern Oregon's Jim McAbee and PSC's guard Dave Roberts.

Johnson shares the offensive quarterback slot with Southern

Oregon's Jack Brown, an ex-OTI player. Because of a tie in the voting, 12 players were named to the offensive team.

SOC placed five on the offensive

team and two on the defensive unit. Portland State won five berths—three on offense and two on defense. Eastern Oregon placed one man on each team and Oregon

College of Education won a spot on the defensive unit.

Tackle Bob Wheeler of Portland State won the honor for the third time and SOC linebacker Phil Sward was the other repeater.

Glass, the OCC's leading rusher, and Leach, the conference's high scorer, were among six players to receive unanimous votes. Sward and halfback Ron Jolma of Oregon College were the choice of all the voters for spots on the offensive club while end Gordie Carrigan from SOC and Roberts were the other unanimous picks on the offense.

Others winning all-conference berths for the first time were tackles Willie Garner of SOC and Bob Salter of EOC, guard Tony Brauner of SOC, center Mickey Gray of PSC, backs Al Barnes of SOC and Frank McCormack of PSC on the offensive unit. Barnes and McCormack are the only freshmen to gain all-conference recognition. Completing the defensive team were halfbacks Herb Harms of PSC and Charlie Wilson of OTI.

Winning recognition on the 23-

man squad were 11 juniors, 6 seniors, 4 sophomores and 2 freshmen. Three repeated on the honorable mention list — Sam Clock, EOC halfback; Don Habel, EOC end; and Dick Smith, SOC tackle.

KUHS Frosh Top Hedrick In Medford

MEDFORD — The Klamath Union frosh wrestling team won 10 of 14 matches to whip Hedrick Junior High School 30-20 here Friday afternoon. The meet was the first of the season for both squads.

The baby Pelicans, led by coach Delance Duncan and assistant Jack Peterson, piled up their total points off three "pins" and five decisions in the 12-match team event and collected one "pin" and one decision in a pair of exhibition matches.

In the exhibition tests Jim McClung pinned Hedrick's Bob Higgins in the 95-pound class and teammate Dick MacBeth decided Norm Kadie, also in the 95-pound division.

In the team events, Jerry Waller, a KU 85-pounder, won by forfeit. Higgins won the second team match by forfeit to give Hedrick their first mark and from here on the Pels held sway.

Both Duncan and Peterson reported that the squad looked impressive considering the short time they had spent in training. "We're proud of the way they wrestled," grinned Duncan.

Nation's Best Blasts UCLA, Mark Intact

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Mighty Syracuse belted UCLA for a 36-8 victory Saturday and, for the first time in its 71 years of intercollegiate football, finished the season unbeaten and untied in 10 games.

In a strong closing bid for the national championship, the nation's top-ranked team got off to a 14-0 lead in the first period, boosted it to 21-0 in the second and then beat back a gallant challenge by the underdog Bruins of UCLA.

A short-sleeved crowd of 46,436 sat in Memorial Coliseum for the nationally televised contest.

The big Easterns sped to a quick lead after intercepting a pass shortly after they kicked off to the Bruins. They traveled 43 yards in nine plays. A nifty six-yard scoring pass from quarterback Dave Sarette to Gerhardt Schwedes put UCLA on the road to its fourth defeat of the year.

Syracuse's so-called second team then trooped on to the field and after a 72-yard thrust that required seven plays, the Orangemen were on the scoreboard again. The touchdown came on a 15-yard pass from Dick Easterly to Mark Weber.

Early in the second period the score mounted to 21-0. Easterly, Weber, John Nichols and Bob Haft took turns in the drive, ending when Easterly plunged for the final yard.

UCLA, with halfback Bill Kilmer in the starring role as the passer, got into the act before the half ended.

Jim Johnson's great 44-yard kickoff return started it off and Kilmer kept it going. He passed to Gene Gaines for 30 yards then 13 more and the final 20 to Johnson for the touchdown.

Skip Smith went through his own left tackle for the extra two points and that was it for UCLA.

From midway in the second period Syracuse slacked down. Whether the heat caused it—it was around 90 degrees—was hard to tell.

But the Eastern champs broke loose for two more touchdowns in the final period, good for 13 points, to dispel any doubts, if there were any, that this is a tremendous football team.

UCLA, which knocked off Southern California and ended the Trojans' eight-game winning streak two weeks ago, were nine point underdogs Saturday.

They were not expected to run against the powerful "Sizable Seven" line. And they didn't, winding up with a minus net yardage of 13.

Syracuse, as expected, displayed a sound, hard hitting rushing attack that netted 334 yards and added 106 more via the air.

Ore-Tech Wrestlers Complete 1st Week

The brand new intercollegiate wrestling program at Oregon Technical Institute came to the close of its first week of operation Friday afternoon.

"I think we'll make a success of it," stated coach George Miller, who added the mat job to his other chores. "Actually, we didn't get in much wrestling this week. Of course, we did some road work and some calisthenics and finally got on the mat for the first time Wednesday afternoon. The balance of the time we spent in ironing out some details necessary to insure our success."

Miller and his Owl grapplers helped with the work of arranging suitable quarters in which to conduct their practice sessions without infringing on other seasonal activities.

The program, an experiment for the first year, is dependent for its continuation upon the reception accorded it by the Owl student body.

"We began with 10 boys last Monday and have added two or three daily. There were 18 Thursday night and we expect our growth rate to continue," said Miller.

He noted that the present members of the squad have displayed a great interest and eagerness and mentioned that there is room for a lot more wrestlers, or would-be wrestlers, especially in the lighter weight classifications.

The popularity of wrestling has risen sharply across the United States in recent years and this has been attributed to the fact that the sport gives the smaller boy an equal chance to compete.

"We are just barely getting started and I believe that when the word spreads around the campus we will have many more boys turn out," stated Miller.

Forming the team's nucleus are boys ranging in weight from 136 pounds through the heavyweight division.

Presently working out are David Kubesh, 135, Don Shamion, 135, Don Wallin, 135, Hank Honeywill, 140, Bill Beck, 145, Gary Gathright, 145, Alonzo Jones, 150, Loren Pankey, 150, Jay Sessler, 155, Ron Weber, 155, Hal McOne, 155, Gary Ritchey, 158, Loren Weaver, 160, Hank Williams, 165, Gary Lanning, 165, Gary Spence, 170, Wendell Winterbottom, 175, Ken Taylor, 197, Lyle Fowler, 200, and Wendell Turnistro, 215.

Fowler, Winterbottom and Williams were all members of the Owl football team. Miller has stated that he is particularly interested in seeing football linemen also engage in the wrestling program.

The Owl squad will perform publicly for the first time when they put on a halftime exhibition match or two during the Owl basketball game in the gym Friday, December 11.

Scheduling of future matches, in the conference and out, is being completed by Miller at this time, to be announced as soon as possible.

Unitas, Colts Snare Lead With Victory

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Baltimore quarterback Johnny Unitas threw three touchdown passes and scored another on a run Saturday as the Colts whipped San Francisco 34-14 and took the lead in the National Football League's Western Division.

The convincing victory, engineered as much by the defense as by the offense, clinched at least a tie for this year's division honors by the defending NFL champions.

A full house of 59,075 in Kezar Stadium saw the visitors go into the game tied with the 49ers atop the division. Now Baltimore needs just one more victory to take the divisional title. The Colts meet the Rams in Los Angeles Dec. 12.

The three touchdown passes thrown by Unitas boosted his total for the season to a record of 29, one more than the old mark established by Sid Luckman of the Chicago Bears in 1943 in 10 games.

Unitas threw two touchdown passes to end Ray Berry, the league's leading receiver. One went seven yards and the other 13. He also connected with swift halfback Lenny Moore on a 64-yard scoring pass play and tallied himself on a 12-yard run.

The Colts' other touchdown came on a 57-yard runback of a pass interception by defensive halfback Milt Davis.

Steve Myhra kicked four extra points but one try was blocked by 49er Bob St. Clair.

The Colts grabbed off six San Francisco passes during the sunny, 60-degree afternoon. Two of the interceptions were turned into touchdowns.

San Francisco trailed just 14-7 at the half, thanks to a 66-yard burst off tackle by J.D. Smith. The 49ers' other touchdown came after injured quarterback Y.A. Tittle entered the game late in the third quarter. He engineered a 71-yard drive and threw a 21-yard scoring pass to Hugh McElhenny early in the fourth. Tommy Davis kicked both conversions. That put the count at 20-14.

Throughout the afternoon, the Colt defenders put pressure on San Francisco quarterbacks, starter John Brodie and Tittle. Y.A. was still troubled by a right knee injury suffered in the Nov. 22 loss to the Colts in Baltimore.
