Hostesses for the afternoon were Mrs. Crebbin, Mrs. Parrott and Mrs. Scott.

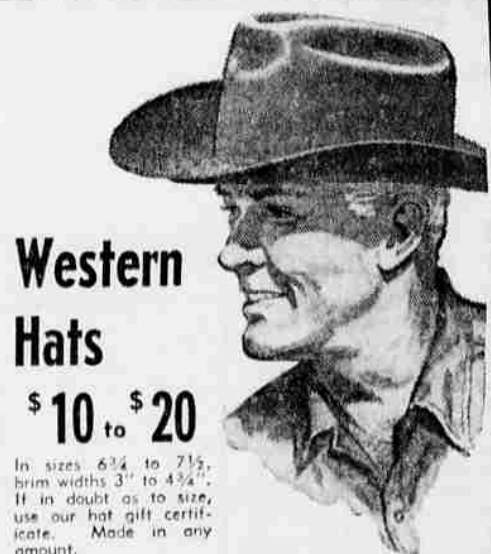

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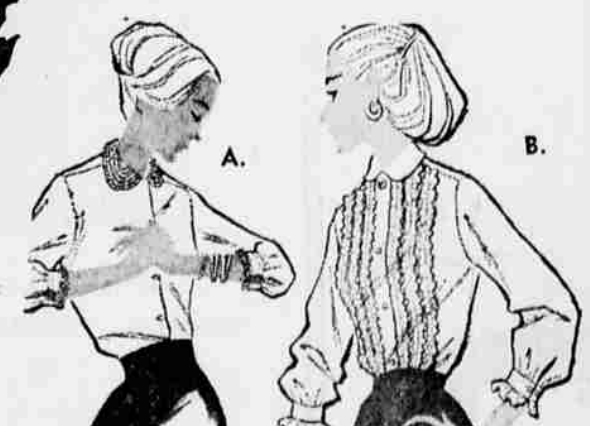
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
