'Mail Early,' Says Espee

With post office officials predicting record holiday mails, a Southern Pacific official today advised Christmas shoppers to mail their packages and cards early.

H. S. Orner, manager of mail, baggage and express traffic for SP, warned that the seasonal rush is already under way, and that Christmas mail headed for far-away places should be sent on its way promptly.

"Mail headed for distant states should be sent no later than December 10," Orner said. "Christmas mail for destinations in the same state should be sent by December 13, and local mail should be sent by December 16."

Southern Pacific crews will work around the clock to move the mountains of mail being carried along the railroad's lines, he added. Enough extra cars to make a mail train almost 40 miles long are being added to SP's regular fleet to handle the job.

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Convention Postponed

DORRIS—The State of Jefferson nonpolitical Constitutional Convention, scheduled to be held in Klamath Falls Saturday, December 12, has been postponed. Mrs. Flora Lee Reeves, convention chairman, has announced.

Sen. Clair Engle is to be guest of honor.

Delay in holding the convention was caused by the late adjournment of the Congress and previous commitments made by Senator Engle and his tour of the Far East. In a recent letter to Mrs. Reeves, Senator Engle said he will consider a new date upon his return from the Far East later this month. Since Senator Engle must be in Washington in January, the convention will probably be held next spring, said Mrs. Reeves.

The purpose of the convention is primarily to publicize the potential natural resources and opportunities to be found in the 22 counties of California and Oregon which make up the State of Jefferson.

Frank Jenkins, editor and publisher, Klamath Falls, and "governor" of the State of Jefferson, said a convention date in the spring will, due to the holiday rush, "suit me fine." He also said he thinks the spring will be more convenient for governors Pat Brown, California, and Mark Hatfield of Oregon, and other dignitaries who are invited and have expressed a desire to attend the State of Jefferson convention.
